Tuesday morning Dr. Phil J. Keizer, of North Bend, received a telegram from the surgeon general ordering him to prepare his private business affairs preparatory to receiving orders to leave for service in the medical corps of the U. S. army at Ft. Riley, Kansas. He must report there for duty on or before July 15th, but the exact date of his leaving and further details regarding equipment has been left up to General Lucas who will advise him at once. Dr. Keizer some time ago successfully passed all tests and has received a commission as first lieutenant. He believes he will be sent to France very soon, and hopes to be there before the summer is over. He wants to get into active service at the front, in order to get the benefit of the modern methods in surgery and also to do his bit for the country.—Coos Bay Harbor.

Government Aid Projects.

District Forester Cecil announces that approval has been given by the secretary of agriculture to co-operative road work in Oregon involving \$1,114,194, which is distributed to 15 projects. This amount is matched by the state, assisted in some instances by counties.

The projects on which co-operation is authorized by the secretary are as follows: McKenzie Pass road, Mount Hood loop road, Eugene-Florence road, Pendleton-LaGrande road, Medford-Klamath Falls road, Ochocho creek road, Canyonville-Galesville road, Reedsport-Coos Bay road, Little Nestucca road, John Day road, Florn-Enterprise road, La Pine-Lakeview road, Pilot Rock-Prairie City road, Crescent-Klamath Falls road and Zigzag road.

The McKenzie Pass road is along the river of that name and connects eastern and western Oregon. It is about 44 miles in length.

Canyonville-Galesville road is the only national forest road in Oregon lying directly on the Pacific highway. It is in Douglas county and is about 8 miles in length. At present it is one of the worst sections in southern Oregon.

Reedsport-Coos Bay road is a six-mile section lying in Coos county on the southerly extension of the Eugene-Florence road. It is a part of the coast highway.

Pheasants Injure Gardens.

Referring to what we said last week about the destructive proclivities of the China pheasants, the Coos Bay News remarks: "A few years after the China pheasants were brought to Oregon, J. M. Siglin, of Marshfield, secured and liberated them on ranches at the forks of Coos river. The birds increased and multiplied, but pheasants and gardens did not work well together, and in a comparatively short time China pheasants were conspicuous by their absence in that section. The farmers, however, stated that the pheasant has few equals as a table bird."

Time to Curb Autoists.

How much truth there may be in Kirkendahl's story of Lloyd W. Jacob's performance in Rock creek canyon we do not profess to know, says the Portland Journal. Kirkendahl says as reported, that Jacobs, driving an automobile, met his four horse team on a dangerous road, frightened his horses over a precipice and ran into one of his sons. This he did although he had been warned to stop. When the mischief was done Jacobs, it is said, sped on without offering help.

If this is true he deserves no mercy from the court. Ordinarily it is fairly safe for an automobile driver to commit a murder on the highway. Machines are so common that he is not likely to be noticed much by the neighbors as he flees from the scene of his crime, and escape is not difficult.

The papers had the account of such a murder committed not far from Salem the other day. The victim was a bicycle rider. He was found crushed into a pulp with his machine. An automobile had struck him and whizzed away without asking any questions. If such crimes become too common we shall have to keep tabs on all automobiles passing certain points on the highway. Fortunately there are witnesses in the Kirkendahl case and the truth will come out.

Of course the first rumors in this case were exaggerated; but the Journal has missed the most important lesson of the Rock creek affair. If the law provided that where the road is cut into the side of a canyon or hill the horse drawn vehicle should be entitled to the inside of the road, whether it was the right or the left, frightened horses wouldn't be so likely to slip over precipices.

Report of Accident Exaggerated

Nate Kirkendahl, who owned the four-horse team that was plunged over a grade near Camas Valley several days ago, was a visitor in Roseburg, says the News, and gave a detailed account of the accident. He stated that the affair as reported there was greatly exaggerated and the report that all four horses were killed in the fall was false, only one dying as a result of the injuries received. He stated that Jacobs, whose auto ran into the team, was taken in charge by the officers and later fined a small sum.

Mr. Kirkendahl was not injured in the accident, but states that the place where the accident occurred was very steep and had he accompanied the team over the grade, there is no doubt but that he would have met his death.

Roseburg Hard Luck Story.

Here's a hard luck story from Roseburg clipped from the Oregonian: Although he had lived on the tract for more than two years, had spent more than \$1400 in making improvements and had otherwise complied with the law, Dell V. Rast, of Roseburg, today lost a valuable 160-acre homestead, located near Cottage Grove, to the California & Oregon Land Company.

The general land office held that the applications of Mr. Rast and the California & Oregon Land Company were filed simultaneously and ordered that a drawing be made. The corporation won. Mr. Rast is a poor man and went on the homestead with a view of making it his home.
