APPEALS FOR ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL MEETINGS

L. R. Alderman Says Enough Interest Not Taken In School Elections.

Salem, Oregon, June 7, 1912.—To the Patrons of Oregon Schools: We do not attach sufficient importance to our annual school meeting. This year our annual meeting occurs June 17. On this day one director and the clerk are to be elected in every school district in Oregon, a matter of much importance to each community. I should be very glad, indeed, to find that many of the Oregon school districts were making the day of the annual school meeting an important occasion, and at the same time taking advantage of being together to talk over the problems of the schools.

The voting for director and clerk will take place at the school house. It should be remembered that women already have the privilege of suffrage in school elections. If all the women of the community will pack their lunch baskets and assemble at the school house on the morning of June 17, I am confident that the men will be there also when the sun reaches the meridian. Of course, the members of the family under voting age will have dinner. So all will spread out their lunches under some pleasant shade and enjoy dinner together.

After a good dinner all will be in the right frame of mind for selecting the officers, and discussing school affairs. The patrons will have this opportunity to investigate the conditions of the school house and grounds, and see what repairs are needed; whether the school house is properly heated, lighted and ventilated and what books and pictures are most needed. Let us make June 17 a red letter day for our districts!

BERRY GROWERS ARE ORGANIZED

Strawberry Men Form Association for Selling Product.

The strawberry growers of Creswell and vicinity met recently and formed an organization for the purpose of handling their product. While the strawberry men took the initiative, all berry growers are invited into the organization, and it is thought they will accept.

The object is to market their product in a business-like and systematic manner. The merchants of Creswell have signed an agreement to handle home-grown berries only, so long as the supply equals the demand, for which they are to receive a commission. The growers bind themselves to sell only through the merchants. This will dispense with peddling berries over town and selling berries at the berry patches.

The growers also secured the services of E. J. Moore to act as agent, and the merchants place their order for berries with him. The agent will also look after the shipping of all berries not consumed by home demand.

The growers placed an order for 1,000 crates and it is thought that with favorable weather the crop would exceed this by perhaps 500 crates. But since the rains of the latter part of last week it is the opinion of the growers that the yield will not be so large and may fall short of supplying the home demand.—Chronicle.

Tough Gypsy Gang En Route.

A. W. Fox, proprietor of a sawmill and logging camp at Curtin, between Cottage Grove and Drain, was in the city a few days ago. He reported an outfit of gypsies, consisting of four wagons, bound this way.

A few days before these wanderers stopped at John Miller's, near Curtin, and finding only a simple-minded woman at home, proceeded to tell her fortune, at the same time helping themselves to all the provisions in the house and many other articles, as pay for their services. Afterward Miller had them stopped by the officers of Cottage Grove, and they paid \$6.50, which they claimed was the value of the goods taken, and were allowed to go on.

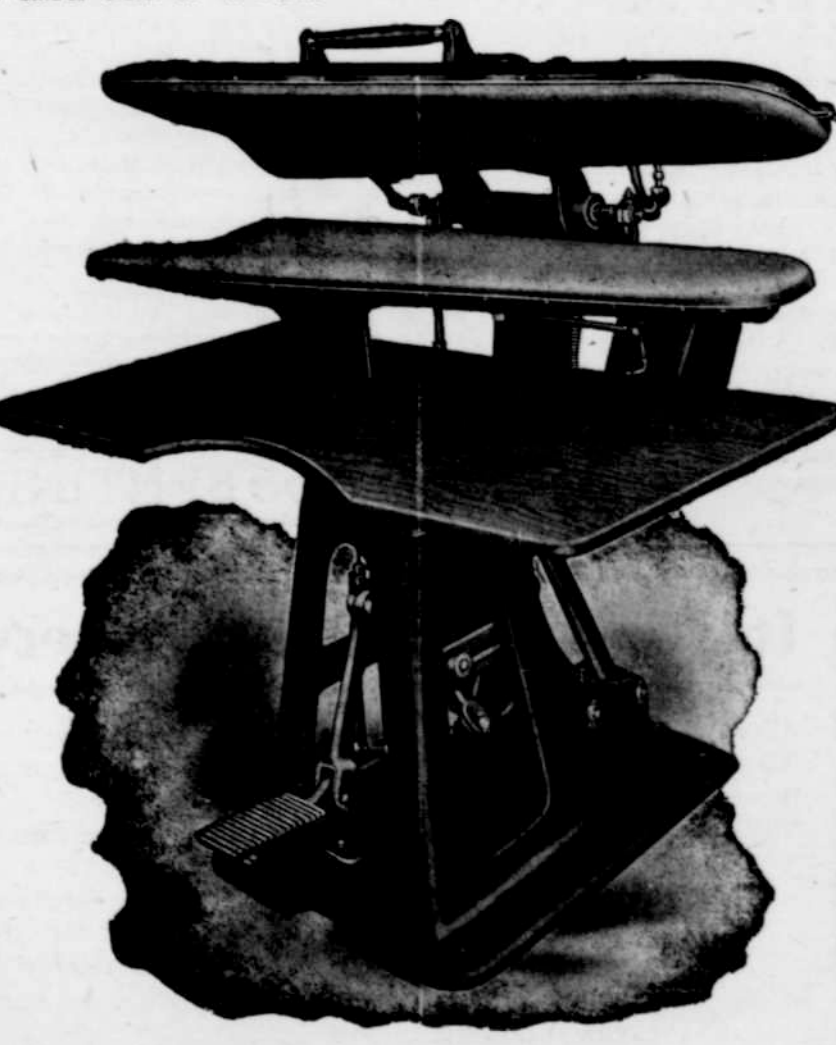
