erty owners to build streets whether or not they are willing or able. He certainly is liberal. I am in favor of standing by the council, provided they stand by the people.

He seems to have one idea in his head that is all right. That is in regard to the manner of building streets of full width from curb to curb. But he seems to think that because a street was once built that it should never wear out, which is the case, and would be the case, if they were built on a ten-year time plan. By the time the ten years was up they would have to be made over again and another ten years of indebtedness. He seems to think that a man who is not willing to ruin himself to build a street in front of or around his home is not a good citizen and is not worthy of the assistance of the other taxpayers of the city. It looks to the writer as though, knowing that he is immune from taxation, he does not care if a hardship is worked on his neighbor.

I am sure that under a special tax system we would gather much more money from property that is in the city and should pay its share of street building, but does not now pay a cent, and better streets would help this property as much as any other. Selenium a Rare Element.

Selenium is a rare and little known element described by the United States Geological Survey as having its greatest use in the manufacture of certain glasses to which it gives a red color and in coloring enameled ware red. It is used to overcome the natural green color of ordinary glass and also in making glass of a distinct red color such as that used on railroads for signal lights. Selenium has the peculiar property of being a very poor conductor of electricity in the dark and a fairly good conductor in the light, and a number of electrical inventions depend on this peculiarity. It has been used in experiments in telephoning along a ray of light, and for transmitting sounds and photographs from one place to another by means of a telephone or telegraph wire.

Brother vs. Brother in Land Case.

A case that delves back to the days of pioneer merchandising in Roseburg is being heard in the circuit court here by Judge L. T. Harris. The litigants are brothers—Henry G. Crow against E. J. Crow—a proceeding in equity involving 500 acres of land at Flournoy valley, 160 acres at Looking Glass, 160 acres on Sugar Pine mountain, a one-seventh interest in the Crow estate at Coles valley, and a one-seventh interest in property in the city of Eugene.

All of the property involved, which originally descended from the parents of the litigants, was deeded many years ago by Henry Crow to E. J. Crow. Now he wants it back, alleging that he gave the property to his brother

that Henry delivered produce to them and had the purchase price credited to his brother. These firms, include, among others, the Abraham Wheeler company, which retired from business over 20 years ago.

Henry Crow's attorneys are Albert Abraham and B. L. Eddy. The defendant is represented by Attorneys O. P. Coshaw of this city and L. Bilyeu and S. P. Ness of Eugene.—Roseburg Review.
