Would Not Have Industrious Pay Dearly for Negligence of the Idle.

Winberry, Ore., Feb. 18.—Ed. Sentinel: Replying to your question as to how my ideas on road petitions would change things from present conditions, I will explain in a very few words.

Let me relate a little circumstance that happened here, then you can see how it is. Here were three road districts. One had all the roads that it could handle. The people had been voting a special tax for several years and giving work, trying to get good roads. One other district has been many out.

voting a special tax and has got fairly good roads. These three districts have about \$331,000 taxable property. The one that has been idle has about \$100,000 of it. Now the county court consolidates these three districts and says, "Now you get in and vote a special tax for good roads in the district that has been idle."

This is not all, but I think it is enough so that you can see how the people feel about trying to build roads under the present method. If there were a law to compel the county court to grant all petitions in regard to supervisors and changing of boundary lines, where there is a majority of the taxpayers signing, the people would feel like getting in and doing some-

thing, as they would not be afraid of the county court interfering with them.

I see Mr. Huffman has come out in favor of the supervisor being elected by the people, but this boundary line business is important also. This will be the campaign issue on commissioner.

Don't think that these people are satisfied to let those outside districts have to build their roads for them, for they are not, or, at least a great many of them are not, and there is a way of getting at road districts that won't build good roads.

If Mr. Price is not in this and is willing to stand by the people, let him come out and say so, as we are going to cast our vote for the man who will help us get good roads. HAS TAFT DONE ANYTHING?

Pertinent Views of Minnesota Man on the Present Presidential Situation.

"I don't hold any job—I don't want any job—all I want is good government, and therefore I'm for President Taft," was the unswerving attitude taken by J. Adam Bede, after he had put his audience in good humor with some of his Pine City wit. "We have not had an abler president since Abraham Lincoln, nor one whose heart beats more loyal for the masses of our people."

"If he has made mistakes they were the mistakes of petty politics, and in the end the people care little who is postmaster at Podunk, if the president is doing the world's work. We had to wait for the London Times to tell us that Lincoln's Gettysburg speech was English literature, and some Americans won't know Taft is the greatest leader in the peace movement until his statue stands in the capitals of the world."

leader in the peace movement until his statue stands in the capitals of the world.

"If he can but carry out that peace work alone, he will have done the greatest thing to relieve the burdens of the common people."

"What's the matter with Roosevelt?" was a cry sent up from a table near the speaker.

"Nothing's the matter with Roosevelt," was Bede's quick answer, and then disregarding the interruption, he proceeded:

"A mere recital of his accomplishments is the strongest argument in his behalf. You asked for the postal bank, and you got it; you asked for a corporation tax, and you got one of 1 per cent; you got a tariff commission, a maximum and a minimum schedule and a tariff commission that will assure reduction on a scientific basis. He established a customs court and a commerce court; obtained an income tax amendment on which the people will vote soon; substantial free trade with Philippines; and important amendment to the interstate commerce

act; conservation laws, pure food laws, a corrupt practices act; economy in every department; a trade treaty with Japan, a commercial arrangement with China, and treaties are now pending in congress with England, France and Germany.

"He dissolved the tobacco trust and the Standard Oil trust, is fighting the sugar beef trusts, and has given us the ablest Supreme Court since the Civil war. What president ever accomplished so much in three years for the people?"

"What about Roosevelt?" came the voice again, but the speaker continued without heeding:

"It takes a long time to do these things, and we must have patience. It doesn't pay to sit up nights hating somebody—we are solving problems for 90,000,000 free people that will stay solved. The real wonder is that we've been able to keep up with the procession so well in the solution of our problems, for the world has been moving at a marvelous pace."

"If there are any faults in the grand old Republican party, specify them and they'll be removed. To my mind socialism and these third and fourth and fifth parties are merely the result of more or less wrongdoing in the old party—if we have made mistakes, we must profit by them, and if we want things right, we've got to learn to do our duty."

"The Republican party has always been a progressive party, has been since it elected Lincoln in 1860, and still will be, in my judgment, when it re-elects Taft in 1912. He is a grand, strong president. We have always re-nominated a Republican president when he has asked for it, but if you're going to throw down Taft this year, you'll have to throw down the things he has done during his administration."

The speaker closed with an expression of the need for all "pieces of the party," as he called them, to join together, to frame a platform next June favorable to all the people, and to work together to victory next November. —Pine Poker, Pine City, Minn.

Will Debate Woman's Suffrage.

Woman's Suffrage is the subject chosen for the dual co-ed debate between the University of Oregon and the University of Washington, scheduled to take place at Seattle on the first Friday in May. Great interest is taken in the annual forensic battle with Washington by the women at Oregon and already candidates for the team are studying on the question. The subject of woman's suffrage is an especially interesting one to the Oregon students, as a thriving Woman's Suffrage club has been formed by some of the leading students, and it is expected that there will be an unparalleled crowd in attendance at the debate when it takes place.

The dual debate league between Washington and Oregon is one of three such organizations in the United States. The Oregon lassies won in the debate held at Eugene last year, while the girls from Washington won in Seattle the year before.
