COUNTY SEAT NOT IN NEW CLUB

VOTERS OF COUNTY ORGANIZE FOR SQUARE DEAL.

Object of Club Is to Work for the Just and Equal Administration of County Affairs and to Recommend and Endorse Candidates.

A "Square Deal Club" is being formed by the voters of Lane county outside of the city of Eugene. These voters feel that this is the only way in which the balance of the county can be assured of a look-in in county affairs.

Two meetings have already been held at Springfield attended by delegates from Cottage Grove, Junction City, Creswell, Coburg, Fall Creek, Lowell, Pleasant Hill and other points. Geo. M. Hawley and J. F. Hickey were present from Cottage Grove.

It is not the intention of the club to cut Eugene out of the deal, but merely to endeavor to insure other parts of the county a square deal in dividing up the patronage, which it claims has not been given in the past, owing to the large votes centered in Eugene.

The following resolution was adopted at Monday's meeting:

"Resolved, That the objects and purposes of this organization are to cooperate with similar organizations in Lane county to work for the just and equal administration of county affairs and to recommend and endorse for county officers candidates who will pledge themselves to carry out objects aforesaid."

It was further resolved that all in sympathy with the work of the club perfect similar organizations throughout the county.

John Kestley of Springfield is chairman of the organization.
