COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

(Official Publication.)

Council met in regular session Monday, July 1, 1912.

Councilman Knowles of the Sewer committee recommended that the sewer between Main and Ash Sts. be flushed during dry weather instead of putting in gas vent. Left to Sewer Committee with power to act.

Councilman Knowles of the Street Committee reported that contract for concrete sidewalk in front of City Hall had been let to Taylor & Higgins.

Water Commissioner reported that during the month of June he had laid 1132 feet of pipe at a cost of \$203.90 and the revenue to be derived from it per year would be \$150.

Ordinance No. 344, an ordinance fixing the width of sidewalks on 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, and 9th Sts. one block each side of Main St. at 8 feet instead of 10 feet, was read 1st and 2nd times and laid over to next regular meeting.

On motion of Councilman Wallace and the City Attorney were instructed to interview property owners on that part of 8th St. proposed to be improved to see if arrangements could be made for change in width of curbs without delaying the work on improvement of the street.

Ordinance No. 355, an ordinance for the paving of alley in block 1 of Shield's addition was read 1st, 2d and 3rd times and passed.

Ordinance No. 356, an ordinance prohibiting the sale and throwing of confetti on the streets of Cottage Grove was read 1st, 2d, and 3d times and passed.

A communication was read from J. E. Ward notifying the city that he would hold the city responsible for infringement upon his patent for laying bituminous pavement.

The bids of Ambrose & Burdsal for the improvement of Cherry street with hard surface at \$1211.10 and two blocks on Monroe & Douglas at \$1948 was received. There being no other bids and the bid being at the same ratio as former bids of the company, Ambrose & Burdsal were awarded the contract.

S. J. Brund asked for permission to close up Rover Ave. from 7th street to the river. The request was referred to the Street Committee.

The matter of opening up 5th street to the river and the alley on the Knox property was brought up and referred to the Street Committee.

Creswell Council Passes Ordinance.
J. L. LaFrance Drowned.

The Creswell Council at its meeting last week passed an ordinance prohibiting the leaving of horses standing on the streets unsecured. The question of fixing the city jail was discussed and it was decided to cover the building with rustic and make such improvements as necessary to place it in a more sanitary condition.

A body thought to be that of James LaFrance, who resided in Creswell for two years prior to moving to Portland last fall, has been found on the Clackamas river near Portland. He had been missing since the first of last week.

Dougal Rankin, the crack pitcher of the Creswell team, has gone to Oregon City, where he has signed to pitch five games for the team of that place during the Chautauqua.

Ernest Smith, Frank Noland and Don Roseborough have left by foot for a trip to Odell and Crescent Lakes. They expect to cover about 250 miles and will be gone about three weeks.

Exams. for Forest Clerk.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission announces an examination on August 3, 1912, for the position of forest clerk (male), to secure eligibles to fill vacancies as they may occur at an entrance salary of \$1100 or \$1200 in the forest service. Applicants for this examination must have a knowledge of stenography, typewriting and the elements of bookkeeping and have had at least one year's experience in clerical work in a business office. The age limits are 18 to 40 years. Considerable difficulty has been experienced in securing eligibles for these positions. For application blank and full information, apply to the secretary, Eleventh Civil Service District, 224 Federal Building, Seattle, Washington.

Summer School at U.

Arrangement have been completed which secures for the Summer School a course of six lectures by the eminent and brilliant psychologist, Dr. Joseph Jastrow, author of "The Subconscious," "Fact and Fable in Psychology," "The Qualities of Men," and other works. Dr. Jastrow's lectures, which will be given one each evening, during the week beginning July 8, are on the theme "Character and Temperament." The treatment will be popular, but profoundly suggestive.

D. Adolf A. Berle of Boston will begin his lecture on the opening day of the session, June 24th, at 11:00 a. m. and continue for two weeks.

Courses of lectures by Dr. Grant Smith, Dr. Showerman, Professor Whitcomb, Dr. George Rebec; also the special lectures on Dickens and Robert Louis Stevenson by Dr. Richard Burton, and the conference on Ministerial Efficiency, conducted by Dr. John H. Boyd.

All work in the regular Summer School classes begins Monday, June 24th. The courses include work in Education, Physical Training, Biology, Latin, Modern Languages, English, History, Sciences, Mathematics, etc. A special course of four weeks duration is provided for the rural school inspectors.

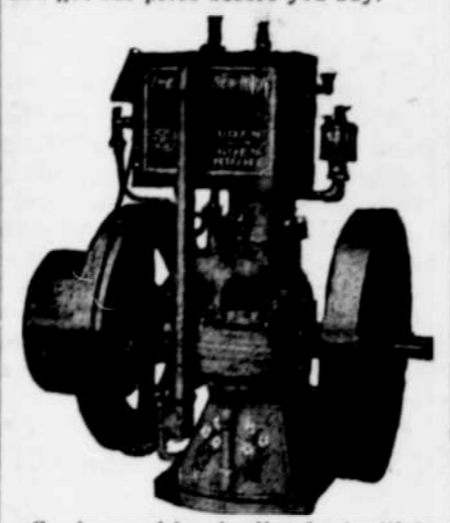

Was Not Clarence Dietz.

Ernest Chezem, son of H. Chezem, of Eugene, is in receipt of a letter from Mrs. John F. Dietz, of Maryville, Wis., relative to the possibility of the body of the young man floating down the Willamette past the mouth of the McKenzie, some time ago, being that of her son. Mrs. Dietz says that it is a mistake, as her son was never outside of Wisconsin during the past year except to Duluth, Iowa, and he is now circulating a petition in the northern part of Wisconsin asking the pardon of his father, John F. Dietz, who is in the Wisconsin penitentiary as a result of troubles growing out of a famous dam controversy in that state.

The man whom Mr. Chezem believed to be the victim of the supposed accident worked for H. Chezem near Eugene a short time before he was said to have floated down the river. He represented himself as Clarence Deitz of Wisconsin. He disappeared a short time before the body was seen in the river. H. Chezem said the man looked like a thief, but seemed to be honest. He was slope-shouldered and appeared to weigh 130, but really weighed 154 pounds. He had a receding chin and pale blue eyes. He wore clothes several sizes too large. The man, when first representing himself as Deitz, was in Douglas county, and many papers of the state printed a story to the effect that he had settled on a ranch out there. The man went to Eugene several weeks ago and negotiated for the Chezem farm out on Spencer creek, but suddenly disappeared, and Mr. Chezem is of the opinion that the supposed body of a man floating in the river was that of this man, whoever he was.
