EUGENE BOOSTS LORANE.

Praise of Cottage Grove Country from City Up the Line.

The following recently appeared in the Eugene Register:
While the rest of Lane county which is making any effort at all in the matter of fruit growing is being pretty well advertised and brought to public notice, little is being said of the Lorane country, where more systematic work is being done in the matter of setting out commercial orchards than in any other part of the county.

Yesterday Jesse Darling, the representative of the Milwaukee orchards, who has large interests in Lane county and who has spent the past six weeks attending to business matters there, left with his wife and daughter for their Milwaukee home, and from him the Register gets some little idea of what is being done there by outside capital. Mr. Darling said:

"The Milwaukee Orchard company is the owner of a large tract of fruit land at Lorane and for the past year has been busy putting out trees for the making of a great commercial orchard which will later be divided into smaller tracts and 100 families will be sent out in the course of two or three years to look after these tracts, either through lease or absolute purchase. The land is being planted entirely to Spitzenbergs and Yellow Newtown apples and Bartlett pears in equal proportions. I am going to stop on my way out at Carlton and buy 15,000 trees to be shipped to Lorane for spring planting."

"We are now taking a large donkey engine from Cottage Grove to Lorane by its own power to be used in pulling the stumps from 130 acres, which we are under contract to clear, plow and plant to trees by April 1st. It will mean that we will have to work in all kinds of weather to get it done."

"I am just closing up a deal for 200 acres of timber land from George Sanderson. I have also contracted to buy 554 acres of heavy timber for two brothers, one of whom lives in Spokane, and the other in Milwaukee. They have not seen each other for the past 20 years and will use this purchase as a sort of partnership to bind them more closely together. Both these men are wealthy and they will put up a sawmill of 15,000 feet capacity on it and will saw the timber for the use of the families who are coming to buy and build on our orchard lands. One of the brothers is a large stockholder in the Churchill-Matthews company."

"I am expecting to bring some 15 or 20 families out next spring who will not wait for the trees to grow up with them. Ultimately as the orchards develop we will get transportation and if it does not come to us of its own accord we will build an electric line to Cottage Grove or Eugene. We are quite anxious that the seven or eight miles of road should be finished that would give us a good road to the county seat, and we are hoping the county's road funds may get in such a shape that they may be used for that purpose."

Scored Social Conditions.

The socialist lecture at the Grand Friday night was a splendid success, the theatre being well filled with an enthusiastic audience.

A song by the Morss family and some violin music by Miss Lewis were the special features of the occasion.

Samuel Sadler occupied the first hour. His subject "Failure of Capitalism" was well presented. He forcibly stated that a system of society that can produce a panic while warehouses and elevators are bursting, shelves and store rooms are overloaded, thus causing poverty and want, is a failure from any angle, and cannot be

successfully defended by anyone other than those who profit by the system.

However, Mrs. Sadler was the real treat of the occasion, she taking up the last hour, and her indictment of present conditions was forceful and to the point.

Mrs. Sadler said: "How can any mother belonging to the working class, go down into the shadow of the valley to bring forth children, knowing that they, the little ones, are predestined to be free offerings on the altar of modern capitalism; how can that mother fail to be a working, praying militant member of the socialist army. The ruling members of society so absorbed in the chase after the almighty dollar that they have no time, and no inclination other than to take toll from the hands of toil, though they be the hands of women and little children. Defend a system such as this? Vote to perpetuate such a monstrous system? No! Never so long as we have one spark of mother love left. Socialism would utterly destroy such conditions as these, would make life what it should be, a pleasure, a delight, a happy time for all.
