Two years ago the question was again agitated and considerable work was done toward bringing it before the voters at the election of that year, but the matter was allowed to lapse, as developments showed that it was an inopportune time.

THE CHINESE MISSIONARIES

TRIALS MET DURING RECENT REVOLUTION.

Letter Written by One Who Was on the Spot During the Uprising.

The crew rowed. At the end of the voyage when the captain wanted a little extra for wine money saying that they had worked hard I laughed at him and told him that he and his men rowed as long as we were awake and when they thought we were asleep they retired for the night and let their women row and that about five in the morning they started to row again, while the women got breakfast, and began to chat a river song very loud to let us know that they were at work. That was the truth.

With daylight Sunday the 19th we cut loose to allow the oars more liberty and soon were passing where we were caught in the disastrous typhoon two years ago and had such a wonderful escape. All along the banks villages had out flags warning the river pirates that they would get a warm reception if they began to loot. Without the least danger we arrived at Foochow soon after dinner time. After a few days as guests with our family divided up we were offered the option of having some rooms in the press building, outside the Mission Compound, as we were the largest family. This we gladly accepted and went right to work to get the rooms scrubbed and white washed. The Foochow missionaries vied one with the other to supply us with bits of furniture and necessities so that we were nicely fixed up for refugees.

On Monday night the 20th I went into the city and visited the hospital by the scene of battle where the Red Cross was attending to the wounded and where I took a turn of duty. From there I went to the hill where the revolutionary battery had been stationed and looked down upon the spur of a valley that came to the base of the hill and up which the Manchus crept among the houses to make their one attempt at recapture. An attempt which if it had been pushed home by resolute men would have succeeded as the rebels stood up on the side and top of the little hill without protection and there received their greatest punishment. After the fighting was all over for a few days they started in and turned up a good sized furrow and when asked why they did it they replied, "We have been told that we should have done that first so have been ordered to do it now." From there I went into the grounds of the large law school where many buildings had been gutted by fire caused by the shells. Pieces of shells and of shrapnel, and clips of Mauser cartridges and other battle mementoes were still in evidence and I secured quite a few. Then I went through the burned district to the empty yamen of the Tartar General, then to the Water Gate which was burned and hammered by shrapnel and from there home. Surely war is a desolation. Getting back I went on guard duty until midnight with a blue-jacket.

As I gathered the history of the events it ran something like this: With the outbreak of the revolution, the Yangtze and anti-Manchu spirit quickly arose here and in secret the word to prepare for a rising was passed along. Many of the mission school boys had been drilling for months. The Chinese part of the soldiers it was known would go over to the revolutionists at any time needed, but the Chinese General himself did not go over until the evening previous to the battle. The Manchus General made threats that if the rebels opened fire he would burn down the whole city. As the rebel party grew they opened negotiations for a peaceful surrender of the government. As the power of the rebels became manifest the Viceroy with all the other officials except the Tartar General were willing to surrender. This General was going to blow up the big powder magazine near the North gate close by the Anglican hospital if things went against him. The rebels maneuvered and peacefully got hold of this magazine and moved the powder. They gave out that if the government did not surrender they would open fire. At this the city began to pour out its inhabitants far and near. Streams, human streams, day by day marched out. Going out to the old family homes in the out villages and others came to Nan-tai island and had to pay fabulous prices for rooms. The Manchus were threatened with death by their General if they moved out. I am informed that those of the Manchus that escaped outside of the walls by one gate had all their property stolen from them by the villagers.

When the fighting began the Viceroy hung himself. When the fighting was over the Tartar General could not be found for a time but finally four boys, one of whom belonged to our Academy, recognized him though disguised and threatened to throw an empty tin can at him if he did not surrender and follow them. He surrendered thinking it was one of the bombs of the bomb brigade.

gade. Thus the mighty fell to children. He was imprisoned for a time but such pressure was brought to bear on the leaders that he was executed. He had been thoroughly hated by all under him and his reputation was such that it was thought that there would be no real peace until he was dead. Great sorrow was expressed for the Viceroy as he was well liked.
