PORTLAND APPLE SHOW.

Annual Exhibition of Western Fruit for Flower City.

A really great apple show, to be a collection of exhibits from throughout the west, is being planned as an annual event at Portland. Committees are at work on the project and it is expected plans will be perfected within a short time.

The importance of the fruit industry to the state is the basic idea of the show. It is to encourage apple growing and horticulture generally that Portland business men and the commercial interests have joined in talking the subject over to determine if sufficient support can be had for an annual exhibition. It is believed that such an annual display will not only do much to encourage the apple grower already here but will attract many others to this state.

Opera House at Creswell.

Last Saturday night the new opera house and skating rink, just completed by E. J. Moore, was formally opened. The new amusement place is located in the building formerly occupied by the Chronicle. Springfield License To Be Tested.

The license was granted after Mayor Stevens voted to break the tie, and the license will be vetoed at the next council meeting.
