SELLING DEFEATS SENATOR BOURNE

Bourne Wins in Multnomah But Outside Counties Overcome His Lead.

Ben Selling was successful in winning the Republican nomination for United States senator over Senator Jonathan Bourne, the present incumbent.

There were many surprises in the vote and Selling was victorious in a number of counties which had been confidently counted in the Bourne column. Bourne carried Multnomah county by a substantial plurality, but this lead was overcome by the pluralities for Selling in the outside counties.

In the republican vote on United States senator Jonathan Bourne has carried only Curry, Jackson, Multnomah and Tillamook, with Josephine, where Selling leads, close in the incomplete returns. The counties that Bourne is known to have carried were all conceded to him by Selling prior to election with the exception of Multnomah.

Lowell Carries Home County.
Judge Lowell received a handsome recognition from the voters of his home county of Umatilla, obtaining a majority of all the votes cast. Judge Lowell also carried the neighboring county of Grant and also Morrow.

All other counties not mentioned in the foregoing went for Selling. In 13 counties Mr. Selling led Bourne on a ratio of two to one, namely: Columbia, Coos, Hood River, Lane, Linn, Malheur, Marion, Morrow, Polk, Umatilla, Wallowa, Washington and Yamhill.

Wasco county, which has large wool interests, gave Selling three to one over Bourne, and the neighboring county of Sherman did likewise.

The votes counted on senator now total 63,006, of which Mr. Selling has 29,597, Bourne 23,692, Lowell 6859 and Morton 2758; Selling's plurality 39,005.

Lane Democratic Nominee.

Dr. Harry Lane, ex-mayor of Portland, was favored by the Democrats for United States senator, with Walter M. Pierce, of Hot Lake, second.

Lane will probably have several thousand plurality for the democratic nomination for United States senator. The incomplete returns are as follows: Lane 5920, Pierce 2101, Coshow 2042, Miller 848. Lane's plurality 2819.

Congressional Nominees.

In the Republican congressional race W. C. Hawley, now representing the first district, has been renominated, as he had no opposition. N. J. Sinnott, progressive, has been nominated in the second district over Ellis, his closest opponent. In the third district, which comprises Multnomah county, A. W. Lafferty, incumbent, was renominated.

In the second congressional district N. J. Sinnott's lead over W. R. Ellis has not been impaired, he now having a plurality of 746. The corrected totals are as follows:

Sinnott 3404, Ellis 2658, Rusk 2178, Cochrane 2019, C. E. Roosevelt 587.

On the democratic ticket there is an interesting contest for the nomination for congress in the second district. Returns have been sent in, in part, from nine of the 14 counties in the district. These returns give Graham a lead of less than 100 votes. The totals reported stand as follows: Covey 1215, Graham 1308; Graham's majority 93.

State Officers Named.

Ben Olcott has been nominated for secretary of state on the Republican ticket, although Fields has a few counties to his credit. Multnomah county, where Fields is best known, was carried by his opponent.

Robert Eakin, having no opposition for the nomination for Justice of the Supreme Court, has won, of course.

For dairy and food commissioner, John D. Mickle is in the lead in most counties outside of Multnomah, and in Multnomah W. L. Cottle has the advantage. The returns from outside counties indicate that Mickle will have the nomination when the official vote is canvassed. A. H. Lea seems to be running third.

Clyde B. Alchison and Thomas Campbell have been renominated for railroad commissioners in their respective districts. They have held the office since it was instituted.

Convention Delegates Uncertain.

Under the Oregon system, the 10 delegates sent to the republican national convention at Chicago are instructed to vote for Roosevelt, although the delegates receiving the highest vote are personal friends of La Follette and Roosevelt. Thomas McCusker, La Follette's campaign manager in Oregon, leads the ticket among the candidates for delegate.

The delegates are in doubt, other than Thomas McCusker. Henry Waldo Coe appears to have been another delegate selected. Not until the complete returns are in will it be possible to announce the names of the 10 elected by the republican voters. The same condition exists in the democr-

ic ballot, and aside from Alex Sweek, who is conceded to be elected, and possibly John H. Stevenson, the result is in doubt.

The result as to the nomination of five candidates for presidential elector on the republican ticket also will not be finally decided until the vote of the state has been counted. Judging from the returns in this county, however, it is evident the voters very generally complied with the suggestion of the representatives of the three candidates for president and wrote on their ballot the name of one of the five following republicans: L. M. Lepper, M. J. MacMahon and Grant Thomas, of Multnomah county; William Hanley of Burns, and E. V. Carter, of Jackson.

Several Members Renominated.

A review of the result of the recent primary election on the republican candidates for the legislature shows that several members of the last house and senate have been named to succeed themselves, some house members have been elevated to the upper branch of the assembly and some in either branch have been defeated. There are 15 holdover senators. Two nominees for senatorial positions have served in previous sessions.

Democratic Returns Incomplete.

Democratic returns have not been completed. In some districts the democrats made no nominations. In other districts they endorsed the republican nominees.

W. Lair Thompson, the floor leader of the last house, was nominated to succeed himself as senator of the sixteenth district without opposition. The district is composed of Crook, Klamath, and Lake counties. Mr. Thompson is a well known lawyer of Lake view.

W. H. Ragsdale, of Sherman county, has been nominated from the eighteenth senatorial district, which comprises Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler counties. Mr. Ragsdale is prominent in his home county, and had no opposition in the primaries.

In the twenty-first district Edward E. Kiddle, a prominent business man of Island City, was nominated over E. H. Flagg. The district is composed of Union and Wallowa counties.

W. H. Hollis, of Washington county, an active member of the last house, has been nominated to represent the twenty-fourth district in the senate. His opponent was H. T. Botts, of Tillamook. Lincoln, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill counties comprise the district.

Few Anti-Statement No. 1 Nominees.

The only nominee for the senate who did not sign Statement No. 1 is J. C. Smith, of Josephine.

Among the candidates for the lower house who did not sign Statement No. 1 are I. B. Cushman, of Lane; Roy Graves, of Yamhill; S. A. D. Meek, of Washington; L. O. Belland, of Clatsop.

Supporters of the Oregon system declare that the result is an overwhelming endorsement of the system, as most of those candidates who refused to sign Statement No. 1 were defeated.

In Douglas county George Neuner, a member of the last house, defeated J. A. Buchanan, also a member of the last house, for the senatorial nomination in the fifth district.

Ira S. Smith, of Marshfield, nominated for joint senator from Coos and Curry, was a member of the house from Polk county in 1895.

In the twenty-second senatorial district, consisting of Grant, Harney and Malheur counties, incomplete returns indicate that Loring V. Stewart, a prominent stockman of Layville, Grant county, has defeated William Miller, a well known attorney of Burns, for the nomination.

In the sixteenth district, consisting of Wasco and Hood River counties, R. R. Butler, of The Dalles, has defeated D. J. Cooper, of the same city. Butler was formerly circuit judge of the eleventh judicial district, consisting of Wheeler, Gilliam and Sherman counties. He lived at Condon at that time.

Two Senators Renominated

Members of the senate who have been renominated are W. D. Wood, of Washington, and Dan Kellaber, of Multnomah.

Members of the last house who have been renominated are George W. Johnson of Marion; Allen H. Eaton and I. V. Cushman, of Lane; S. P. Pierce, of Coos and Curry; J. A. Westerland, of Jackson; P. O. Bonebrake, of Benton; Roy Graves, of Yamhill; John A. Chapman, of Washington; J. D. Abbott, of Multnomah; L. O. Belland, of Clatsop, and L. L. Mann, of Umatilla. F. M. Gill, who represented Hood River and Wasco counties at the last session, but who has since removed to Estacada, has been nominated for state representative by the republicans of Clackamas county.

S. A. Hughes, of Marion; S. A. D. Meek, of Washington, and C. N. McArthur, of Multnomah, members of the house at the session of 1909, but not members of last session, however, have been nominated. J. T. Bridges, of Douglas county, a member of the house of 1895, has been nominated for another term.

Incomplete returns from Columbia county indicate a close contest between M. E. Miller, member of the last session, and A. E. Clark and W. A. Hall.

ROOSEVELT WINS IN OREGON PRIMARIES

La Follette Takes Second Place and Taft Third; Wilson is Democratic Choice.

Portland.—Under the first presidential preference primaries held in Oregon Roosevelt was the choice of the Republican voters, with Senator La Follette a good second. President Taft was a bad third in the race, both in Portland and the state at large.

The race between Roosevelt and La Follette was spectacular, the early returns showing them running neck and neck. La Follette has a plurality in Portland and he made an exceptional showing in the counties covered in his recent speech-making tour. La Follette's recent speech in Portland, where he addressed an audience of 10,000 people, undoubtedly is responsible for the heavy vote given him.

Roosevelt ran strong in the rural districts. In the cattle country of eastern and southern Oregon he was an easy winner, with La Follette second. Through the thickly settled Willamette valley district Roosevelt also won with ease.

Governor Woodrow Wilson, of New Jersey, was the choice of the Democratic voters for president, though Speaker Champ Clark received a substantial vote in many counties. Governor Harmon, of Ohio, received a very small vote and was not a factor in the race.

Woodrow Wilson did not have a walk-away in obtaining the Oregon preference for democratic nomination for president. While Multnomah county went strong for Governor Wilson several of the other counties gave Champ Clark heavy pluralities. The result is that on the face of the incomplete returns Governor Wilson is leading his opponent by less than 1000 votes in a total count of 12,410. This total probably represents two-thirds of the democratic votes cast in the state.

The figures available give the following: Wilson 6387, Clark 5433, Harmon 590. Wilson's plurality 954.

In the vote for president on the republican ticket, President Taft apparently has carried six counties.

A feature of this fact is that two of the big stock counties, where it might have been inferred Roosevelt's interest in the range would gain him votes, have gone for Taft. These are Crook and Harney. In addition President Taft has apparently won in Morrow, Polk, Sherman and Yamhill.

There is no certainty that La Follette has carried more than one county, Multnomah. Incomplete returns on Jackson county give him a slight lead over Roosevelt. La Follette also has a slight lead over Roosevelt in Josephine in the incomplete returns, and is close on the heels of Roosevelt in Tillamook.

Roosevelt, it seems probable, has carried all of the following counties: Baker, Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant, Hood River, Klamath, Lane, Lincoln, Malheur, Marion, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Wasco and Washington.

The total vote counted is 62,805, which, it is believed, is about 12,000 short of the complete returns.

S. P. GIVES SILVER MEDALS
To Agents, Section Foremen, Roadmasters and Other Employees for Services Rendered.

Agents at twenty-seven stations along the line of the Southern Pacific have been awarded silver medals for having perfect stations, according to the decisions of the engineers on the results of the recent annual inspection trip over the lines. The Coast Division, Thomas Ahern, superintendent, carried off the honors of being the best division, both the best roadmaster's district and best section of track and roadbed being on this division.

The winners in this annual competition were announced in San Francisco last week. Gold medals will go to the foreman of the best section and to the roadmaster of the best district. Silver medals are awarded to twenty-one pumpers, to three fuel oil plant tenders and to six foremen of power plants. Forty-four silver medals will go to the same number of section foremen who have the best sections in each roadmaster's district. The list of prize winners is unusually long this year. Public Power Sites Reserved.

Acting on data furnished by field men, the United States Geological Survey took action in March leading to the creation of water power-site reserves in Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Washington aggregating 24,091 acres. The reservations are believed to contain many favorable power sites. Restorations of more than 10,000 acres of land previously withdrawn in connection with power sites were made during the month, in Colorado, Idaho and Washington. This land was found upon further investigation to be not necessary to the control of power sites.
