PRODUCTSWORTHMILLIONS

OREGON IS ENJOYING A PROSPEROUS SEASON.

Dairy Output and Lumber Are Leaders—Fruit Crop Brings Good Prices.

With large crops and high prices, this cannot be otherwise than a prosperous season for Oregon. The product of the farm, forests and river will net the producers of the state a good \$100,000,000. The crops cannot be called bumper ones, but in nearly every case they are up into the average, and in some lines the average is exceeded. With only a few exceptions, ruling prices are better than usual. The leading industry of the state, the lumber business, is, as every one knows, not as active now as a year ago, but it is far from dead. A cut worth about \$18,000,000 will be put on the market this year.

The fruit crop, on the whole, has not equaled last year's, yet Oregon has fared better than the other Coast state. The apple output is estimated at about 60 per cent of last year's. The East has a very large apple crop, and this would indicate low prices this season, but men who are well posted on the market have no fears on this score. Prunes are not only abundant in Oregon, but very high in price, the market being strengthened by the smaller world's crop and the fact that there is no carry over supply of Oregon prunes anywhere. Other orchard fruits, except pears, have yielded well and brought good prices, and the same is true of smaller fruits of all kinds.

New School Laws.

Under the provisions of a recent law the educational board has divided the county into several districts with a supervisor for each district. The new supervisors entered upon their official duties Sept. 1. Oliver Veatch is the Cottage Grove member of the educational board. It is now stated that many districts in the county have not yet employed teachers and that many old teachers have left this field on account of better wage inducements offered elsewhere. There were also many failures under the new state certificate law. It is given out that qualified teachers will have little difficulty in securing schools by applying to the county superintendent.

Examinations will be held all next week at the office of the county superintendent for the granting of temporary certificates or permits to teachers who need them until the regular state examination, December 20-23. Teachers who have certificates at present valid in some other states are granted permits without examination.

Eight grade examinations will be held in several of the districts of the county on Thursday and Friday September 7 and 8, to enable students who are down in less than three subjects to make them up and enter high school at the beginning of the semester. Any such students from districts in which examinations are not held will be permitted to take the test on the day set, at the courthouse.
