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NEWS FROM OUR NATIONAL CAPITAL

Senate Committee Agrees to a Modified Form of Bourne's Parcels Post Measure.

Washington.—After a dispute of more than two months the senate committee on postoffices and post-roads reached an agreement on the postoffice appropriation bill, and the measure will be reported promptly.

Senators Bristow and Bourne, sitting as a sub-committee on the parcels post, agreed on a modified form of Senator Bourne's plan. It retains Senator Bourne's scheme for a division of the country into zones within which rates for the transmission of parcels shall be the same.

Senator Bristow believed the Bourne plan would place rates so low that the project would be found impracticable. To meet his objections, eight zones were outlined instead of six, as originally planned, and the rates proposed by Senator Bourne were increased.

Country Divided Into Zones.
Senators Bourne and Bristow agreed upon the parcels post zones as follows:

First zone, length 50 miles, rate 5 cents for the first pound, 3 cents for each additional pound; second zone, length 150 miles, rate 6 and 4 cents; third zone, length 300 miles, rate 7 and 5 cents; fourth zone, length 600 miles, rate 8 and 6 cents; fifth zone, length 1000 miles, rate 9 and 7 cents; sixth zone, length 1400 miles, rate 10 and 9 cents; seventh zone, length 1800 miles, rate 11 and 10 cents; eighth zone, length over 1800 miles, rate 12 cents per pound straight. Maximum packages 11 pounds.

A provision is made for local delivery fixing a charge of five cents for the first pound and one cent for each additional pound, or 15 cents for an 11-pound package.

House Censures Building Plans
Severe censure of the government methods of erecting public buildings is contained in the report of the house committee on expenditures on public buildings.

The committee points out the extravagance and waste and the possibilities of fraud in public expenditures.

The committee recommends that government buildings be standardized and endeavors to point out what it considers the folly of maintaining a big force of draughtsmen and architects to make plans for every building constructed by the government. The report finds that since 1902 721 buildings have been erected and that there are now pending bills for 750 buildings, to cost an aggregate of \$70,000,000.

The committee urges that members of congress be less zealous in their efforts to get public buildings for their districts and recommends legislation making it illegal to erect a public building in any city of less than 5000 inhabitants or whose postoffice takes in less than \$10,000 annually.

Homestead Rules Made.
Regulations governing entries under the Borah three-year homestead law have been issued by Secretary Fisher.

Credit for the three-year period must begin from actual residence. Proof must be submitted within five years. Cultivation for three years, counting from date of entry, is required, including actual cultivation of not less than one-sixteenth of the land beginning with the second year and not less than one-eighth beginning with the third year and until final proof.

Absence from the land for not more than five months in one continuous period is allowed, but bona fide continuous residence during the remaining portions of the three-year period must be shown.

National Capital Brevities.
An investigation of expenditures in the forest service by a special senate committee is asked in a resolution presented by Senator Overman.

Congressman Sulzer's bill, providing for the creation of a department of labor, has passed the house. The measure creates the position of secretary of labor, who shall be a member of the cabinet.

Investigation of federal officeholders' activities in the republican pre-convention campaign and at Chicago will be made by the United States civil service commission and will commence about August 1.

Correspondence between the state department and the British government looking to the suppression of atrocities practiced upon natives of the Putumayo rubber country indicates that the two governments are in perfect accord.

The impeachment of Judge Robert W. Archbald was called in the senate and Archbald ordered to answer the charges on July 29, the house to present its rebuttal answer on August 1, and supplementary answers to be in by August 3, when the case is required to be complete.

Brief News of the Week

The signature is impending of a pact establishing a defensive alliance between Russia and Japan.

Thirty-nine cases and 27 deaths from bubonic plague have been reported on the island of Porto Rico.

The proposition to make the public school buildings in Duluth social centers and to allow dancing in them was carried at a hotly contested school election.

All speed records for big-gun battleships were broken by the new battleship Wyoming. Her speed of 22.045 knots is said by naval experts aboard to be the fastest ever made by any battleship in the world carrying 12-inch guns.

Fifteen bodies have been recovered and many more are believed to be buried in the debris of a cloudburst 30 miles from Lovelock, Nev., which destroyed the mining camp of Mizuma and partially destroyed the nearby camp of Seven Troughs.

The plan to merge all the tidewater sawmills and lumber interests of Washington and Oregon in a \$75,000,000 corporation has been abandoned, at least temporarily, according to Henry J. Pierce, of Spokane, who has been prominent in promoting the merger.

People in the News

Mrs. Hetty Green, America's richest woman, who is in her seventy-eighth year, was baptized a few days ago by an Episcopal minister of New York in order to prepare for confirmation as a member of the church.

Vice-President Sherman, who has been ill at his home in Utica, N. Y., for several weeks, has decided, after consultation with leaders of the senate, to remain there the rest of the present session of congress.

Granville W. Mooney, ex-speaker of the Ohio assembly, has declined the post of assistant secretary to President Taft, to succeed Sherman P. Allen, of Vermont, who was nominated for assistant secretary of the treasury.

In the national typewriter contests at Spokane, held under the auspices of the National Commercial Teachers' Federation, Miss Florence E. Wilson of New York, copied 7219 words with 68 errors, from unfamiliar copy, breaking all world's records.

Sullen, unruly and a persistent disturber of prison discipline, J. B. McNamara, elder of the McNamara brothers, confessed dynamiters, has been placed in solitary confinement at San Quentin until he shows a willingness to conform to the laws of the prison.

Political News Bits

Headed by Speaker Clark, more than half the Democratic majority of the house made a complimentary call on Governor Woodrow Wilson.

Judge John C. Karel of Milwaukee, best known to the world at large as "Ikey," the Wisconsin football player, has been nominated for governor by the Wisconsin Democratic convention.

At a conference between Colonel Roosevelt, George W. Perkins and Senator Dixon, it was decided that Roosevelt would remain in Oyster Bay until August 2, when he will depart for Chicago to attend the convention of the new party.

A. T. Rogers, Republican national committeeman from Wisconsin, appointed by National Chairman Hill as a member of the Taft national advisory committee, declares that he has informed Chairman Hill that he was unable to serve. Republican political managers believe that Rogers' refusal to serve on the Taft committee indicates that Senator La Follette will support neither Taft nor Roosevelt in the coming campaign.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Indict Roseburg Brewing Co.
Roseburg.—The grand jury has returned indictments charging the Roseburg Brewing & Ice company and the brewery manager and wagon driver with violating the local option law by selling real beer. This is a result of the raid of July 3, when the sheriff and deputies raided Roseburg's nine soft drink stands and seized kegs of beer from each. A keg was also taken from the brewery and the brewery wagon. The contents of the kegs were later analyzed and said to contain real beer.

Line Will be Rushed.

Eugene.—Immediate construction of the Eugene-Monroe section of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern, work to begin within two weeks, was the promise made here by Robert Strahorn, general manager of the Southern Pacific company's electrical properties in the Willamette valley. With favorable conditions cars should be running from Eugene to Corvallis within 50 days.

TUBERCULOSIS EXHIBIT ON

Warfare on "White Plague" Subject of 7-Day Meeting.

Salem.—An exhibition which is attracting wide attention here opened Friday for the first time on the Pacific coast, the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis opened with meetings and the exhibits at the armory. The exhibit is supplemented by addresses. Further meetings of this character will mark the seven days' program which has been arranged.

W. L. Cosper, of New York, is in charge of the exhibit which is being held under the auspices of the Salem citizens' committee. The exhibit is absolutely gratuitous in every way and its sole object is to advance the warfare which is being waged against the "white plague."

Mr. Cosper says he hopes to hold an exhibit of this character in Portland, but how soon arrangements may be made is still uncertain. The tuberculosis exhibit itself is attracting a great deal of attention. Models, maps, charts and many other features illustrative of tuberculosis, its cause, effect and disastrous results from the disease are included in the exhibit.

Bank Director Wins Case.

Astoria.—The circuit court jury in the case of Frank S. Godfrey, of the Bank of Seaside, against B. F. Bartch, one of the directors of the defunct institution, returned a verdict for the defendant. This action was brought to recover \$59,275.85, the full amount of the bank's net indebtedness at the time it failed, with interest at 6 per cent from November 10, 1910.

Dredge Will go to Gray's Harbor.

Marshfield.—The government dredge Oregon is to be taken from Coos Bay to Grays Harbor as soon as the government project in this harbor is completed which will be some time in September. Engineer Lee, who is in charge of the work here, has received orders to that effect from Major Morrow, of Portland.

BIG PLANT IS PLANNED

Modern Machinery Factory to be Established Soon.

Portland.—A modern plant containing eight buildings, with an aggregate floor space of more than 400,000 square feet, will be established at the new town of Armstrong, 28 miles south of the city on the Oregon Electric by the Armstrong Manufacturing company. The plant will cost \$151,000.

The company will manufacture 46 different types of machines for use in lumbering and various branches of the industry. The special machinery to be turned out will be used in sawmills, box factories, furniture factories, pulp mills, woodenware shops and pattern shops.

The company has operated an experimental plant in Portland the past six years and during that time has turned out special types of machinery that are now used in 14 countries of the world. It is planned to begin construction on the plant in about 60 days. When in full operation the plant will give employment to about 300 men.

Havoc Caused by Hail at Baker.

Baker, Or.—Thousands of dollars damage was done by the largest and most peculiar hail storm in this part of the country in years. The greatest damage was done in the country, the storm going northeast, although gardens and orchards in the city were badly cut.

DENEEN WONT DESERT TAFT

Entire Third Party Ticket to be Placed in Field in Every State.

Chicago.—Governor Deneen and all the other candidates for state offices on the republican ticket except Andrew Russell, running for treasurer and Lieutenant-Governor Olney, who was sent out of the city, told a committee of five progressives at Springfield headed by Medill McCormick that they would remain on the regular party ticket and make their fight with Taft for the vote of Illinois. Mr. Russell informed the committee he would state his attitude in a formal letter to Chairman McCormick.

Immediately after Governor Deneen's decision Senator Dixon delivered the ultimatum that there were to be full state tickets—from top to bottom—in every state in the union. They will be launched under the national progressive appellation, except where the Rooseveltians have been able to deliver over the entire state election machinery to the new party.

Four Days For Colonel's Convention.

Chicago.—Three, possibly four days will be the duration of the third party national convention to open in Chicago on August 5, according to details decided at Roosevelt headquarters. The tickets will provide for four days, but it is expected all the work will be completed within three days.

Public Men Terrorized by Women.

London.—Completely terrorized by the suffragettes, English public men are guarded as the czar is guarded at a time of nihilistic activity in Russia. They are no longer worried by the risk of mere annoyance. They fear for their lives and the safety of their families.

THREE ARRESTED FOR COMPLICITY IN MURDER

New York.—After five hours of grilling cross-examination, in which every phase of the murder of Herman Rosenthal was taken up in detail, three men were arrested at police headquarters, two of them charged with being directly implicated in the slaying of the gambler and the third with being a material witness.

The prisoners are: Louis Weber, or "Bridge" Weber, as he is best known to gamblers, who is reputed to be the proprietor of a gambling house near Forty-second street and Sixth avenue; Sam Paul, reported to be the proprietor of a gambling place in East Seventieth street; "Jack" Sullivan, called "The King of the Newsboys," and who declared his right name was John A. Rich.

Weber and Paul are not charged with being in the "murder car" at the time the fatal shots were fired.
