Big Deal on Lower Siuslaw.
A deal for 350 acres of land on the
lower Siuslaw at \$40,000 has just been
completed by the Wendling-Johnson
Lumber Co. with A. Prosser. It is

of the Southern Pacific extension from
Eugene to Coos Bay and that a large
saw mill will be established on the
property. The deal is not entirely
completed, but an option has been filed
for record.

Albany Would Cancel Franchise.
A lengthy ordinance calling for the
forfeiture of the franchise held on sev-
eral of the streets by the Portland,
Eugene and Eastern Railway company
was introduced at the meeting of the
city council of Albany last week and
adopted by the unanimous vote of those
councilmen present. The franchise to
operate electric cars on certain streets
of the city was granted to the Port-
land, Eugene and Eastern Railway
company on May 24, 1909. A provi-
sion was made in the grant, however,
that should the company fail to build
tracks and maintain a regular car ser-
vice on streets named in its franchise,
the franchise should be without effect
and forfeited.

Albany-Eugene Grading Contract is Awarded.

The contract for grading the Oregon
Electric from Albany to Eugene was
awarded last week to Guthrie & Mc-
Dougall, and Fuller & Bain, the sub-
contractors who are doing the grading
between Albany and the Santiam river
state that they will establish camps
between Albany and Eugene within
a week. It is the proposal of Messrs.
Fuller & Bain to have the grading done
into Eugene by the first of the year.

With a little more good weather the
contractors state that they will have
finished between the Santiam river and
Albany inside of 30 days and then lay-
ing of rails will be commenced immedi-
ately.

Historic Paper for O. A. C. Library.

A copy of the New York Herald
under date of April 15, 1865, an-
nouncing the assassination of Lincoln,
has just been presented to the library
of the Oregon Agricultural College.
This old newspaper, brown with age,
is in excellent preservation. The front

page is, of course, heavily black-lead-
ed, in mourning for the death of the
president. Other material of great
historic importance is found in the de-
scriptions of the surrender of the
Southern armies, Jeff Davis' last ap-
peal to his followers, and the surren-
der of the chief army of Juarez in Cen-
tral Mexico.

Another newspaper given the library
is of interest because of its great differ-
ence in form from American journals.
It is the Arbroath Guide, from the
west coast of Scotland.

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U. S. Government Says Cash

System of Credits Believed by Government Department
to Have Bearing on Prices

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Oct. 16.—The cost of living is
to be made the subject of Federal investigation by the Department of Commerce
and Labor. The Government will note the credit systems—whether customers
are inclined to have their purchases charged, or whether the custom leans toward
cash sales. For the matter of carefulness in credits has an important bearing up-
on the cost of living in different localities, according to the Department of Com-
merce and Labor. The Department figures that where bills are not collected
monthly without trouble, the cost of living is abnormally high, because the
tradesmen charge up their losses onto the cost of the merchandise.
