Council Proceedings.

The city council met in regular monthly session Monday night. A petition to improve Weber street south of Locust under class B of street improvement was granted.

A petition to place an arc light at the street crossing near the Adventist church was referred to the light committee with power to act.

A proposal from the publishers of the Cottage Grove Sentinel to publish the proceedings of the city council, ordinances, resolutions, etc., was accepted for a term of two months as per bids submitted. This does not include publication of street and sewer ordinances.

A request from the Ladies' Civic club that the city dog tax fund be turned over to the club as a nucleus for a library fund was referred to the mayor and city attorney with power to act.

The street commissioner was instructed to notify certain property owners on N. 3d street and S. River street to spray or destroy certain trees infected with San Jose scale within ten days or the same would be done by the city. This action followed the reading of a communication from county Fruit Inspector C. E. Stewart.

A committee was appointed to investigate a proposal from the E. T. Barnum Iron Works to furnish two steel cages for the city.

The mayor, on motion, appointed a committee to prepare plans for a hose cart house on Mill street.

On motion the city recorder was instructed to wire J. H. Causey & Co. at their expense that if they do not accept the proposed bond issue within five days the deal will be declared off.

The city attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance for the purchase of jaws, etc., for the rock crusher.

The rock quarry committee was instructed to estimate the amount of rock required to be broken for the crusher as per advertisements for bids of same.

The city engineer was instructed to get an estimate of cost of proposed sewer extensions on east side of the city and also on the west side of the river.

Repairs were ordered on Main sewer on N. 3d street (west side.)

Ordinance No. 328 adopting a uniform system of naming the streets, avenues and other public highways in the city of Cottage Grove was adopted and signed by the mayor.

Ordinance No. 329 providing for the numbering of dwelling houses and places of business on the streets and avenues of Cottage Grove was adopted and signed by the mayor.

The city attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance regulating the speed of automobiles on the streets and avenues of Cottage Grove to eight miles an hour on Main street and twelve miles an hour on other streets and avenues.

New Sewer System for Eugene. Plans for a sewer system to serve Eugene for the next 50 years were indicated briefly to the Eugene council when Chairman Bell, of the sewer committee, asked the council to submit at the April election a charter amendment to limit the sewer bond indebtedness of the city to \$200,000. The plans of the sewer committee are the most advanced that have been presented to the city in a long time and even yet are not at all fully developed. In broad outline, the plan is to construct a main trunk sewer, probably at least six feet in diameter, beginning at Fifth and High street, thence to the river.
