## SERVE HARD TIME MEALS

Girls of O. A. C. Cooking Classes Plan and Serve Delicious Things for Little.

In honor of Dr. C. H. Lane of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, visiting the Oregon Agricultural College, the girls of the senior class in domestic science planned and cooked and served a delicious luncheon, the entire cost of which for six people, was but \$2. It was one of their famous series of "economy" meals.

The menu included a fruit cocktail, creamed peas, lamb chops, rolls, rice, potatoes, asparagus, a salad of cucumbers, radishes, pimientos, and nuts in little boats made by hollowing out the cucumbers, with mayonnaise dressing, a lemon sherbet, cheese straws and strawberry shortcake.

Besides Dr. Lane there were present Dean A. B. Cordley of the school of agriculture; Prof. R. D. Hetzel, director of extension; Prof. H. D. Scudder, head of the agronomy department; Prof. A. G. B. Boquet, vegetable gardening expert; and Prof. E. D. Ressler, director of the summer session.

At the same time another group of seniors served a luncheon to eight of the faculty women, costing but 18 cents a plate. They gave the guests a fruit cocktail, creamed peas and shrimps, rolls, rice, potatoes, asparagus, cucumber and radish salad, a lemon ice with ginger nuts and coffee.

## Small Town Worth Living In.

Collier's Weekly has for some time past been publishing stories of towns that are worth living in, and is undoubtedly doing a good deal to awaken civic pride. Here is a description of one of these towns, which has many advantages not possessed by places much more pretentious: "A certain country town has 2,500 population, is not the county seat, is more than 40 miles from the nearest city, and depends almost entirely upon the neighboring farms for its prosperity. In appearance this town differs little from a thousand others of its class, except that the three garages are a surprise, and the lawns and houses might be remembered as neater and more trim than ordinary.

"Ask a question and it leads you far. You notice, perhaps, that the press of the country paper is run by an electric motor. The power and light plant is the property of the town, and pays a revenue of \$500 a month into the public treasury.

"The heating plant for downtown stores is also owned by the people. It utilizes steam waste from the power plant and cuts the merchant's fuel bill in half. A country physician's son, who in this little town is now completing a \$50,000 hospital for general practice, suggested that the steam be connected with the water system, so that if the water pipes ever become infected they may be sterilized with live steam.

"To this municipal light, water and heating plant is attached a private ice factory which sells pure ice made from sterilized water at 45 cents a hundred pounds. A wholesale ice cream factory—buying real country cream to sell again for 80 cents a gallon—uses the cold salt water from the ice plant.

"Helpful co-operation is found in other fields. "Uncle John Mower, a farmer now comfortably rich and with spare time to improve his 'form' in horseshoe quilts, uses his little fortune as a private remedial loan fund for the townspeople who long to own a home; and the woman who makes quilts for the countryside, the boy who runs the peanut stand, a clerk in a general store, and a tinner's helper are respected property owners. The town boasts that every laborer who has lived in the place five years owns a home, and that Uncle John has never lost a dollar on many risky securities.

"Women's club meetings have time for Keats and Browning and the servant problem never needs to be discussed. In the neighborhood there are a number of the Amish sect whose daughters, as a matter of religious principle, will do the housework and mind the baby at 10 cents an hour, or \$3 a week or less—never more.

"At one end of the town is a public playground, which in the winter time is flooded for a skating rink. For a city man who remembers the country as it used to be, a visit to such a community as this is stimulating education. "The place, by the way, is Sabetha, Kansas."

## Tomato Seed Oil.

In Italy and France an industry has sprung up in the manufacture of tomato seed oil. The Consular Reports note that in the Province of Parma, Italy, 84,000 tons of tomatoes are conserved annually and the residue, which until recently was thrown away, now yields 600 tons of oil. Chemically this is classed with cottonseed oil, and it will be used in soapmaking and other industries where that oil finds uses. The extension of the tomato oil industry will be largely at the expense of the American cottonseed oil trade.

## ALBANY HAS PAVING ERA

More than 60 Blocks to be Paved With Bitulithic this Summer Under Present Law.

Albany, Ore., June 3.—Street paving now actually under way in Albany will almost double this city's paved street area, and if all of the work being planned for this summer is carried out the 1912 paving will exceed by two and one-half blocks the entire area heretofore paved. The first street paving here was completed in 1909 with bitulithic, and since then the paved area has extended every summer.

Contracts have been let already for the paving of the following streets this summer: Fourth from Washington to Main, Fifth from Elm to Main, and Seventh from Calapooya to Railroad Street. Work is already under way on the Seventh Street paving. An ordinance has been passed for the paving of First Street, with bitulithic, from Montgomery to Main Street.

Albany now has 58 blocks paved with bitulithic; the work assured for this summer will add 49 blocks. If the plans now under consideration are completed, it will make the year's total 60 1/2 blocks of bitulithic paving.

The aim of the Oregon Agricultural College is thus explained in the introductory words of the new illustrated booklet on "Dignifying the Industries" just issued:

"Service to the state in all its needs; aid for the individual in his preparation for life, and the community in its efforts in behalf of the citizens; in a word, a material addition to the prosperity, the health and the happiness of all who come within the wide radius of its influence: this is the aim of the Oregon Agricultural College. The home—the heart of the community; the marts of trade, and all the vast multitude of agricultural and profes-

sional activities which fill the larders and coffers of the world, received each year from the college gates hundreds of new recruits. They are girded with a knowledge bought by years of hard study, and eager to apply it in making their homes, their farms and orchards, their forests and mines, their towns and cities the best in the state, and their state the greatest in the nation."

## Dry Farming Alfalfa Seeds.

The growing of alfalfa on the dry-farming lands of Oregon in cultivated rows for the production of seed has been the special dry farming hobby of Prof. H. D. Scudder of the Oregon Agricultural College. He has advocated this plan widely through Eastern Oregon for the past five years, and is beginning to see practical results on a large scale. A prominent wheat farmer at Arlington has planned to put in 160 acres of alfalfa on his dry land, and has asked the agronomy department of the college for special instruction and for the best seed. Another man, one of the largest wheat farmers in Gilliam County, is to put in 1,000 acres of alfalfa this spring. The great number of letters coming to Prof. Scudder from all parts of eastern and central Oregon on this subject indicates the first great change for the better in dry-farming agriculture there.

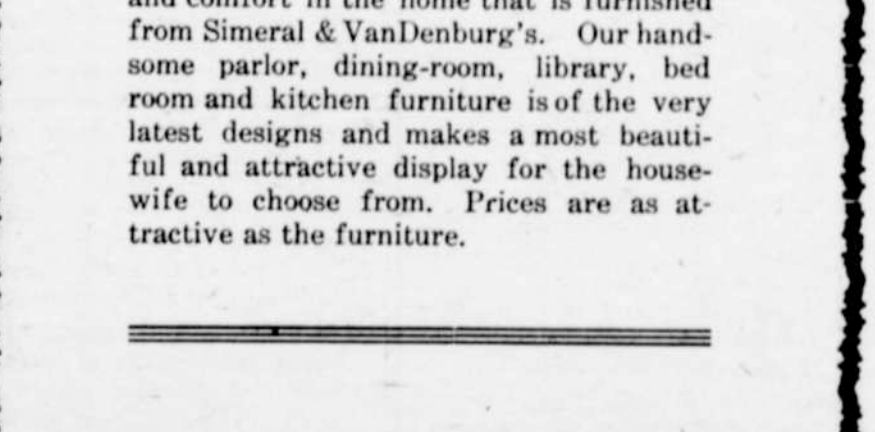
