FLOWER SHOW IN 1913.

Europeans Will Compete With Americans For \$15,000 In Prizes.

The Society of American Florists and Ornamental Horticulturists through the national flower show committee has closed a contract with the International Exposition company to hold an international flower show the first week in April, 1913, when more than \$15,000 will be offered in prizes. The show will be held in New York, and a number of societies will contribute gold medals and other trophies for the competitors.

There are more than fifty representatives of foreign florists in this country, and many of these will exhibit the latest creations of flowers and plants in competition with the products of this country. Owing to a law recently passed by congress all goods to be exhibited in this country are admitted free, and this will enable European florists to make entries without the usual customs annoyance.

The national flower show committee consists of Charles H. Totty, Madison, N. J., chairman; J. A. Valentine, Denver; W. N. Rudd, Chicago; Thomas Roland, Boston; W. P. Craig, Philadelphia, and W. A. Manda, South Orange,

Ordinance No. 330.

An ordinance providing for the closing of certain places of business between the hours of 12 o'clock, midnight, and 5 o'clock a. m. and providing a penalty for violation of said ordinance.

The Common Council of the city of Cottage Grove does Ordain:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for the proprietor or proprietors of any cigar store, pool room, card room, soft drink establishment or other place of public amusement to keep his or their place of business open between the hour of midnight and 5 o'clock a. m.

Section 2. Any person violating the provisions of Section 1 of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor or upon conviction thereof before the Recorder, shall be fined in a sum not less than \$5, nor more than \$25, and in default of payment of such fine shall be confined in the city jail one day for each \$2.50 of such fine.

Section 3. Whereas the health, peace and safety of the city demands that this ordinance should take immediate effect an emergency is declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor.

Ordinance No. 331.

An ordinance creating a fund for a public library in and for the city of Cottage Grove and providing for the disposal and management of such fund.

The Common Council of the city of Cottage Grove does ordain:

Section 1. That for the purpose of encouraging a public library in the city of Cottage Grove, the city treasurer be and is hereby directed to keep certain funds of the city in a separate account known as the library fund.

Section 2. For the purpose of providing a revenue for such fund, as mentioned in Section 1 of this ordinance until other provisions are made therefor all moneys which shall hereafter be received for the license of dogs or for fines for violation of the Ordinance No. 305 known as the Dog License Ordinance shall be deposited in the library fund herein provided.

Section 3. Said fund shall be managed and expended according to Chapter IX of Title XXXIII of Belinger & Cotton Laws of Oregon, being Sections 3568 to 3577 inclusive, known as the public library law, reference to which is herein made and the same is hereby adopted for the management of said fund.

Section 4. The Mayor, with the approval of the Common Council is hereby directed to appoint a board of six directors, according to the provisions of Section 3571 of said public library law for the management of said library fund and any library or other property acquired thereby.

Ordinance No. 333.

An ordinance for the purchase of Manganese steel die plates for the city rock crusher.

Common Council of the city of Cottage Grove does ordain:

Section 1. That the city engineer be and is hereby instructed to purchase one set of Manganese steel die plates for the city rock crusher, according to plans furnished therefor by the Columbia Steel Co., of Portland, Oregon, at a price not to exceed 17 cents per pound.

Section 2. Whereas the plates or dies now in use in the crusher are inadequate and it is necessary to start the crusher at once, the health, peace and safety of the city demands that this ordinance shall be effective at an early date, an emergency is therefore declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and signature by the Mayor.
