No person or persons shall make use of a dog in hunting, pursuing or, killing any of the game animals of the state of Oregon.

A license is required of every person over 14 years of age for hu any of the wild animals or birds pro-tected by the laws of the state of Oregon. Fee for such license: Resi-dents, \$1.50; non-residents, \$10. A license is required of every per-Whereas, it is vitally desirable that the registration be accomplished with thoroughness and dispatch, both as a testimonial to the efficiency of our de-mocracy and as a moral example stim-ulating to our allies and depressing to

ling, and such license is at all times subject to inspection by any officer charged with the enforcement of the game and fish laws of the state, or the owner or his agent or representative of the real property upon which thu holder of such license may be hunting




