Items From the Bay.

(From the Coos Bay News.)
The Chataqua dates for Marshfield are July 13 to 18th.

McDonald & Vaughan recently sold their logging outfit at Beaver Hill to the North Bend Mill & Lumber Co., who will operate its own camp there.

A meeting of Coos county bankers was held at Marshfield Thursday night for the purpose of making arrangements for the State Bankers' convention which is to be held at Marshfield on June 8 and 9.

A small band of white swans was seen on the flats in the lower bay Wednesday morning, and also a few bands of geese. They were resting in their flight from the south to their breeding grounds in Alaska.

The Marconi wireless station on Knob hill was ordered dismantled last week. Wireless stations all over the country are being put out of commission unless they are under naval management.

The Perham piledriver was brought down last week from the head of Isthmus slough to commence work on the wharf of the Standard Oil Co., north of town. The wharf will be 200 feet long and 30 feet wide, and the warehouse will be 150 by 50 feet.

Herman Hanson, generally known as Harry Hanson, died at his home on the coast, north of the Whiskey Run beach, on Wednesday last, aged 85 years. He was born in Germany and followed the sea when a young man. He left a ship at San Francisco in the early '50's, and worked in the beach mines along the coast, finally settling on the homestead where he recently died. He left one child, Mrs. Antone Sacchi. Harry Hanson was known by many of the early-day black sand miners, most of whom, however, preceded him across the great divide. He was one of the last of the miners who worked on the Randolph beach in early days.
S. W. Noah was fatally injured

while working in his pile camp near Crawford Point, on the east side of the bay Monday afternoon. He had cut a tree, which in falling, struck a snag, breaking it, and a portion of the snag fell on him, fracturing his skull. He was taken to the Mercy hospital as quickly as possible and was attended by Dr. Horsfall, but medical skill was unavailing, and death resulted from the injury early Tuesday morning.—Si Noah was born in Douglas county, Oregon, Jan. 2, 1850, and came to Coos Bay in the fall of 1873. He was for many years engaged in logging, and was owner of a ranch on lower Coos river. A son and daughter survive.

Loading Chutes at Norway.

Judge Wm. Colvig, Southern Pacific tax agent, returned to Portland Thursday after securing an option on two and one-half acres of land at Norway for a site for a cattle corral to be used for loading cattle shipped by rail. The property will also be partly excavated and the material used in fills along the line. Frank Nelson is the owner of the land. The matter has been referred to the legal department of the S. P. and Judge Colvig will return in 30 days to make final arrangements.—Times.
