FACTS ABOUT PAVEMENTS

The Various Forms in Use and Comparison of their Respective Features Costly to Experiment.

From time to time we hear of other cheap forms of pavement coming on the market, but as with concrete, they should be proven before tried on large work such as planned in Corvallis. Nothing could be worse for the city than to experiment with pavements that have not stood the test of years, and which might result in the property owners paying every year for useless investment.

When a balance is struck between these materials as to expense, durability, cleaning, repairing, and the length of time the streets are obstructed in laying, the result is clearly in favor of bitulithic pavement.—Corvallis Republican, Corvallis, Oregon.
