DEAD MAN FORMERLY LIVED HERE

MAN KILLED IN WRECK WAS COTTAGE GROVE BOY.

Bert Adderson, Victim of Rice Hill Engine Explosion, Leaves Wife and Three Children at Roseburg.

Adderson, both of Roseburg, was caused by the dropping of the crown sheet was the opinion expressed by Assistant Superintendent Morris of Portland who viewed the scene of the wreck.

According to the members of the crew, the ill-fated train was ascending Rice Hill, propelled by three locomotives, when one of their number suddenly exploded with a crash that could be heard for nearly a mile.

Terrified by the impact of the explosion and the sound of escaping steam, the trainmen, who occupied the caboose at the rear of the train, hastened forward to find the locomotive a complete wreck.

Well trained in the art of "first aid," the trainmen worked heroically, but it was with difficulty they extricated the unfortunate engine men from beneath the wreck. Bartlett was dead when taken from the debris, and Adderson expired 10 minutes later.

The bodies of the victims were horribly mangled.

Bartlett was unmarried. He leaves a mother and father who live at Grants Pass. He has resided in Roseburg six years and was 32 years old.

Southern Pacific officials at Roseburg declare that the ill-fated locomotive left the shops at Roseburg the morning of the wreck apparently in the best of condition. It was of the "hog" variety and one of the largest in the local service.

Other than wrecking the locomotive, a car of oil was demolished and several cars of potatoes were damaged.

Traffic along the line was held up about eight hours before the wreck could be cleared up.

THEIR HIGH GRADE IS OUR LOWEST

SO SAYS F. J. HARD CONCERNING ARIZONA MINES.

Speaks Highly of Activity in Arizona Country Where Millions Are Spent on Ores Thrown Away at Bohemia.

When those mines commenced they had to haul their ore one hundred forty-five miles to the railroad at Bowie, that they have to hoist everything from deep shafts and pump the water, buy their mining timber in Oregon, while the mine producing the greatest tonnage only claims as its best grade ore that which runs no higher in value than the low grade ore in Bohemia. These two mines employ about twenty-five hundred men and with prospectors and a few smaller mines, the necessary shops, stores, hotels, theaters, etc., to maintain the workmen, a population of nearly ten thousand is found in the two adjoining towns of Globe and Miami. The talk is mines, mines, mines. And the exceedingly refreshing part of it was that everybody had something good to say about the other fellow. Mr. Hard said he liked Oregon and the Willamette Valley, but if he had to move he would like to go to Globe, Arizona.

As to the excursion, the special train leaving Portland the 12th was filled with men and women from Portland and the valley towns. A more representative or better-looking crowd could not have been gathered. The car carrying the Eugene delegation contained the most ladies, without which the Oregon representation at the evening receptions would have been rather noticeable on account of absence of the fair sex and its beautiful gowns.

The greeting of California to Oregon and Oregon to California will long be remembered and to those who formed this excursion party credit is due for a tie that has cemented the two states into a co-operation that will last. Mr. Hard stated that "with co-operation of these two states and Washington, the Panama Pacific International Exposition will not move the Atlantic Coast metropolises to the Pacific, but there will be the Boston, New York, and Pittsburgh of the Pacific. Not possibilities or probabilities, but positive results that can not be avoided are so evident to a thinking man that it is hard to get down to earth again.

"The treatment accorded the excursionists by the officers of the Southern Pacific who accompanied the party, the splendid treatment at the Palace Hotel in San Francisco, and the whole trip without a jog or a discord is long to be remembered."

When asked as to observations along political lines, Mr. Hard said there seemed to be very little market for "teddy bears."
