Eastern Man Has Options on Large Timber Tracts.

Geo. H. Chaney, of Duluth, Minn., of the Edmund Hall Land Co., which is the owner of approximately 100,000,000 feet of standing timber in Coos county, arrived in Coos county last week from the east and will make his headquarters in Marshfield.

Mr. Chaney is here to buy up timber land and already holds options on several timber tracts in the county. He is buying in his own name, not as a representative of the company. He is accompanied by Mrs. Chaney, and

they have taken apartments in the Myrtle Arms, where they will make their home during their residence here, at least through the summer. Items From the Bay.

(From the Coos Bay News.)

H. W. Dunham, county trustee officer, was here from Coquille Saturday and went to Empire on official business.

A few black bass have been caught in Beale lake this spring. The fish were planted in the lake, which is in the sandhills back of North slough, a few years ago.

Robert Starkey, a Mexican war veteran, was in the parade here on Decoration Day. Mr. Starkey's health, considering his age--37 years--is remarkably good. Besides Mr. Starkey there are at least two more survivors of the Mexican war in Coos county. Our informant says that one lives in Bandon and one in Coquille.

County Judge Watson has held that the will of the late Thomas Maginnis is not valid. The property, valued at over \$30,000, was left in trust for the children, allowances being made for the widow and children. Mrs. Maginnis claimed that the trust provision deprived her of her rights and that the allowance for maintenance was not sufficient.

The new steamer Johannah Smith, recently built by Kruse & Banks for the C. A. Smith company, has been bought by the government, and some changes are being made in the matter of deck houses. The vessel has been in the Coos Bay-San Francisco lumber trade since being launched a few weeks ago, and has been towed between the two ports by the tug Defiance, while awaiting machinery. It is rumored that the government, after having machinery installed, will take the vessel to the Atlantic coast, for trade between New York and allied ports.

The Coos County Track and Field Meet was held at the race track Friday afternoon, and Marshfield again took first place in county field and track athletics. Marshfield scored 78 points, Bandon 39 and North Bend 5. Coquille and Myrtle Point were not represented. Jack Merchant, of Marshfield, broke the county record for the broad jump, establishing 21 feet 1 inch; and also broke the record in the javelin throw, establishing 152 feet 3 1/2 inches. He tied the county record in the 50-yard dash at 5 4-4 seconds, and made 33 points in the meet, beating the best record of an athlete heretofore, which was 25 points. Bandon won both relay pen-
