Governor Issues Proclamation for Holiday on War Census Day Tuesday.

By official proclamation of Gov. Withycombe, War Census Day, June 5, will be a legal holiday throughout the state of Oregon. In his proclamation the governor calls upon every patriotic citizen to assist in the big task of registering all men of military age, and to make War Census Day an event memorable in the state's history. The proclamation follows in full:

Whereas, The president of the United States has designated June fifth, 1917, as the day upon which our citizens shall register in accordance with the provisions of the selective draft law, and,

Whereas, On this day we face a gigantic task new in our national history and one whose proper conduct can only be attained through the united co-operation of every citizen, and,

Whereas, It is vitally desirable that the registration be accomplished with thoroughness and dispatch, both as a testimonial to the efficiency of our democracy and as a moral example stimulating to our allies and depressing to our adversaries, and,

Whereas, It is especially fitting that this occasion be made one of patriotic festival fittingly celebrating the nation's unity and the willingness of its citizenship to serve our flag and to make sacrifice, if needs be, in a righteous cause,

Now, Therefore, I, James Withycombe, by virtue of the authority vested in me as governor of the state of Oregon, do proclaim Tuesday, June fifth, 1917, as War Census day and I do further declare it a legal holiday, believing that by so doing the purposes above set forth will best be served. And I call upon the patriotic men and women of Oregon and their sons and daughters, to make of this day an occasion memorable in the history of our state, marking, as it does, a great forward step in the efficient utilization of our manhood upon the side of democracy and justice in the world war, to the end that world peace may the sooner be restored and permanently secured.

In Testimony Whereof, I have here to set my hand and caused the seal of the state of Oregon to be hereunto affixed this 28th day of May, 1917.

Rules for Conscription.

Selective conscription is now the law of the land. It was adopted by the House and Senate after full discussion and the settlement of various minor points of disagreement between the two branches of Congress. It is now the duty of all to assist in carrying out its provisions and making it as effective as possible.

Only those men who are between the ages of 21 and 31 are subject to draft. The pay of enlisted men will be increased \$5 to \$10 according to the base pay, those receiving the least wage to be given the largest income. Sale or delivery of intoxicants to soldiers in uniform is prohibited; also the importation of liquors into camps, barracks and recruiting stations.

Under no circumstances are bounties to be paid to recruits, or substitutes accepted in lieu of the men conscripted. The proposal to exempt medical students was stricken from the bill. Those who may not be drafted are specified as follows:

The Vice-President of the United States, legislative, executive and judicial officers of the United States and the states and territories.

Regular or duly ordained ministers of religion and students of the ministry now preparing in recognized theological schools.

All persons in military and naval service of the United States. Any member of "any well-recognized religious sect or organization at present organized and existing and whose existing creed or principles forbid its members to participate in war in any form and whose religious convictions are against war or participation therein in accordance with the creed or principles of said religious organizations."

But no person thus exempted "shall be exempted from any service that the President shall declare to be non-combatant."

The President may exclude from the draft, or call for partial military service, the following:

County and municipal officials, custom house clerks, postal service employees, artificers and workmen in government armories, arsenals and navy yards.

Such other persons employed in the service of the United States as the President may designate.

Pilots and mariners actually employed in the sea service of any citizen or merchant within the United States.

Persons engaged in industries, in-

cluding agriculture, found to be necessary to the military establishment or the effective operation of the military forces or the maintenance of national interest during the emergency. Those in a status with respect to persons dependent upon them for support which renders their exclusion or discharge advisable.

Those found to be physically or morally deficient.

It is stipulated that no exemption shall continue "when a cause therefor no longer exists." No matter how few or how many exemptions, the quota in regard to population will be insisted upon.

New Game Law Provisions.

The following from the new game laws which went into effect Monday, May 21, are of interest to residents of this section:

No person or persons shall make use of a dog in hunting, pursuing or killing any of the game animals of the state of Oregon.

A license is required of every person over 14 years of age for hunting any of the wild animals or birds protected by the laws of the state of Oregon. Fee for such license: Residents, \$1.50; non-residents, \$10.

A license is required of every person over 14 years of age for angling or taking any trout, salmon, bass or any other game fish by hook and line commonly called angling. The fee for such license is \$1.50, provided that no license for angling is required of any female.

Every person must have the license required of them in their personal possession at the time of hunting or angling, and such license is at all times subject to inspection by any officer charged with the enforcement of the game and fish laws of the state, or the owner or his agent or representative of the real property upon which the holder of such license may be hunting or angling.

Deer with horns from August 15 to October 15 of each year, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, two such deer during any one season.

Ducks, geese, rails, coots and shore birds, open season, October 1 to January 15 of the following year. Bag limit 30 such birds in any seven consecutive days.

Chinese pheasant, sooty or blue grouse, ruffed grouse or native pheasant, open season from October 1 to October 31 of each year except in Jackson county the open season is from October 1 to October 10 of each year. Bag limit, five of any or all such birds in one day, or ten during any seven consecutive days, provided that no female Chinese pheasant shall be killed. There is no open season on Chinese pheasants in Josephine, Coos and Curry counties.

There is no open season on mountain or plumed and California or valley quail except in Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Curry counties in game district No. 1. Open season in these counties from October 1 to October 31 of each year.

Doves, open season from September 1 to October 31 of each year. Bag limit, ten in one day or 20 in seven consecutive days. Pigeons are protected by federal law until September 1, 1918.

Trout, over six inches in length, open season from April 1 to October 31. Bag limit, 50 fish or 85 pounds in one day.

Trout, over ten inches in length, open all year. Bag limit, fifty fish or fifty pounds in one day.

It is unlawful to have game birds or game animals in captivity without securing a permit from the state board of fish and game commissioners, for which a fee of two dollars will be charged.

Cheese by the Carload.

Claud H. Giles, of Myrtle Point, who is handling sales for the Coos and Curry Creameries association, went over to Marshfield Tuesday, accompanying a car of cheese shipped by the association to eastern points.

He states that they are shipping a carload about every four days, some going by rail and others by boat from Bandon. Just at present the western selling price of cheese is higher than that in the east, and little is going east. He received orders for two carloads while there Tuesday.

He states that the inspection and co-operative selling of the creamery products, has enabled the Coos county producers to hold practically the same price as those of Tillamook, where the association inspection and selling has been in existence for more years than here. It has also enabled the Coos county producers, Mr. Giles states, to sell at better prices than the unorganized producers of the state, whose prices are now somewhat lower than those of Coos county.—Times.

What damage to game our panthers can do was illustrated recently on Pistol river, says the Gold Beach Reporter. Chas. Erickson and companions, living there, one night heard a fear blat close to the house, but investigation did not disclose anything. A second night the same occurrence. A third evening the same thing happened. Having a dog with them the latter time, the man started another investigation and found a panther crouched on a log baiting a badly injured deer in the water. The panther was killed, and a thorough search disclosed three partly devoured carcasses of deer. Three deer in three days shows the destructive ability of one panther.

Chandler and Kendall Go.

Capt. F. K. Gettins, of Eleventh Co. Coast Artillery, at Marshfield, received orders Monday from Adjutant General White, for Wm. G. Chandler and John C. Kendall, of his company, to report at the U. S. Officers Training School at the Presidio, in San Francisco, June 2. They started Wednesday morning. They are to act as instructors in the school as well as to qualify for regular army commissions. Capt. Gettins now has eighty-seven men ready for service in his company. There are ten or a dozen more applicants who have not qualified. They are restricted to a membership of 109, the 150 membership not being allowable at this time.—Times.

Big Timber Sale.

A tract of Coos county timber in section 30, 28-10 west, about 14 miles from Marshfield, had a \$20,000 loan placed on it Thursday by the Hooper-Mayo company of this city. Minnesota parties own the timber, on which Colorado money was placed.—Eugene Guard.
