OREGON TEAM EIGHTH.

Marksmen Surpassed By Only Two Other States.

Eighth place in the National team match at Camp Perry, Ohio, is the remarkable achievement won yesterday by the infantry team of the Oregon National Guard. With 50 teams representing every branch of the army and every state in the union competing in the match the place secured by the Oregon riflemen is a victory of great importance. But two states are ahead of the Oregonians, the other in the lead being teams of the United States regular service. Three thousand and five was the total score made by the Oregon riflemen. The ranges of fire were the most difficult known and the test of marksmanship the most exacting known. The ranges of fire in the contest were 200 yards slow fire, 200 yards rapid fire, 600 and 1000 yards slow fire and a skirmish run.

The news of the signal victory caused great elation among local National Guardsmen yesterday, when the announcement was made of the team's position. The position is such as to win for the team a small cash prize. The team, composed of 12 riflemen, three alternates and four officers, went to Camp Perry early in August. Among them being First Sergeant Horace Conner of this city.

Two Oregon riflemen were selected for the United States service team to compete in the international matches. The two are Sergeant O. P. Romaine, of Portland, and Sergeant Person, of Roseburg. Inasmuch as these two men were selected out of the thousands of military riflemen in the United States service, the achievement is an unusual and unexpected one.

DEAD ON RIVER BANK.

Man Must Have Been Dead For More Than Ten Days.

The badly decomposed body of a man supposed to be Alfred Long of Placer county, California, was picked up just before dark on the river bank in Eugene, within 100 feet of the gas plant. From the way the body was lying, it would seem that, sick, the man had laid his head on his arm and gone to sleep. When the body was picked up

the flesh was torn from the face and the forearm, making identification by the feature impossible.

A road toll tax receipt of Placer county, California, is made to the name of Alfred Long, and from other papers it is surmised he was a miner. Besides a small amount of money, the man had a razor and other personal belongings, and a chunk of bread in a pocket. Coroner Gordon took charge of the remains, and buried them immediately.
