PROMINENT GIVES SUPPORT TO WOMAN'S CLUB.

The opportunity for this boost is near at hand in the form of the musical recital to be given next Wednesday evening. This entertainment will be given by exceptionally high class talent and well worth more than price of admission. Kerosene Used to Cause Decay.

Many people are at work on the logged-off land problem in the vicinity of Spokane. Some try one way and some another of clearing the land. Among those who are building homes for themselves upon the lands which were once in timber and brush is L. W. Perkins of Belair, a few miles out of Spokane. Mr. Perkins remembered that in the east some practiced boring into oak stumps and filling the hole with saltpetre in a comparatively short time would rot the stump.

About two years ago Mr. Perkins bored, with a two-inch augur, from the top into one of the green pine stumps on his place, which stood a foot or so out of the ground and was a foot in diameter. He filled the hole with kerosene. A little later he bored another hole at right angles at the foot of the stump and tried to fire it by putting in shaving, but found it useless. Two or three days ago a man employed on Mr. Perkins' place, in digging, came across the stump treated with oil and found one of its roots to give way at once, crumbling into a mass. The stump itself looked as solid from the outside as any of the others, but upon striking into it it was found to be a mass of punk, being easily dug and removed. The other stumps were still solid.

Mr. Perkins is wondering whether or not a two-inch augur, a little kerosene oil and a year or two of time will not be about the cheapest way that the ordinary man has for removing stumps. Another stump into which Mr. Perkins put saltpetre about half the length of the hole, was found to contain a crystallized stick of saltpetre.

While the stump itself, to all appearances, remained unaffected by the dosing.—Hood River Glacier.

Old Coins Unearthed.

Two old coins, one of Italian mintage of the date of 1811 and the other an American half dollar of 1829, were found by W. E. Thompson recently while repairing a fence on his farm a few miles from Scottsburg. The coins were about four inches beneath the surface of the soil. The farm was owned in the '50's by Captain Ratcliffe and prior to that time was a camping spot for freighters between Umpqua and Jacksonville.

The Italian coin is about the size of an American dollar and on one side bears the Napoleon head and on the other the words: "Napoleone Imperatore E Re, 1811 M." on the reverse is a crown, a star, crossed banners and the words: "Regno d'Italia, Five Lira," and on the rim the words: "Dio Proaegee 'Italia'" and a star.

The American coin is a half dollar of 1829 with no mintage place given.

SCHOOL CHILDREN WILL NOT NEED TO CONTRIBUTE

RAILWAY WILL TRANSPORT BELL FREE OF CHARGE.

Old Liberty Bell Will Be Brought to Panama Pacific Exposition.

The school children of San Francisco and of California will not be called upon to contribute their nickels and dimes toward a transportation fund to bring the famous Liberty Bell to San Francisco for the Panama Pacific International Exposition.

The Southern Pacific company, through its officials in San Francisco have made an offer to the exposition directors to transport the Liberty Bell from Philadelphia to San Francisco free of charge. The railroad offers to bring the bell out and to give it as much attention throughout the trip as is now given it in its present resting place in Philadelphia.

The state of Pennsylvania values the Liberty Bell as much as it does the history connected with it and the Southern Pacific officials are prepared to see that provisions are made for a company of Pennsylvania militia to guard the bell on its long trip across the continent.

The trip of the honored old bell that in 1776 announced the signing of the Declaration of Independence, will be a triumphal procession. At every station in the country where the train stops—and it will have to stop at nearly all of them—thousands of school children and their parents will gather to see the bell that tolled the greatest story that has ever been published in the United States. It is planned to erect a small belfry on a car and to hang the bell in that for the trip across the continent. United States history began with the tolling of liberty bell and there is not a native of this great country who does not want to see the beginning of the history of the United States.

During the month of January more than 30,000 acres of land in Montana and Oregon were recommended by the United States Geological Survey for designation as enterable under the Enlarged (320-acre) Homestead Act, and 23,097 acres previously designated under this act were reported to the secretary of the interior as not enterable and canceled as such, detailed examination having shown the lands to be susceptible of irrigation.

The total area on January 31, 1912, which had been classified by the Survey as enterable under the Enlarged Homestead Act was 190,476,956 acres.
