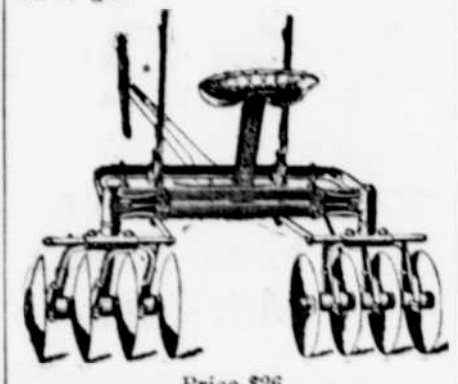

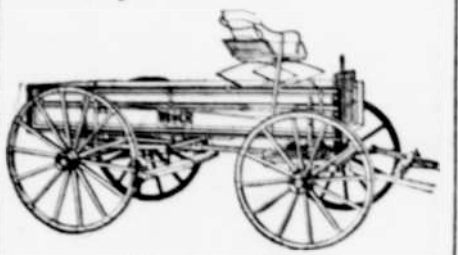

Be persistent in your advertising; the hardest thing to find today is yesterday's newspaper.

Salesmanship constitutes nine-tenths man, one-tenth territory and product.

The hardest thing for a man to organize is himself.

Enthusiasm is necessary to the success of any business. The man who thought out the slang phrase, "Always on the job," did a good day's work right there.

Make your copy interesting. If the reader does not finish your advertisement after starting to read it, don't blame him; blame yourself. He gave you the chance and you failed to make good.

Death of Lane County Pioneer.

The following is an account of the death of a Lane county pioneer, from the Grant County Ranger:

Robert Arbuckle passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Christina Mulkey, on Pass Creek Wednesday morning, April 17, 1912, after an illness of only a few days, old age being the principle cause of his death.

Mr. Arbuckle was born at St. Louis, Missouri, June 25, 1819, and spent the early part of his life there, where he was married to Miss Rhoda McDonald. In or about 1850 they came to Oregon and settled in the Willamette valley and after spending a number of years there they came to eastern Oregon and settled in Grant county some 20 odd years ago and have lived here off and on ever since, spending the past few

years with their children, as they were too feeble to be left alone.

To this union six children were born, one daughter having preceded Mr. Arbuckle to the great beyond a number of years ago, leaving aside from a wife who is 86 years, old three daughters, Mrs. Christina Mulkey of Long Creek, Mrs. Jane Gates of Ashland and two sons, Joseph, whose address is unknown and Thompson of Cullisac, Idaho.

Had he lived Mr. Arbuckle would have been 93 years old in June, an age which very few people reach.

Progress of State During Past Week.
