Half a Mile of Tiling.

J. B. Sweet informs us that his sons, A. P. and A. J. Sweet, are getting a considerable loan from the Federal Farm Loan through the Bandon organization on their ranch at Lampa. One of the uses to which they will put this money is the construction of half a mile of ditches to drain their marshy land. They have contracted with A. Davis, of Bandon, to do this work with a machine of his own invention, which moves forward like a farm tractor by its own power but rests on two skid-like bearings twelve feet apart between which the ditch is excavated. Mr. Davis has already done an extensive job of ditching on the Nordstrom place below Bandon. The contract price for the work on the Sweet ranch is \$1,000.

No doubt loans secured on the other ranches will be used for similar purposes with the result that the area of the rich tillable lands of the valley will be largely increased.

How Lace Curtains Can Be Protected in Warm Weather.

In the summer, when the windows are opened, the housewife may be annoyed by the fact that the lace curtains blow against the screens and become rusty and dirty. This can be avoided by placing a small tack at each side of the window and tying a piece of white cord from one tack across to the other. This will keep the curtains clean.

When a person sits near the window he may be bothered by the curtain blowing against him. Now, if another piece of string is placed exactly where the first piece was and the curtain is placed between the two it will be kept there, and both difficulties will be solved.—Popular Science Monthly.

How to Clean Woollens With Cornmeal and Salt.

Any light woollen material may be cleaned by this method: Mix cornmeal and salt in equal parts; then spread out the material or garment on a white cloth on the kitchen table and cover it with the cornmeal and salt mixture. When it has been on for a short time cover your clothes brush or scrub brush with a soft white cloth and go over the entire surface of the garment. After it has been brushed thoroughly, shake well and hang in the open air. The same process may be used with white doeklin gloves.

Switzerland was the first European country to adopt universal military service. The original founders of the Swiss confederation enacted that whoever shirked military training, which began at the age of fifteen years, was declared "devoid of honor and perjured," and his house was vowed to destruction. Should a man summoned to take part in a military expedition prove unable to respond owing to illness or some other valid reason he had to furnish a capable substitute at his own expense. From earliest days, too, the military authorities made special provision for tending the wounded. In this respect they seem to have been in advance of their times.

NOTICE TO WATER CONSUMERS.

Notice is hereby given, that on account of shortage of water supply, it shall be unlawful hereafter until further notice for any person to use water from the City Water System of the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon, for irrigation purposes except as follows: All regular patrons may use water for irrigating between the hours of 5:30 and 7:30 P. M. each day, but may use only one nozzle from one three quarter inch pipe or hose at one time for each residence service, and no more.

All persons are required to inspect all taps and other fixtures on their premises and stop all leakages.

Any person violating this order will be prosecuted under the City ordinances in relation thereto.
