**SYMPATHETIC FRIEND OF PEOPLE**

**DR. HILL DELIVERS ROUSING EULOGY OF TAFT.**

Friend of Taft and Roosevelt Portrays President as Jurist, Diplomat, Big Hearted, Full of Human Sympathy.

Declaring that if the giving of his life would insure to the renomination and reelection of President Taft he would gladly make the sacrifice, believing that in no other way could he better serve God and man, Dr. John Wesley Hill, personal and intimate friend of both Roosevelt and Taft, made a whirlwind campaign of Lane County Saturday, speaking at Cottage Grove, Creswell and Eugene.

In his address in this city he pictured Taft from his own acquaintance as a big, brainy, intellectual giant, judicial, diplomatic, a man with rich, red blood in his veins, kindly, full of tender human sympathy, a peace maker but terrible in righteous wrath, the most aggressive progressive that has occupied the presidential chair since the day of the immortal, martyred Lincoln; a man with a backbone of chilled steel; the man whose defeat would be an international calamity.

The speaker mentioned a dozen or more of the more prominent progressive measures emanating from the fertile brain of the President, and then showed him patiently, uncomplainingly bearing his burdens while vilified and denounced by carping critics, one of these his former bosom friend, to whose own administration he was a bulwark of strength and power.

Dr. Hill is president of the International Peace Forum. In that capacity he recently visited the Orient. Speaking of his sojourn in the Philippines, he said: "I have just returned from the orient," said Dr. Hill. "While there I kept hearing about the 'Big Brother' and I wondered who it was. Later I learned that it was William Howard Taft, who as governor of the Philippines had endeared himself to the people of the islands. He took education and missionaries to them; he taught them their games and he taught them to play fair."

"Taft is a man of deep sympathy. I know of an instance, not published abroad, for Taft does not believe in self-glorification—an instance of when he went one stormy night down to the bower in New York to address a meeting of 1,000 men. His brother and his physician objected that he was tired out and nearing a break-down. 'If there are 1000 homeless men in New York who want to hear their president, I am going,' was the final decision of Mr. Taft." There happened to be a man in the audience who had also been present at the occurrence referred to.

"The president has been made the victim of lies and malicious charges, but who has seen him drink in public or private? Who has seen him boastful? Who has found him unfaithful to a friend," exclaimed the speaker.

The speaker was introduced by J. I. Jones. On the platform with him were Senator L. E. Bean and Elbert Bede. Dr. Hill is a polished and effective speaker and has a way of getting to the hearts of his hearers that holds them and impresses them with the sincerity of his statements.

The speaker was greeted with the band at the depot and the theater was filled to the doors, although the meeting was held on busy Saturday afternoon.

**800 ACRES NOT VERY HARD TO GET**

Man and Wife May Secure Holdings Without Cost, Says Agent.

In recent advertising literature, the Great Northern Railway calls attention to the fact that a man and his wife may obtain an aggregate of 800 acres of homestead lands in Oregon without cost. This can be done in the following manner:

A man is entitled to 320 acres under the homestead act and 160 acres under the desert land act or the timber and stone act, a total of 480 acres. His wife can take up 320 acres of desert land or 160 acres of desert land and 160 acres of timber and stone land, giving the couple a total of 800 acres.

Fred W. Graham, western industrial and immigration agent for the Great Northern, who was in Portland last week, said that many colonists now coming into the state are preparing to take advantage of this liberal feature of the Government's regulations.

**OUTSIDE TERRITORY REMAINS IN**

CITY RETAINS BOUNDARIES ESTABLISHED LAST MAY.

Suit to Annul Election Voting Outside Territory Into City Limits Is Dismissed by Judge Harris in Circuit Court.

The City of Cottage Grove retains the territory voted into the city limits by the election of May 1, 1911, according to the decision of Judge Harris of the Circuit Court, who Saturday dismissed the case of Landess et al. vs. City of Cottage Grove.

The plaintiffs set forth as a cause of action that those living in the outside territory could not be voted in without their consent, whereas at the election those living in outside and inside territory used the same ballot boxes and there was no way of telling whether or not they voted to come in. It was further stated that the election would not be valid under the initiative because the election under such circumstances amounted to an amendment of the charter of the city, on which those living in the outside territory could not vote.

The case hinged on whether or not there was a cause of action.

The plaintiffs in the case were William Landess, N. P. Huff and H. F. Alden, who own property in the territory taken into the city at the election.

Thompson & Hardy and J. S. Medley were attorneys for the plaintiffs and J. E. Young and J. C. Johnson for the defendants.

An appeal is expected.
