The Real Mexican Opportunity.

The following novel editorial on Theodore Roosevelt recently appeared in the Mexican Times, published on the boundary:

Signal failure has attended the efforts of the rebellious element in the republic of Mexico in the proclaiming of provisional president—there has been an utter inability to get one of these proclaimed presidents to do business, and the result must be deeply disappointing to the proclaimers. Bernardo Reyes has been proclaimed provisional president, and he is resting behind the military prison bars. Francisco de la Barra has been proclaimed provisional president, and has refused to hearken to the proclamation. Emilio Vasquez Gomez has been proclaimed provisional president, but he will not cross over the international boundary line to accept the job. Emiliano Zapata has proclaimed himself the official head of his revolution, and basical Orozco has virtually done the same thing, but neither has yet succeeded in connecting with the provisional presidency, and the consideration of all these developments in the situation brings to mind the thought that the trouble-makers have overlooked a very safe bet and neglected the shining opportunity which if it had been embraced would have given them a real leader and one who could have been depended upon to do things.

There is a man in the United States who earnestly and sincerely desires to be president. He is a man of prominence, of consuming ambition, great personal egotism and monumental gall. He stands for the principles of the Red Flag, in that he would destroy the existing constitution and erect upon its ruins a new structure that embraces the Red Flag principle of the recall. In fact, this great man is so strong a believer in the principles of the recall that he is engaged in an effort to have himself recalled as president of the United States for the third term, regardless of all precedent. He is a rebel, in that he has rebelled against his party leaders and is leading a fight for their complete overthrow. He is a traitor, because he is false to the friend and administration he aided so materially in establishing—even as Pascual Orozco was and is a traitor to his friend and the government he aided in establishing. He stands for a new deal and new action by the people, just as Pascual Orozco says he stands for the same principle. He stands for a government largely modeled after that of Porfirio Diaz, which all thinking men have just about concluded is the only form of government possible in Mexico.

Trouble-making citizens of Mexico, we present to your most favorable consideration this pre-eminent trouble-maker. We point you with pride to the fact that he can raise more generated unshirtd, pure and unadulterated sheol to the square inch and upon the slightest provocation of any living trouble-maker. We assure you that he has a sovereign panacea for every ill that afflicts the Mexican nation from national ennu to Spanish itch, and that if he is called to Mexico there will be something doing in the republic from the very date of his arrival.

Novel Banking System Proposed

Farmer Offers Novel Solution of Road Problem

(Oregon Journal.)

William J. Scott, a farmer residing in Antioch precinct, near Central Point, has evolved a plan of banking and bonding which, if it could be put in operation in every county of every state in the union, he and his friends believe, would provide an elastic currency, obviate panics and break the grip of the money trust.

The plan has been submitted to competent lawyers, and they believe that it is not only possible under the national banking laws, but that it will bear every test which may be made to determine its constitutionality.

As to the feasibility or practicability of his plan, neither he nor anyone to whom he has submitted the scheme has any doubt. An effort will be made to get the plan before the people of Oregon as an initiative measure at the coming general election.

Mr. Scott admits that his plan did not spring from his brain full fledged, but that it had its inception in and its gradual growth since the attempt to bond Jackson county for \$1,500,000 for road improvement last September. The issue carried by an overwhelming majority, but was declared invalid by the state supreme court because it was not voted at a general instead of a special election.

The plan advanced by the Antioch farmer was first formulated with the idea of getting money for good roads for Jackson county at as small an expense as possible to the taxpayers, but when he had it worked out he found that what he proposed would, if generally adopted, revolutionize the banking system of the country.

Instead of issuing \$1,500,000 in 20-year interest bearing bonds, meaning a total to pay, with interest for 20 years at 6 per cent, of \$3,300,000, Mr. Scott proposes to take advantage of existing federal banking laws by having the people of Jackson county vote non-interest bearing bonds, to run 20 years or more, for the total amount of \$3,300,000, deposit these bonds in the United States treasury at Washington as security, and then take out a national bank charter in the name of "The Taxpayers' National Bank of Jackson County, Ore." have the treasury department issue national bank notes to the amount of \$3,300,000, which the people of Jackson county, under the national banking law, could use for 20

years, in perpetuity or as long as they wished to retain their national bank charter.

For the use of this money the bank would have to pay nothing, having the same privileges that are extended to other national banks. The people would own the bonds themselves, with the assessed valuation of Jackson county, at present \$38,000,000, and all the great natural resources, agricultural, mineral, timber and water power, together with the industry, intelligence and integrity of every good man and every good woman in Jackson county back of the bonds.

To show how the plan would work out in actual practice Mr. Scott says: "Taking \$3,300,000 for a round number as the amount desired by the people of Jackson county or any other county for good roads, it would cost the people in interest alone on 6 per cent bonds, under the present system on bonding, \$198,000 per year. On the contrary, under the plan which I propose, the people would have \$3,300,000 in bank notes issued on the bonds, on which they would pay no interest, saving \$198,000 per year in interest alone. Such money as was not paid out for road improvement or other purposes could be loaned to the local banks or to others on good security at a low rate of interest.

"The tables would be turned, and money would become the slave of the people instead of the people being slaves to it, as they are to a great extent now, and as they would be to a still greater extent if such a bond issue as was proposed in Jackson county last fall were put into operation."

"The people of any county or state which adopts the plan, at any time they see fit to retire their bond issue, may do so in the following manner: Assuming the amount of the issue to be \$3,300,000, the people may tax themselves to the extent of \$165,000 a year, less than the amount that would have been necessary to pay the interest and maintain a sinking fund on a bond issue of \$1,500,000, and in 20 years they would be able to turn the entire amount of \$3,000,000 over to the government, it having cost them nothing in interest, and they having had twice the benefit that they would have had under an ordinary bond issue for \$1,500,000.

"At the present assessed valuation

of Jackson county, approximately \$38,000,000, an annual levy of 4 1/2 mills would take care of a bond issue of \$3,300,000 in 20 years and give a small surplus each year. This levy would be annually decreased by the increase in assessed valuation. Having recalled their bank notes to the Taxpayers' National Bank at the rate of \$165,000 per year for 20 years, or having recalled them all at the end of the 20 years, the people could then return the \$3,300,000 in bank notes to the government, surrender their charter, receive their cancelled bonds and go out of the banking business—if they wished."

Mr. Scott, the father of the plan, makes no claim to legal learning. He lives in comparative retirement on his 1365-acre ranch on Rogue river, 14 miles north of Medford. He has read practically no books on political economy or economic questions. He has simply worked out his plan of the Taxpayers' National Bank from ideas given him by the proposed bond issue for good roads in Jackson county last fall. He is an ardent good roads advocate. He believes that his plan is the way to get them and also to solve the financial problem.
