A carload of Yellow Newtown apples, bought by the King of Denmark, will pass through Portland in a few days from Medford enroute to Spokane. The apples will be exhibited at the National Apple Show and will then be shipped to Copenhagen.

Big Price for Siuslaw Land.

A deed from Alva Prosser and wife conveying 350.70 acres to the Wendling-Johnson Lumber Co. was filed in the office of the county clerk at Eugene last week.

The land fronts on the Siuslaw river about half a mile above Acme. The consideration mentioned in the paper is \$25,000, but from reliable information it is learned that the price actually paid for the property was \$40,000.

This is the largest amount ever paid to a single owner for real estate in the lower Siuslaw country, and Mr. Prosser has made a handsome profit on his investment.

He purchased the place about eight years ago, paying some six thousand

dollars for it. He has sold 10 acres of land and the timber on the tract for nearly the first cost of the property, so is really out but little if any more than the cost of the improvements.
