

## COMPLAINT IS SUSTAINED

COL. YORAN SAYS COMPANY E SHALL HAVE TROPHIES.

Asserts That There is No Discrimination Against Cottage Grove at Eugene Headquarters.

Capt. B. K. Lawson has received a communication from Col. Geo. O. Yoran of the Fourth Regiment, O. N. G., with reference to the article in The Sentinel last week, in which Company E of this city complained bitterly because the trophies won had not been received, and in which there were intimations of discrimination against the Cottage Grove company. The colonel says he has always taken sincere pride in E Company, and hopes to continue in its friendship and good will.

Continuing Col. F. Yoran says "the complaints indicated in the clipping are some of them well founded, but the point made that there is jealousy here in Eugene is certainly a mistake. The fact is, we are proud of the achievements of the Cottage Grove company, and I have never seen anything here to the contrary. As to the trophies won the complaint is well founded, and I feel as much like kicking as any man you have. I have tried many times to secure the cup and medal, and at the last meeting of the general staff I attended I brought up that question again, and I believe those things will come. I will say this much: you shall have them now if I have to buy them myself. I am glad the company makes this kick. It may lead to a better understanding in the future."

Col. Yoran, in his letter to Capt. Lawson, desires a frank understanding, believing it will make matters more satisfactory, and above all he would like to show that at headquarters there is no discrimination against Company E. The colonel proposes to visit this city next Sunday and have a conference, and it is probable that a get-together meeting will be arranged. The Cottage Grove Company wants only those things to which it is justly entitled, and its contention is sustained by its colonel in the above quotations.

## GROVE SCHOOLS GROW.

Enrollment Greater Than on First of Last Year.

The city schools began their work Monday morning, and the outlook is very encouraging. The schools opened with a net gain of 21 over last year and this number will be increased, as many scholars are still away in the hop yard and orchard. The total attendance in the high school is 95, and in public school 341, and the school board believes additional room will have to be provided to relieve the congested condition in some of the rooms. Several important improvements have been made during the summer. One is the addition to the West Side school building, of two rooms, drinking fountains and adding another room for high school use. The apparatus has been ordered for the laboratory and as soon as it arrives will be installed in this room. This will be of great help to both the teachers and pupils in other work.

Professor H. E. Inlow, city superintendent, begins his fourth year's work in the city schools. In the past it has been of the highest order.

Professor E. Purvance, principal of the West Side schools, begins his second year's work in the city schools. The teachers and their grades are: High school, H. E. Inlow, superintendent; Lulu Currin, Elsie Lea and Laura Kennon.

Public school, East Side: First grade, Neva Perkins; second grade, Maude Hooper; third grade, Lena Holcomb; and fourth grade Esie Haley.

West Side: First grade, Anna Work; second and third grades, Miss Greenwood; fourth grade, Miss Umphrey; fifth grade, Miss Lola Wilson and Miss Iverson; sixth grade, Miss Lucie Burgess, and the seventh grade, B. B. Wilkie.

## VIEW HEAVENS FOR COMET.

Latest Celestial Wanderer Looked for in Vain by "Sky Sharks."

Cottage Grove people, versed in things astronomical, searched the clear heavens Sunday night in vain for a glimpse of Brook's comet, celestial wanderer, scheduled to be visible in Oregon this week, and supposed to be headed towards the earth from the eastern skyline. Though the sky was without a cloud, not a sign of the heavenly tramp could be seen, at least no one reported it. The comet is supposed to be an offspring of Halley's comet which proved such a fizzle a year ago, and nothing of a spectacular nature is due from this one. It has been steadily approaching the earth for two months. Telescopes have been necessary to detect its presence, but this week it is supposed to be visible to the naked eye, between nine and two o'clock.

On Thursday and Saturday the association will hold business meetings. On Friday there will be speaking by Representative Hawley, Judge Harris, Mayor Stevens and others. The parade will be held Friday afternoon, and the evenings of the 5th and 6th will be devoted to holding rousing campfires, such as are so well enjoyed by veterans. At these campfires the "boys" will eat and make merry, recounting experiences of the Civil war and having a good time in general. ## Civil Service Examination.

The Civil Service Commission will hold an examination for the position of Assistant Forest Ranger in Roseburg, Oregon, October 23 and 24, 1911. This examination will consist of questions regarding the use of the Forest, supplemented by field tests to show the applicant's fitness to perform the duties of a Ranger. Anyone between the ages of 21 and 40 years with a sound body need not hesitate to take this examination. The salary paid for persons selected from the Eligible List is \$1100 annum. The examination will consist of practical questions along the lines of the duties performed by the ordinary Ranger.

For application blanks apply to the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or to S. C. Bartrum, Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon.

## WILL PERFECT SYSTEM.

State Forester's Directed to Burn all Slashings.

Convinced that the majority of forest fires occurring during the summer season were due to the burning of slashings, State Forester Elliott has directed his deputies to burn all slashings wherever they may be found and also directed the owner of lands on which slashings may be located, to co-operate with the deputies in the work. Other sources to which the state forester attributes the fires are windfalls and burned over grounds and all steps necessary to prevent fires arising in the future from either will be taken. The state forester is also considering a plan for the organization of his forces to combat forest fires in the years to come. As the office was created by the last legislature, he had but little time to organize this year, but the fire fighters for all that, did effective work. It is estimated that 25,000,000 feet will cover the losses sustained by forest fires this year and when compared with last year when two-billion feet of fine timber was eaten up by the flames, this loss is slight.
