vents the legislation that the good people want. He used this explanation to lead up to a declaration that the liquor question will not be settled without the formation of a new party, having that proposition as its most prominent plank.

The speaker laid stress on two statements seldom played up by prohibition speakers. He said that so far the prohibitionists have accomplished nothing, and will accomplish nothing until all the good people get together and vote themselves into control of the national government. He also laid stress on the point that the prohibition party also stands for everything else that is good in government and that the stopping of the manufacture of liquor is only one of its proposed reforms.

The speaker excoriated the government that provides one set of morals for dry territory and another set for wet territory.

An audience of about 150 was present, and a good-sized collection was taken up.

PREPARATIONS FOR A BIG BUSINESS

ACCOMMODATIONS DOUBLED FOR SUMMER.

Calapooya Springs To Be the Mecca of Those Seeking Healthful Waters and a Pleasant Outing.—Extensive Repairs to Buildings.

All preparations are being made and plans being laid for a big summer season at Calapooya Springs, the summer resort that is rapidly gaining fame.

The hotel building will undergo extensive repairs and its capacity will be doubled. Landlord Wilson says indications point to an enormous number of guests and patients.

A new bottling plant for the mineral waters, to have a capacity of 1,000 bottles in ten hours, is being put in. It is expected to have this completed before the spring rush commences. The Saline plant will be located in this same building.

side, the avenues are named after the presidents in their order; north of Main, after the governors of Oregon in this order.

Under the new arrangement Fifth street on the East Side happens to get the same name again.

Avenues on the west side, north of Main, are named after different trees; south of Main, after prominent and eminent men.

The streets on the west side are lettered, so as to prevent confusion with those on the east side.

River street has been changed to Pacific Highway.

Every block has been allotted 100 numbers, so that each block will begin on an even hundred. Property owners will be required to number their houses before July 1st. It is wished to have all house numbers uniform, and as the city furnishes the numbers cheaper than individuals can buy them, it is probable that there will be no trouble in carrying this plan out. The city engineer has given each lot its number and the city will get the signs here as soon as possible, furnishing the number and putting it up for 35c.

The city expects to make enough profit from the sale of the numbers to pay for sign-boards for the streets.

The injured men were able to get the car back onto the track and complete their trip to the city.

False Advertiser Fined.

Conviction of publishing a false advertisement was found in Justice Bell's court yesterday against J. Leavitt, a merchant, who was fined \$50, in spite of his denial of intent to mislead. The charge was that Leavitt inserted advertisements in the newspapers that he had bought a bankrupt stock worth \$6,500 at 41 cents on the dollar, whereas, in fact, he paid only \$690 for the merchandise.

Leavitt advertised that the store had failed and that he had bought the goods from the receiver. He evaded these statements by saying that any man who sold out his stock in a short time was a failure and one who received the goods on a purchase was a receiver. The court held that the public would read these terms in their common commercial acceptance and that a falsehood had been printed.—Oregonian.
