of the family. Upon discovering Mr. Ohlsen seated by the fire, Humphrey displayed marked nervousness and refused to talk. Asked about his business Humphrey said that he desired to rent a certain house owned by Ohlsen and situated on a piece of land adjoining the Ohlsen home. When informed that the house in question was not for rent Humphrey became angry and left the premises. He later rented another residence a few rods from the Ohlsen home, where he lived for several months.

During the Humphrey residence in Hayhurst valley they were continually in trouble with their neighbors, and upon many occasions were charged with the theft of sheep. They escaped prosecution through the aid of friends. Just prior to leaving Hayhurst the Humphreys engaged in an altercation with Ohlsen over a small parcel of land, with the result, Ohlsen says, that he was attacked and threatened with death. A man of unusual strength, Ohlsen succeeded in standing off his opponents and holding the land under dispute.

Mr. Ohlsen says that the brothers were very devoted to each other and had few friends in the vicinity of their home.

UNITED STATES FLAG HAS TWO MORE STARS

HOW IT WILL LOOK AFTER THEY HAVE BEEN ADDED.

Admission of States of Arizona and New Mexico Makes Change Necessary.

With the admission of New Mexico and Arizona into the union of states, two more stars must be added to the union or blue field of the national flag. Under the law the change cannot be made, however, before July 4 next, notwithstanding actual statehood will be accomplished before that date.

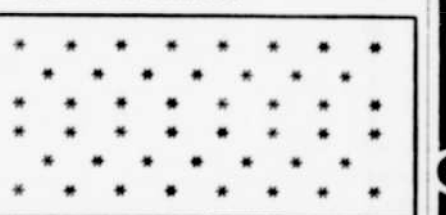
The law governing the subject is contained in the act of congress approved April 4, 1818, and embodied in section 1792, revised statutes. That act provides as follows:

"On the admission of a new state into the Union one star shall be added to the union of the flag, and such addition shall take effect on the 4th day of July then next succeeding such admission."

Since July 4, 1896, the official arrangement of the stars in the blue field of the flag has been such as to permit the addition of more stars without destroying the symmetry of the approved design. In none of the acts of congress relating to the flag has the manner of arranging the stars been prescribed. Before the date named there was a lack of uniformity in the matter. After July 4, 1896, when Utah was admitted to the Union, the forty-five stars in the flag were arranged in six rows, the first, third and fifth rows having eight stars each and second, fourth and sixth rows seven stars each.

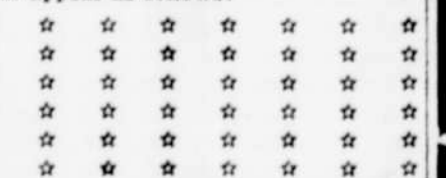
In 1908 a rearrangement of the stars was made by a joint board of army and navy officers to meet the case of Oklahoma and went into effect July 4 of that year. Under that arrangement, which will prevail until the stars for New Mexico and Arizona are added, there are eight stars in the first, third, fourth and sixth rows and seven stars in the second and fifth rows.

The present official arrangement of the stars is as follows:



When the army and navy board rearranged the stars in 1908 to meet the case of Oklahoma it did so with full consideration of possible future changes involved in the eventual admission of additional states, with special reference to the cases of New Mexico and Arizona. Therefore the admission of New Mexico and of Arizona call for no radical rearrangement of the general design, but simply the addition of stars to the two rows which are ready for them.

Although not actually settled, the probability is that the star for New Mexico will be placed at the end of the second row and the Arizona star at the end of the fifth row. If that plan is carried into effect the field of the flag after both states are admitted will appear as follows:



It is said at the war department that the change in the flag to meet the cases of New Mexico and Arizona does not involve much physical labor and can be accomplished easily before the 4th of July. All the national flags are made of bunting, and the work is done under government auspices. The stars simply are sewed on the blue field. What will be required is to rearrange the stars on the flags in stock and to issue them in place of the present flags now in use by the army, navy and marine corps and other branches of the government service.
