OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Railroad Buys Land in Seaside.
Seaside.—The old Ben Holladay home here, including a section of land south of this city, has been purchased by what are believed to be representatives of the Southern Pacific for railroad purposes, and it is believed from the operations of surveyors and other representatives of railroad interests that the Southern Pacific is gradually perfecting its plans for a railroad through this city to the Columbia river.

Near Beer Only in Name.
Roseburg.—The chemist who has been analyzing the "near beer" secured by the sheriff during his raid on 10 Roseburg near beer stands and a brewery has found in several cases that the liquor contained an intoxicating percentage of alcohol. The result of no test has been exactly made known but it is presumed all the liquor contained the same percentages of alcohol.

38 MEASURES ON BALLOT

28 by Initiative Petitions, 6 by Legislative Resolution, 4 Referendum.
Salem.—There will be 38 initiative and referendum measures to go before the people of all the state at the general election which will be held November 5. In addition to these there are seven local measures which have been filed with the secretary of state.

Although the last day for the filing of petitions was a legal holiday the office of the secretary of state remained open to receive petitions.

The seven local measures which will go on the ballot in the respective electoral districts which are affected include three measures for single tax, as provided for under the county tax amendment of 1910.

The 38 measures which will go on the ballot all over the state of Oregon are varied in many details. Of these 38 bills and amendments 28 have been proposed by initiative petitions, six have been referred to the people by resolution of the state legislature and four have been referred to the people through the medium of referendum petitions.

30,000 Greet New Line into Albany.

Albany.—Midst the siren shrieks of whistles, the clanging of bells, the roll of drums and the booming of firecrackers, 30,000 residents of Albany and a dozen towns of the Willamette valley welcomed the first passenger train to be run over the new extension of the Oregon Electric Railway from Salem to Albany—a palace train bearing 800 lively boosters from Portland.

Phone Combine Made.

Medford.—The Home Telephone company, operating in Medford and the Rogue River valley, has taken over the entire plant and equipment of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company and hereafter there will be but one telephone system in southern Oregon.

LAND RESTORED TO U. S.

Judgment of \$26,250 Against Oregon Lumber Company and Others.

Portland.—Five thousand nine hundred acres in Baker and Grant counties were restored to the government and a judgment of \$26,250 was given against the Oregon Lumber company, David Eccles, Grant Geddes, Joseph Barton, Frank M. Shurtliff, F. H. Atkinson, J. R. Smurthwaite, W. A. Green and J. E. Hyde in the United States district court by Judge Bean. This judgment was the result of an agreement reached out of court by John McCourt, United States district attorney, and the defendants, who were sued for fraudulently securing patents to United States lands. The money damages represent the value of timber cut.

The defendants were also indicted on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government, growing out of the same transactions and the judgment will not in any way affect the government's position in the criminal cases. It is believed that the defendants will plead guilty at the fall term of court, when their cases are called, and ask the clemency of the court. Grant Geddes, one of the defendants, is now dead.

The transactions took place during 1904, 1905, and 1906.

Joseph Ordinance Strict.

Enterprise.—The first licensed saloons in Walla Walla county in six years opened Wednesday in Joseph. The Joseph council voted to grant two licenses. The Joseph ordinance, drawn in the years since the county went dry, July 1, 1906, is one of the strictest in the state.

ROOSEVELT ISSUES CONVENTION CALL

Document is Signed by Friends of Colonel From Forty States.

New York.—A call to the people of the United States who are in sympathy with the national "progressive" movement to send delegates to a national convention to open August 5 in Chicago, was given out by United States Senator Dixon, of Montana, Theodore Roosevelt's campaign manager. The call is signed by members of the committee chosen at a meeting held in Chicago and also bears signatures of Roosevelt followers in 40 states.

The call lays down no rules as to the methods of choosing delegates, since each state will be expected to secure its delegates by its own paraphernalia. The representation will be cut down just one-half of the previous conventions, which was deemed advisable since this convention is to be notably a deliberative body, and will be composed of a class of men altogether different from those who usually attend conventions.

CANDIDATES SET DATES

Official Notification to be Given Taft Aug. 1 and Wilson Aug. 7.

Seagriff, N. J.—Woodrow Wilson will officially learn he is to lead democracy's host in the coming campaign on August 7. That date was decided on at a conference between Senator-Elect Oille James, chairman of the notification committee, and the governor.

Beverly, Mass.—President Taft will receive the formal notification that he is the nominee of the republican party for president at the White House in Washington about August 1. The president told his visitors at Parametta that he had talked with Senator Root, of New York, permanent chairman of the republican national convention, and that they had so decided.

Hanford Character Witnesses Called.

Seattle, Wash.—Many character witnesses were called in the Hanford impeachment investigation, who testified that they had never seen Judge C. H. Hanford drunk. They attributed his appearance of napping upon the bench as merely a habit. They said that the judge at all times, though closing his eyes and seeming to sleep, paid strict attention.
