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BOSTON SOX'S STAR OUTFIELD

Stahl's Suburban Trio Greatest In Game Today.

THEY HAVE ALL ESSENTIALS.

All Three Men Are Wonderful Throwers and Ground Coverers—Speaker, Lewis and Hooper Are Also .300 Batters and Lively on Bases.

Few baseball men if any will deny that the crack infield of the Athletics—Baker, Barry, Collins and McNamara—is the greatest set of inner workers in the game today. Jake Stahl, pilot of the Boston Red Sox, is willing to concede the White Elephants all honors as far as infielders are concerned, but when it comes to outfielders Jake has a lot to say. The former banker is confident he possesses the best trio of suburbanites in either big league and, what is more, is ready to prove his claims. Jake can dig up averages and statistics by the bushel, and if you are not convinced then he will hand you a pass to Jim McAlleer's ball yard and let you look over his outfield for yourself. If

you are not convinced by that time Jake will give up and say there is no use arguing further.

However, leaving out Jake's views on the subject, as he would naturally be a little biased, it must be admitted that he commands some outfield. After looking over the other fifteen sets of outer gardeners in the big leagues there is nothing in sight that looks any better than Boston's star trio, even though Johnny McGraw will not take a rear seat when star outfielders are under discussion.

Tris Speaker, Harry Hooper and Duffy Lewis are the great Boston trio. At present Tris is the only one batting above .300, but he is making up for the slump of the others by hitting better than at any other time since he has been a big league star. Last year the entire trio hit above .300. Speaker hit .327, Hooper .311 and Lewis .307. Olaf Henriksen, the substitute outfielder, topped all three with .306.

All three men are sensational fielders, remarkable throwers, and Speaker and Hooper are speed boys on the paths. Lewis is not as fast on his pins as his celebrated compatriots, but makes up the difference by his ability to hammer out extra base hits and make them in the pinch. Lewis is the best pinch hitter on the Boston squad and bats fourth in the cleanup position. In the recent series with the Highlanders in New York he got three homers out of his system, as well as divers triples, doubles and singles.

Few teams dare to take any chances at stretching hits when these three talented outfielders are on the job. They can shoot the ball to the plate accurately from any angle and get it there like a streak of lightning. When Lewis first entered the American league many base runners died trying to take chances with his arm. After a time, however, the players came to the conclusion to use discretion when the ball was hit to his territory.

Hooper is one of the ideal lead off men in the country. He has been a little off his batting stride this season; but, though his average is considerably below his last year's figures, he gets on the bases just the same. He has an eye like Jimmy Sheppard and entices many passes from pitchers and also has the speed to beat out infield batters. He is the fastest man on the Boston team and steals many bases. As a sun fielder he has few equals.

Speaker, of course, is not only the star of the Boston outfield, but the star of the team as well. He has been a wonderful ball player ever since the Red Sox landed him and this year has been going better than ever. Always a hitter well above the .300 mark, Tris threatens this season to crack all his other high batting records. He has been batting near .400 all year and has led the American league from the start of the race. He is giving Ty Cobb a great battle for the leadership in batting, and unless the Georgia phenom gets a move on Tris may appropriate the mantle that Ty has been sporting since 1907.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

The fortieth annual camp-meeting of the Spiritualists of Oregon is in session at New Era.

A mammoth ice cavern with nine inner chambers has been found 17 miles north of Fort Rock, near Lake. Train No. 14 struck and almost instantly killed Leroy Carden at a point one and one-half miles east of Gold Hill.

Charles W. Thebaud, convicted of wrecking the United States National bank of Vale, has been granted a new trial.

Harry L. Bown, for four years sheriff of Lane county, was fatally injured in an automobile accident near Corvallis.

The Oregon Normal school has completed the first of the six weeks of its summer semester with a total enrollment of 147.

Dr. M. K. Hall, of La Grande, was appointed superintendent of the eastern Oregon branch insane asylum by the state board.

Falls City has good prospects for the establishment of a vitrified brick factory to use the shale rock found in abundance in the hills.

The sub-committee on appropriations has inserted in the sundry civil bill an appropriation of \$100,000 for Crater Lake National Park.

The annual convention of the Oregon State Pharmaceutical association met at Gearhart Park, Tuesday, and continued through the following Friday.

Records at the Wallowa county courthouse show that bounties have been paid on 461 coyotes and 68 wildcats in the 12 months that ended July 1, 1912.

The interior department at Washington is preparing details for the opening by lot of five sections of a townsite in the Siletz reservation. The date has not been announced.

The Harney county rod and gun club will receive in a few days from State Game and Fish Warden Finley some 60,000 young trout to be placed in Siletz river and its mountain tributaries.

The six elk, including the baby, which were an interesting feature of the showing of the Aberdeen lodge in the Elks' parade at Portland, have been purchased for the city park at Eugene.

Thomas Hawthorne, of Eugene, for several years in the reclamation service at Umatilla and in Klamath projects, has been appointed state engineer on the Paisley project, which is under the Carey act.

The seventh Annual Cherry fair was held at Salem on Friday and Saturday. More than 500 exhibits were made and large crowds attended both days. The cutest feature of the festival was the baby parade.

The Oregon state board of optometry at its annual meeting at Salem, elected the following officers for the ensuing year: Dr. E. O. Matten, president; Dr. Herman W. Barr, secretary; Dr. C. W. Lowe, advisory member.

With an exceptional fall of rain in the early summer and a delayed fire season Jackson county timber owners, co-operating with the government forest service, are anticipating a record season as far as small loss by forest fires is concerned.

Portland will be represented at the annual regatta of the North Pacific association of amateur oarsmen by a delegation of probably 25, mostly oarsmen. The events will be held on Lake Shangan, a few miles from Victoria, B. C., July 26 and 27.

Attorney General Crawford declares that he is confident the state will be able to carry its point in the case against the Deschutes Land company and J. E. Morson, and that the company will be enjoined from selling assignments of interest in its land on its Carey Act project near La Pine.

The strawberry season has come to a close in Hood River for this year. The total output for the valley was an even 73 carloads, 10 carloads less than last season. The shortage this year was caused by cold weather during the growing season, preventing the berries from attaining their usual size.

The postmaster general gives out the information that postal savings depositors in Oregon applied on July 1 for \$5460 of the third issue of postal savings bonds. More than \$3000 of the total amount applied for are registered, indicating that they are being purchased as permanent investment.

"The 1913 Orange," the year book of the Oregon Agricultural college, is more handsome and substantial in all its departments this year than ever before. "The Orange" was edited by the 1913 staff, with R. A. Blanchard as editor and W. S. Sibray, manager. The volume is dedicated to Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of the college.

A suit to recover damages in the sum of \$20,000 for personal injuries was filed in the circuit court at Astoria by W. L. Hurley against the Sorenson Logging company. Hurley was engineer for the company and the left sleeve of his "jumper" caught on projecting bolt ends, his left hand, wrist and arm being broken, crushed and mangled.

TORNADO HITS WISCONSIN

Two Killed, Score Are Injured, and Damage to Property Large.

Grand Rapids, Wis.—Grand Rapids was struck by a storm early Saturday which swept unheralded through the city, leaving a path of dead and dying persons and damaged property, and swept on through the state to Kenosha, where the death list was added to, where houses were torn up and fires from lightning added to the terror, and then proceeded on to Racine, where Lake Michigan was stirred by the wind to the extent that a small tidal wave resulted.

In Grand Rapids 40 or more persons were injured, one at least fatally, one man died of shock, and thousands of dollars worth of property was damaged. At Kenosha, Mrs. E. Printz was killed and many people injured.

Insurgents Decide Against New Party.

Seattle.—At a conference of 100 Roosevelt Republicans of the state of Washington, held in Seattle, resolutions were adopted denouncing the nomination of President Taft, absolving all Republicans from loyalty to the Chicago nominees and declaring in favor of nominating and working for Roosevelt presidential electors, but not a third party state ticket. The vote against a separate state ticket was overwhelming.

DENVER INUNDATED; DAMAGE \$2,000,000

Denver.—A wall of water 25 feet high, carrying death and destruction with it, swept down Cherry Creek here Sunday night, ripped open the concrete walls and in twinkling had marooned hundreds of persons. Two persons are known to have been drowned.

Mayor Arnold, who is directing the relief work, stated that the property damage would reach at least \$2,000,000.

Word of the Cherry Creek flood was conveyed to the city hall by telephone shortly before the crest reached Denver and not a moment was lost in warning those within reach. The fact that the message was received early was the means of saving perhaps hundreds of lives.

Cherry Creek flows along the northwest, south and southwest of Denver. The creek empties into the South Platte river near the city hall, which is located at the creek's edge in the northwest part of the city. The water was six inches deep in the city hall.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Harney Plans Big Show.

Burns.—Harney county farmers are preparing to make a big showing at the Northwest Products Exposition in Minneapolis next November. The Burns commercial club, the Harney county fair association and the Oregon and Western Colonization company have united in the appointment of a committee to have charge of the collection, arrangement and shipment of the samples and the colonization company has agreed to see that they are properly placed so they can be seen to best advantage.

Irrigation Work is Finished.

Hood River.—The first of this week marked the completion of two big systems of irrigation in the Hood River valley. One, the ditch of the Hood River Irrigation company, furnishes water to the orchards and strawberry patches of the west side in a community comprising 5000 acres of the apple valley land, and the other will water a fertile area of 2000 acres west of Deo, between the west fork of the Hood river and the stream proper.

KLAMATH WORK GOES ON

Second Unit of Reclamation Project Starts.

Klamath Falls.—Work on the second unit of the Klamath reclamation project has begun in earnest. The second unit covers lands in Poe valley on both sides of Lost river, the lands lying east of Lost river in the Klamath valley, between Olene and Merrill.

The Klamath project, on which work began in 1906, was originally planned to irrigate about 200,000 acres of land. Of this, the first unit, covering about 30,000 acres of the best of land, is completed and has been under irrigation since 1907, in part, some lands being added each year. It is nearly all farmed now. This first unit is in the Klamath valley, extending to the south and southeast from Klamath Falls, and lies between Lost and Klamath rivers. Another unit designed was to cover the marsh lands and a portion of the bed of Lower Klamath Lake, and covers with some high lands about 6000 acres.

Bridge Collapses and 3 are Hurt.

Eugene.—Three workmen were injured when 450 feet of falsework for a new county bridge across the Willamette river at Jasper, suddenly collapsed. The bents for the falsework were framed and set on the surface of the river bed, as bedrock was too near to allow of the driving of piling. As the next to the last bent was being raised, they slid forward and collapsed.

BANK DEPOSITS GROW

Superintendent Wright Issues Statement Pleasing to Oregon.

Salem.—Deposits in the banks of the state have increased \$6,345,125.01 between June 7, 1911, and June 14, 1912, according to a statement which was issued by Superintendent of Banks Wright. The total amount of deposits in the state were \$124,759,012.79 at the close of business June 14, this year, as compared to \$118,413,888.78 last year.

The entire statement shows that the banks of Oregon are in a flourishing condition, the only decrease being that in overdrafts, this decrease being \$283,608.48. This leaves a total of \$471,037.14 in overdrafts as compared to \$754,645.62 for the preceding year. Total resources this year are \$156,726,950.61 as compared to \$147,764,892.68 for the preceding year, or an increase of \$8,966,057.93 for the year. Loans and discounts total \$80,304,991.87 as compared to \$74,725,584.93, or an increase of \$5,579,406.94.

Bartlett Pearls Go East.

Medford.—The Rogue River Valley Fruit and Produce association sold its first carload of Bartlett pears for the 1912 season at \$2 a box f. o. b. Medford. The car will be consigned to eastern markets and is one of the earliest pre-crop sales ever made in southern Oregon.

Union Public Library Building to Rise.
Union.—Andrew Carnegie has approved of the plans of the Union public library, and the library board has taken steps looking toward the commencement of work upon the building at the earliest possible day. The building will be 47x32 feet in size.

Governor Starts on Horse Back Ride.

Salem.—Attired in sombrero and all the other picturesque trappings of a cowboy, Governor West departed Sunday on his horseback ride to Boise to attend the governors' conference to be held there August 1.
