BRAVE HAZEL DELL GIRL BEATS SAVAGE COUGAR

Brute Had Attacked Her Little Dog and Was Killed Afterward.

A few days ago, as Miss Florence Holt was coming from High Prairie, she took a short cut across Salmon creek to her home. She had her little dog Rex with her. After climbing the a steep hill on the south side of Salmon creek the trail lies through a dense growth of fir brush. When she was about midway of this thick brush the dog was attacked a few feet from the trail, when he suddenly set up a howl as though he was being killed. Florence thought perhaps he had found a steel trap and got caught. She ran back and turned into the thick brush to where her dog seemed to be in trouble, and when she got to where she could see she was startled to find her dog in a death struggle with a full grown cougar. She thought perhaps the brute had got away with someone's trap and could not run. At the same time she saw that Rex was not match for the cougar, and she must act quickly. She looked about for a club, but the only one in sight was a dry limb which lay about three feet from the cougar's head. She sprang for that and mauled the brute over the head until it was glad to drop the dog and beat a hasty retreat into the brush.

Having saved her dog, Florence lost no time in running to C. M. Dunning's, an eighth of a mile distant, and he took his dog and returned to the place, and the dog soon found the cougar and put it on a log that lay six or eight feet from the ground. Dunning could not get sight of the brute on account of the brush, and when it saw him it jumped and the dog soon put it up a small tree, where Dunning got a long shot with a 25-20 but as the cougar was on the move he made a bad hit and shot it through the side too far back to disable it, and it left the tree and made another run. Dunning made another shot, but missed, and it took to another tree. He shot it through the back of the shoulder, which still failed to disable it, and when he went to look again he found he had no cartridges, but he saw that the cougar was going to jump, and he made a run for the tree. When it did jump Dunning, dog and cougar were mixed up until they did not know which was which. But Dunning got in a blow on its head that settled the cougar. He had only his gun to strike with. He found he had a large female cougar and it measured seven feet from tip of nose to tip of tail.

Rex, the little dog, is somewhat disfigured, but still in the ring. He has a cut on his side about six inches long, one ear is split, and there are four tooth marks on his jaw, a like number over his eye, and his neck is chewed up considerably, in a day or two he will be ready for another scrap. The parents of the little girl naturally feel pretty proud of her, and begin to think she can take her own part, at least with a cougar.

SCHOOLS SHOULD FLY FLAG

Attention to Neglect of Teachers Is Called by Superintendent Alderman.

In an article appearing in the Oregon Teachers Monthly for this month Superintendent Alderman of the state department of public instruction, calls attention to the fact that the United States flags are not flying over many of the school houses in the state although the law requires they shall be flown on all fair days.

The article is as follows:

"This office has received letters from members of the W. R. C. and the G. A. R. asking why the school flags are not flying over the school houses on good days. Why are they not up? The law requires that the flag be displayed over every school house on every school day, except in unseasonable weather. What is more beautiful than to see the stars and stripes over the school houses? I noticed that the flag was not up on Washington's birthday, nor on Lincoln's birthday in a certain city school.

"I am sure we cannot over-teach the lesson of patriotism even if we do our best. The insistence of the men and women, who know what our flag stands for and who love it, that the flag be kept flying over every school house, is proper and beautiful.

"Let us as school people, who are trying to teach patriotism, not neglect to see that the flag is displayed on all good days. Let us do it for two reasons, one, that all people may appreciate the flag and what it stands for, and the other, that we may show to the surviving members of the G. A. R. and the W. R. C. that we in some measure appreciate their services and sacrifices for the great inheritance of ours—our united, free country.

"Decoration Day will soon be here, and I hope each school will join in heartily and thoughtfully in decorating the graves of the dead, and also take part in the service. Also see that sprigs of evergreen are worn on that

day. See that our boys take off their hats to wearers of the G. A. R. button. The best we can do is little enough."

Ordinance No. 335.

An Ordinance for the purchase of two steel cells for the City Jail.

The Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove does ordain:

Section 1. That the City Recorder be and he is hereby authorized to contract with the E. T. Barnum Iron Works of Detroit, Michigan, for two steel cells for the City Jail of Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon, according to Proposal therefor No. 3254, as modified in letter of Feb. 13th, 1912, from said E. T. Barnum Iron Works, which said proposal No. 3254 as modified by said letter are hereby approved and ordered placed on file in the office of the City Recorder.

Section 2. The Contract price of said two steel cells shall be \$232, less the freight thereon to Cottage Grove, and the Mayor and City Recorder are hereby authorized to draw a warrant for said amount upon receipt and erection of said cells according to plans and specifications in said Proposal and the approval of the same by the Common Council.

Section 3. Whereas the City of Cottage Grove is without safe and sanitary accommodations for prisoners, the health, peace and safety of the City demands that the same should be provided at once, an emergency is therefore declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor.

Ordinance No. 334.

An Ordinance regulating the speed of automobiles and motor cycles upon the streets of Cottage Grove and fixing a penalty.

The Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove does ordain:

Section 1. That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to drive an automobile or motor cycle upon Main street in the City of Cottage Grove at a greater speed than ten miles per hour and it shall be unlawful to drive any such automobile or motor cycle upon any other street or avenue in said City of Cottage Grove other than Main street at a greater speed than thirteen miles per hour.

Section 2. Any person violating the provisions of Section one of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and before the City Recorder shall be fined in a sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25, and in default of payment of such fine shall be confined in the City Jail one day for each two dollars of such fine.

Section 3. The use of any such automobile in conveying a Doctor to visit a patient, to bring relief in case of accident or its use in assistance at a fire or any other case of necessity or mercy shall be considered as a mitigating circumstances and may be considered in defense in case of arrest under Section 1 of this Ordinance.
