reign of Home Rule, are destined to
learn their mistake. Perhaps no more
drastic measures to regulate the sale
of intoxicants were ever framed into
an ordinance than that which will
govern the traffic in that city. Alto-
gether 32 pages comprise this measure,
which was passed at the adjourned
meeting of the common council on
Friday night.

Saloons shall not be kept open be-
tween the hours of 11:30 o'clock p. m.
and five o'clock a. m. during the week
days, nor between the hours of 12
o'clock midnight on Saturday night
and five o'clock a. m. on the following
Monday morning, nor allow any frost-
ing on any window, glass door, blinds
or screens on any window or
glass door, nor to place the bar in said
place of business so that the same can-
not be readily seen from the outside.

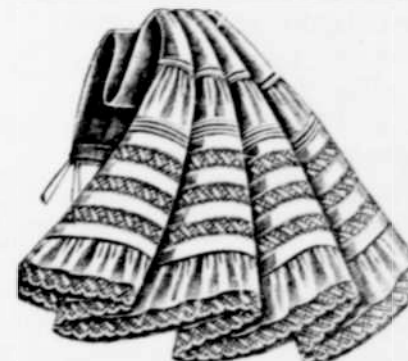

THE BEST WALNUT STOCKS

Investigation by Oregon Agricultur-
al Experiment League Will Be
Valuable to Growers.

To determine the value of different
walnut stocks, the members of the
Oregon Agricultural Experiment
League are making an exhaustive in-
vestigation upon which they will report
to the secretary, Prof. R. D. Hetzel of
the O. A. C. extension division. Blanks
are being sent out, on which the
members will furnish information as
to the kind of soil upon which their
plantings were made, the elevation,
and other matters.

The league requests that each per-
son who starts this co-operative test
secure three or four seedling trees each
of the California Black, American
Black and English walnuts and grow
these as seedlings without grafting to
determine their adaptability to the
conditions of that particular vicinity.

If grafted or budded trees are not
bought of the nurserymen to begin
with, the league is suggesting to the
members that an equal number of the
American Black and California Black
stocks be used in the test and given
identical treatment if possible. The
information blanks will show, at the
end of the test, the kind of stocks
used; age of nursery trees when
bought, or of seedlings when grafted;
the date of grafting or budding; the
percentage of grafts on each kind of
stocks to grow; the average amount of
growth made on each of the stocks to
grow; the average amount of growth
made on each of the stocks during the
first season; the age that the trees
came into bearing; and the compara-
tive size and vigor of the trees at the
bearing age.

The mere list of names of owners of
walnut orchards, with their addresses,
will be valuable in indicating accu-
rately the walnut growing districts of the
state as developed thus far.

Eagles Carrying Off Lambs.

ly reported that a flock of eagles that
have been become protected by law
have become numerous enough to be-
come a menace to his property. He
has a flock of sheep and goats on his
place and up to date the birds have
carried off bodily no less than 10 or 12
of his newly-born lambs and kids.
The law protects the birds and he
dares not shoot them.

District Fair Notes.

The management of the district fair,

COLONIST TRAFFIC DUE

Reports from Eastern Points Tell of
Many Homeseekers Bound for
Northwestern States.

Although the colonist movement has
not started out with the accustomed
rush of former spring periods, it prom-
ises to continue steadily throughout
the entire season of 46 days, with the
probability that the aggregate number
of new arrivals in the state will be
equal to that of a year ago, which ex-
ceeded 25,000.

A. D. Charlton, assistant general
passenger agent of the Northern Pa-
cific railway, received a telegram yes-
terday from the general offices at St.
Paul, advising him that the movement
seemed certain to be heavy throughout
the season. Traveling agents of the
company have reported that a large
number of colonists had started for
Oregon and Washington from the At-
lantic Coast states and that many
others were coming. Many of them
will stop over at various points along
the line to look over local conditions.
They will begin to arrive in Portland
in about a week.

Both the transcontinental trains on
the O. W. R. & N. line are carrying
extra equipment for the accommoda-
tion of colorists. Many are leaving
the trains in eastern Oregon and some
are going into central Oregon. De-
spite the extra accommodations pro-
vided it was necessary to add yet
another car to each train yesterday.

Fred W. Graham, western industrial
and immigration agent of the Great
Northern railroad, was in Portland
yesterday and reported that many
landseekers were coming to Oregon
over that line. The recent tour of the
Great Northern exhibition cars caused
many farmers in Iowa, Illinois, Indiana
and Ohio to become interested in this
state.
