SHOPLIFTERS CAUGHT WITH GOODS

KEPT LEDGER ACCOUNT OF GOODS STOLEN AND VALUE.

Every Store of the City and Many in Eugene Victimized by Women With Deft and Quick Fingers.

They had been at The Toggery every day of the week previous, but they were not discovered until this occasion. When the couple left the store, Miss Bartell noticed that one of the women had so much stuff under her coat that she could hardly get out of the door.

She watched the women go down the street, then Marshal Snodgrass was called, and he caught them at the depot preparing to leave with their stolen goods. He searched the suit case carried by one of them and found the stuff that had been taken that morning.

The woman told him just where each article came from. He appropriated the goods, and as no complaint had been made against the women, they were allowed to go, after being searched. Mr. Snodgrass then went on a delivering trip, and most of the merchants were surprised to see the goods being returned, as none of them had missed the things that were brought back. The Toggery has had returned to it a \$25 plume that was stolen over a month ago, but Miss Bartell and her mother went up into the Row River country to get it.

Previous to discovery of these women, Miss Bartell had suspected another woman of the theft. The father of one of the girls also brought in a grip of goods Monday, which he secured as soon as he heard what his daughter had been doing.

All kinds of stories have been circulated as to their operations since the discovery of the women. One of the boldest things they did was to steal some rings from Scholl's jewelry store and take them to Madsen's to be engraved. They also stole a pair of shoes at Rees-Wallace's while the clerks set to watch them had their eyes on the woman who purloined the goods. She did it so smoothly that the theft was not noticed until after they had left the store.

The ledger which the women kept showed that much of the stuff had been secured from Eugene stores. The ledger was among the things taken from The Fair Store. As no complaint had been sworn out against the women, the marshal did not molest anything except that belonging to local people.

It is understood that all goods stolen have been either returned or paid for.
