MADE RICH BY HARRIMAN'S COAT

Atlanta Financier Attributes Good Luck to Wearing It.

Judge E. B. Thomas, a wealthy citizen of Atlanta, Ga., who says that he largely attributes the increase in his fortune to the financial acumen imparted to him by wearing an overcoat which belonged to the late E. H. Harriman, died suit for \$50,000 damages against E. M. Willingham and S. M. Ransom, charging that they defrauded him out of \$4,000 and then tried to have him adjudged a lunatic. Judge Thomas alleges that the trial for lunacy, though he was declared sane, injured his business and destroyed the confidence his neighbors reposed in him.

Judge Thomas says the overcoat was given to him by Mr. Harriman when the latter visited Atlanta several years ago. He asserts that through the properties of this coat he tripled his fortune in a few years and that he never went wrong in a financial deal when he wore it.

Judge Thomas says that on the day on which he alleges that Ransom and Willingham defrauded him of \$4,000 in a real estate deal he was not wearing the Harriman coat, having thoughtlessly left it at home. He is confident that if he had worn the coat he would not have lost the \$4,000 nor been tried for larceny.

Uniform Hours of Labor

A resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution granting congress the power to pass laws regulating the hours of labor generally throughout the United States has been introduced in the house by Representative McCall of Massachusetts. Mr. McCall believes the adoption of the resolution would bring about better relations between capital and labor and in time result in the elimination of strikes. In discussing the resolution Mr. McCall said:

"It would be well to have uniformity in such a fundamental factor in production as the hours of labor. If one state in a given industry prescribes a certain number of hours a week and another state a much less number of hours there will, of course, be a difference in the cost of production of goods sold in a common market."

"The producer who is restricted to work his plant a lesser number of hours will inevitably resort to wage cutting, and there should be a likelihood of strikes and other labor troubles. Where we have a common market it is advisable with regard to production to have uniform labor hours. The adoption of this resolution would in effect give congress jurisdiction over the problem of child labor without resort to evasion of the constitution."

Study of conditions in the Orient has convinced Professor Frederick Starr of the University of Chicago that Korea will, within the next few years, be the battle ground for two great wars, one between Russia and Japan and the other between Japan and China. Starr in a recent lecture justified the Japanese government for breaking its promise to maintain the independence of Korea on the general grounds that Japan is overcrowded. He declared the Russian government, humiliated over its defeat, is biding its time and making preparations to give a better account of itself.

DR. FOSTER ASKS FOR \$70,000

Says Tuberculosis Is Killing Off Alaskan Natives.

In a startling report Dr. M. H. Foster, passed assistant surgeon in the public health and marine hospital service, predicts that unless prompt action is taken by the government to protect the Indians in Alaska not one of them will be left alive in the course of one or two generations. Dr. Foster was sent to southern Alaska to make a survey of conditions for the bureau of education, and as a result congress is asked for \$70,000 for additional medical work among the natives.

"Owing to the usual lack of vital statistics in a pioneer country such as this," says the report, "the exact facts on which to base an opinion have never been available, and most of the statements have been mere conjecture. At Sitka accurate records have been kept for the churches, and they show that for a period of five years and seven months the annual birth rate has been 72.3 per thousand and the annual death rate 85.4 per thousand. During this period, with an estimated population of 400, there were twenty-nine more deaths than births."

"The returns of the United States census bureau show that in the last ten years there has been a decrease in the total Indian population approximately equal to 14 per cent."

"The very unusual mortality in Alaska—i. e., 85.4 per thousand—is to be attributed largely to pulmonary tuberculosis, and unless it is checked in some way it will result in the extinction of the natives in sixty or seventy years. Fortunately it is counteracted to a certain extent by an unusually large birth rate, but the birth rate will probably decrease as time goes on."

Marriage on \$1,000 a Year.

Eleven hundred dollars a year is the smallest income on which a man should venture into matrimony, according to the verdict of the Rockefeller Bible class of New York. This is the conclusion arrived at as the result of part one of the class' winter course of studies in "What Young Men Ought to Know About Engagement and Matrimony." John D. Rockefeller, Jr., has taken an active part in the discussions.

The monthly expenses attending marriage for a young couple of the middle class, according to the class' program, is \$102.50; rent averages \$28 a month; food, \$28; clothes, \$18; gas, electricity and washing, \$6; medicine, \$4; car fare, \$9; \$2 for amusements and church and for summer expenses \$5 a month. A young man should marry as early as possible, the class thinks, preferably in the early twenties.

Mr. Rockefeller caused laughter when he said that the best way to obtain an idea of a girl's disposition was to look at her mother. It is also important for a man to see his sweetheart before breakfast, he said.

The ordinance department of the army is about to place a contract for 60,000 aluminum canteens designed to lighten the soldiers' equipment and for use over the campfire in emergency. "Spun" out of solid disks of metal, the new canteen is so difficult to manufacture that only a few concerns have been found willing to undertake the job.

Aluminum is now being used extensively for light field equipment. Supplementing the canteen and cup is an aluminum combination frying pan and meat dish which, with knife, fork and spoon inside, folds up for hanging to a soldier's belt. The fork and spoon and the handle of the knife are aluminum, while the knife blade is made of a new noncorrosive and rust proof steel. The canteen costs 75 cents, the cup 29 cents, the canvas cover 68 cents, the pan 57 cents, the knife 11 cents and the spoon and fork 8 cents each.

GENERAL DUPONT GIVES MILLIONS

Will Devote His Large Fortune to Highway Philanthropy.

General T. Coleman du Pont, president of the Du Pont Powder company, will give away much of his fortune for building roads for Delaware. While that state will be the chief beneficiary, adjoining states will be benefited. It being his intention to continue his highways into other commonwealths.

The general himself made the announcement. He has decided to do this rather than to leave a big fortune to his children. "One million dollars will keep a family well," he said. "By spending the remainder of my possessions I can do my state great good."

"I believe good roads will do more good than libraries, hospitals, and in fact than any of the usual forms of philanthropy," he added. General du Pont has asked Governor Pennell to call a special session of the legislature to pass amendments to the law enacted at the last session which empowers General du Pont to build a \$2,000,000 boulevard as a gift to the state. The extraordinary session will be called if two-thirds of the legislators agree in writing to pass the desired amendments. The amendments will give the donor authority to extend the proposed highway of 103 miles into other parts of Delaware in addition to making the beginning of its construction this year a possibility. A poll will shortly be taken.

Dealing With China.

The state department at Washington has fallen in easily with the plans of Yuan Shih Kai and President Sun of China and will instruct its officials in China to do business in a provisional way with Yuan in the north and Sun in the south until a complete fusion of the two elements is effected, when the regular government of all China will be duly recognized.

While a provisional government is being established all ministers accredited by China to foreign governments will act provisionally as diplomatic representatives and continue to perform their duties as heretofore.

All members of the legation staff and consular officers in the United States will temporarily retain their present posts.

It is not yet known whether the appointment of Alfred Sze to be minister to Washington, which was made in the last days of the tottering dynasty, will stand. The belief is that he will give place to some pronounced republican.

The Ching Hwa Republic is the official name of the new Chinese republic as duly certified to the state department. Ching Hwa means Chinese.

New Jersey will spend \$50,000 in further stocking the state with English pheasants, Hungarian partridges, quail and deer. An order has already been placed for 6,000 English pheasants and 1,000 Hungarian partridges. The game will be delivered next March.

DEATH CHAIR IS A BIRD CAGE

Ohio Convict Runs Singing School for Canary Birds.

In the death chamber of the Ohio penitentiary, with the electric chair and the old gallows near by, John Atkinson, a Cuyahoga county prisoner, is conducting the largest and most scientific canary bird farm in the state. Every bird raised in the old death chamber is taught to sing by the use of a phonograph.

Atkinson was received at the prison fifteen years ago from Cleveland to serve fifteen years for robbery. Before his sentence expired he killed a guard, was tried in Columbus and sent back to the penitentiary for life.

Three years ago Atkinson was made guard runner for the annex where condemned prisoners are kept awaiting execution. He was confined in the death chamber and soon realized that he would become insane if he did not have something to occupy his mind. He asked Warden Jones to be allowed to have canaries in the death chamber "to help pass the time," and the request was granted.

Although most visitors at the penitentiary abhor the death chamber and a sight of the electric chair, the birds don't mind it at all. In fact, they delight in sitting on the electrodes of the chair and singing songs of love to their mates.

Taft For Peace.

It was only by the exercise of rare discretion and tact that war was averted with Mexico nearly a year ago. Had President Taft yielded to the demands of some of the "Jingoes" of the country the United States might easily have been plunged into a conflict with its neighbor over fancied wrongs. Without permitting the rights of American citizens to suffer in any respect, Mr. Taft handled a ticklish diplomatic situation with such good judgment that trouble was averted and the friendly relations with Mexico were undisturbed.

Taft's Anti-trust Record.

In the real prosecution of the trusts the administration of President Taft has established a record that is far beyond that of any of his predecessors. Big combinations have been brought to the bar of federal justice, their promoters have been fined for disobeying the Sherman anti-trust law, and the controlling corporations have been disintegrated. The record of the Taft administration stands unequalled in its curbing of illegal combinations and monopolies.

Sam (Sandow) Mertes, an old time National league baseball player, has been named as one of the umpires who will officiate in the Pacific league at San Francisco during the season of 1912. Mertes became famous as left fielder of the New York Nationals in 1904-5. His last engagement in fast company was with the Toronto club a few seasons ago.
