By comparing conditions in progressive Oregon with those of the old Mitchell days, Rube Hilen and John Bovington tonight won the debate on judicial recall from Ralph Moore and C. E. Spencer of Oregon by unanimous decision of the judges. Washington supported the affirmative of the question.

Spencer, for Oregon, is a strong speaker, but lost out when he acknowledged the benefits of the recall and proposed that the Legislature, not the people, exercise it. Both Bovington and Hilen were forceful speakers for Washington, lead by Yell-leader Will Harsley. A large body of college rooters howled their approval at timely hits.
