THE WORLD'S MOST PERFECT EAR OF CORN

The Unique Story of its Discovery

PLANS FOR THE GREAT
NATIONAL CORN SHOW IN 1913

saw it, and looked it over, that I held the trophy winner in my hand. So much so that when I left for Omaha to exhibit the ear, I took it out of my grip and showed it to the station agent with the words, 'That's the ear I'm going to win the \$1,000 trophy with.' So there's the story of the champion ear as Palin told it himself. And on

the strength of it who will say that Fred C. Palin doesn't justly merit the title, 'The Man who Knows Corn'?

But that's not all of Palin's story. He tells it willingly, though modestly, for he knows that his story whenever told is a source of great encouragement to the thousands of farmers who never had a better chance than he had himself. Palin was born and brought up on a farm near Newtown, Ind. He has never owned a foot of farm land in his life, and the 360-acre farm on which the champion ear of corn which won the Kellogg trophy was grown is a rented farm.

Mr. Palin's real experience as a

farmer began about sixteen years ago. He had been on the road as a grocery salesman, when he took a notion that he would rather be an agriculturist, so he took a few short courses at Purdue University and rented a portion of the farm he now occupies. Nine years ago he began carefully breeding this new variety of corn. For two years he planted two rows of Reid's Yellow Dent, then two of Alexander's Gold Standard, detasseling the Gold Standard for seed only the ears carrying the characteristics he wanted to reproduce, planting these in breeding plots and maintaining careful selection, so that in nine years' time he had developed a well-settled type.

The Palin champion ear was the first winner of the W. K. Kellogg National Corn trophy, a handsome silver and enamel cup made by Tiffany of New York at a cost of \$1,000. Mr. Kellogg naturally has a deep interest in the development of the higher grades of corn, for the company of which he is president requires ten thousands bushels of corn a day for the making of its product. The Kellogg trophy was offered to be awarded in annual competition for the best single ear of corn until won twice by the same producer. The fact that the Kellogg product is made only from selected white corn, while the winning ear was of a pronounced yellow type, was a peculiar feature.

The Kellogg trophy was won in 1910 at Columbus, Ohio, by R. A. James of Charleston, Ill., with a magnificent ear of Reid's Yellow Dent, but not so perfect an ear as that which originally won the trophy and which has become known as 'the best ear of corn ever grown.'

CRESWELL LORANE ROAD

Business Men of Creswell Dig Up
Requisite Damages to As-
sure Highway.

Last Thursday a few business men of Creswell made a canvass of the town and secured the amount of money that was lacking to pay the \$600 damages awarded J. Pipes, through whose land the Lorane road passes, and the road is now assured. Scott Jackson, a prominent farmer of that section, came over Wednesday and went to Springfield, where he secured \$50.00 toward the road from H. H. Ham, who owns land on the route of the proposed road, and on Thursday Mr. Jackson returned to Creswell and went with the business men who secured the remainder of the money. Mr. Jackson has worked 18 years to secure the road, and feels highly pleased.

There is but five miles to build and we have been informed that one man, Mr. Leff, who lives in that section, states that he will build one mile. A ten per cent grade is the steepest on the entire road, and this is less than a mile in length. There is an abundance of small rock at the foot of the mountain and this will no doubt be put on the road as it is built. The county court will perhaps declare the road open at once and work will start as soon as possible.

The merchants of Lorane informed R. H. Parsons that if the road was put in good shape they would do all their hauling from this point, having the railroad company unload their merchandise here.—Chronicle

Rural Carrier Examination.

A rural carrier examination will be held at Eugene and Cottage Grove Saturday, April 13th, to fill a vacancy in the position of rural carrier at Junction City and other vacancies as they may occur on rural routes at post offices in the above named county, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement, transfer, or promotion. The usual entrance salary for rural carriers is from \$600 to \$1,000 per annum.

Age limit, 18 to 55, on the date of examination. The maximum age limit is waived in cases of persons honorably discharged from the United States military or naval service.

An applicant must have his actual domicile in the territory supplied by a post office in the county for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all male citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application Form 1341 and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the secretary of the local examining board or the postmaster at any of the places named above, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Looking for Lost Man.

Capt. Metcalf of the C. A. C. has received a letter from the Adjutant's Office at Eau Claire, Wis., telling of the disappearance of William Carson Long on March 5, 1912, for whose recovery the young man's father has offered a reward of \$5,000. Mr. Long has a mole about the size of a ten cent piece on his upper arm. The family is not certain as to which arm. His hair grows in a double crown and there is a scar on the back of the head below the crown. Capt. Metcalf has a circular giving a fuller description.

A. E. Lovelace, postmaster at Elkhead, is somewhat of a poultry fancier. He has good hens and one in particular that yields eggs of unsurpassed size. Mr. Lovelace brought one of these to the Times office Friday and by careful measurement it was found to be six and one half inches around the small way and seven and three quarters inches the other. COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

(Official Publication.)

Cottage Grove, Ore., April 1, 1912.
—Council met in regular session.
Present: Caldwell, Hart, Knowles, Martin, Wallace, Wheeler, Mayor, Recorder, Marshal and City Attorney. Absent: City Engineer.

Minutes of meetings of March 4th and 13th read and approved.

Following bids for breaking rock at the quarry opened and read:
Graber and Hart at 30c per cubic yard as per advertised specifications.

J. E. Berg at 30c per cubic yard as per advertised specifications, above 4,000 yards at 27c, with privilege of using the drills which belong to the city.

Bids referred to the rock quarry committee with power to act.

Communication read from Causey, Foster & Co. stating that their bond attorney had approved the \$5,519.31 bond issue.

Walter Woodard notified the Council that L. F. Wooley had placed a fence in the center of the street in front of his (Wooley's) property and asked the Council to have the same removed. The street commissioner was instructed to notify Mr. Wooley to remove the fence at once.

The Marshal was instructed to allow Jones & Orpud more time, or until a bridge was placed in the street, to remove their buildings from the street.

Ordered that if City Attorney advises that the action is legal, Marshal instructed to have East Fifth Street opened up at once.

Councilman Martin, of the Water Committee, reported on the condition of the intake and dam of the Lang Creek pipe line, stating an extra screen had been placed over the intake so the same could be more readily cleaned, and that the dam should have some temporary repairs at once. Also that the Water Commissioner had laid service pipes since first of the year to the value of \$55.25, and the annual rental from the same will amount to about \$146.

Councilman Martin was instructed to have the dam on Lang Creek repaired as soon as possible and the members of the Water Committee notify the American Light & Water Co. regarding the rebuilding of another dam.

Sewer Committee recommended that the residence of a Mr. Peet be connected with the sewer. By motion the Sewer Committee was instructed to have the above house connected.

Light committee reported no action taken on placing light on Independence Street read at meeting of March 4th and asked for further time.

Street Committee recommended the following street improvements as the 20-block improvement recommended at Council meeting of March 4, 1912:

9th St. north 3 blocks, with macadam pavement.

8th St. north 2 blocks, with macadam pavement.

8th St. south 1 block with hard surface pavement.

7th St. between Wash. Avenue and Whitaker St. with hard surface pavement.

6th St. between Wash. Avenue and Whitaker St. with hard surface pavement.

6th St. south between Wash. Avenue and R. R. tracks with macadam.

5th St. south between Wash. Avenue and R. R. tracks with macadam.

5th St. between Wash. Avenue and Main St. with hard surface.

On West Side—

1 St. 34 blocks north from Main St. with macadam.

Main St. 94 blocks west from bridge with macadam.

The Mayor appointed the following committee on Cottage Grove Public Library: Mrs. F. W. Robbins, Mrs. A. B. Wood, Miss Jennie Woods, R. M. Veatch, Elbert Bede, Geo. O. Knowles. The committee was confirmed by the Council.

Ordinance No. 334, an ordinance regulating the speed of automobiles and motor cycles upon the streets of Cottage Grove, was passed unanimously.

Ordinance No. 335, an ordinance for the purchase of two steel cells for the city jail, was passed unanimously.

The City Recorder tendered his resignation, the same to take effect before the date of filing his official bond. Resignation accepted.

Application of Alta King for recorder read and by motion same tabled until present Recorder's time expires.

The City Treasurer was instructed to transfer from the Water to the General Fund and from the General Fund to the Sewer Fund to cover the amounts borrowed from the respective funds.

The General Fund pay to Rock Quarry Fund for the rock used the passed year.

Council adjourned to April 15, 1912, 7:30 p. m.
