REPUBLICAN PLATFORM ADOPTED AT CHICAGO

Declares Against Recall; Says Party Is One of Progress, Not Reaction.

With the exception of a few unimportant planks the following is the na-

tional republican platform: The republican party, assembled by its representatives in national con-vention, declares its unchanging faith in government of the people, by the people, for the people. We renew our allegiance to the principles of the republican party and our devotion to the cause of republican institutions established by our fathers.

It is appropriate that we should now recall with a sense of veneration and gratitude the name of our first great leader, who was nominated in this city and whose lofty principles and superb devotion to his country, are an inspiration to the party he honored-Abraham Lincoln. In the present state of public affairs, we should be inspired by his broad statesmanship and by his tolerant spirit toward men. The republican party looks back on its record with pride and satisfaction and forward to its new responsibilities with hope and confidence. Government is Stable.

The principles of constitutional gov ernment which make provision for or derly and effective expression of the popular will, for the protection of civil liberty and the rights of men and in-terpretation of the law by an untrammeled and independent judiciary have proved themselves capable of sustaining the structure of a government which, after more than a century of development, embraces 100,000,000 of people, scattered over a wide and diverse territory, but bound by commor purpose, common ideals and common affection to the constitution of the United States. Under the constitution and the principles asserted and vitalized by it, the United States has grown to be one of the great civilized and civilizing powers of the earth. It offers a home and an opportunity to the ambitious and the industrious from other lands. Resting upon the broad basis of a people's confidence and a people's support, and managed by the people themselves, the government of the United States will meet the problems in the future as satis

structive statesmanship. It is to go nolitical brought into the forefront of the na tion's interest. It will strive, not only in the nation but in the several states, to enact the necessary legislation to safeguard the public health; to limit effectively the labor of women and children; to protect wage earners engaged in dangerous occupations; to enact comprehensive and generous workmen's compensation laws in place of the present wasteful and unjust system of employers' L'ability; and in all possible ways to satisfy the just demands of the people for the study and solution of the complex and constantly changing problems of social welfare.

No Interfering with Individual Rights In dealing with the questions it is important that the rights of every individual to the freest possible development of his own powers and resources and to the control of his own justly acquired property, so far as those are compatible with the rights or destroyed.

The social and political structure of the United States rests on the civil liberty of the individual; and for the protection of that liberty the people have wisely, in the national and state constitutions, put definite limitations on themselves, on their governmental officers and agencies. To enforce these limitations, to secure the orderly and coherent exercise of government al power and to protect the rights of even the humblest and least-favored individuals are the function of inde

pendent courts of justice. The republican party reaffirms its intention to uphold at all times the authority and integrity of the courts, both state and federal, and it will ever insist that their powers to enforce their process and to protect life, liberty and property shall be preserved inviolate. An orderly method is providby which the people may, when they choose, alter or amend the constitutional provisions which underlie that government. Until these constitutional provisions are so altered or amended, in orderly fashion, it is the duty of the courts to see to it that when

challenged they are enforced. That the courts, both federal and state, may bear the heavy burden laid upon them to the complete satisfaction of public opinion, we favor legis-ation to prevent long delays and the tedious and costly appeals which have se often amounted to a denial of justice in civil cases and to a failure to protect the public at large in crim-

Recall of Judges Unwise. Since the responsibility of the judiclary is so great, the standards of judicial action must be always and ev erywhere above suspicion and reproach. While we regard the recall of judges as unnecessary and unwise, we favor such action as may be necessary to simplify the process by which any judge who is found to be derelict in his duty may be removed from of-

Together with peaceful and orderly development at home, the republican interest of general business development of closer relations between the various nations of the earth. It believes most earnestly in the disputes and in the reference of all justiceable controversies between nations to an international court of jus-

Monopoly and Privilege.

The republican party is opposed to special privilege and to monopoly. It placed upon the statute books the interstate commerce act of 1887, and the important amendments thereto, and the anti-trust act of 1890, and it has consistently and successfully enforced the provisions of these laws. It will take no backward step to permit the re-establishment in any degree of con-

ditions which were intolerable. Experience makes it plain that the business of the country may be car ried on without fear or without disturbance and at the same time without resort to practices which are ab horrent to the common sense of justice. The republican party favors the enactment of legislation supplementary to tthe existing anti-trust act which will define as criminal offenses those specific acts that uniformly mark attempts to restrain and to monopolize trade, to the end that those who honestly intend to obey the law may have a guide for their action and that those who aim to violate the law may the more surely be punished. The same certainty should be given to the law prohibiting combinations and monopolies that characterize other provisions of criminal laws, in order that no part of the field of business opportunity may be restricted by monopoly or combination; that business success honorably achieved may not be converted into crime and that the right of every man to acquire commodities, and particularly the necessaries of life, in an open market, uninfluenced by the manipulations of trust or combination, may be preserv-

Federal Trads Commission. In the enforcement and administra tion of federal laws governing interstate commerce and enterprises impressed with a public use engaged therein, there is much that may be committed to the federal trade commission, thus placing in the hands of an administrative board many of the functions now necessarily exercised by the courts.

This will promote promptness in the administration of the law and avoid delays and technicalities incident to court procedure.

The Tariff. We reaffirm our belief in a pro tective tariff. The republican tariff policy has been of the greatest bene fit to the country, developing our resources, diversifying our industries and protecting our workmen against competition with cheaper labor abroad, thus establishing for our wage earners the American standard of liv ing. The protective tariff is so woven the fabric of our industrialism and agricultural life that to substitute for it a tariff for revenue only would destroy many industries and throw millions of our people out of employ ment. The products of the farm and the mines should receive the same measure of protection as other pro ducts of American labor.

We hold that the import duties should be high enough, while yielding a sufficient revenue, to protect ade Some of the existing import du ties are too high and should be re

Readjustments should be made from time to time to conform to changed conditions and to reduce excessive rates, but without injury to American industry. To accomplish this, correct information is indispensable. This in formation can best be obtained by an expert commission, as the large volume of useful facts contained in the recent reports of the tariff board has

The pronounced feature of modern industrial life is its enormous diversi fication. To apply tariff rates justly to these changing conditions requires closer study and more scientific methods than ever before. The republican party has shown by its creation of the tariff board its recognition of this situation, and its determination to be equal to it. We condemn the democratic party for its failure either to provide funds for the continuance of this board, or to make some other provision for securing the information requisite for intelligent legislation. We protest against the democratic method of legislating on these vitally important subjects without careful investigation.

We condemn the democratic tariff bills passed by the house of representatives of the sixty-second congress as sectional, as injurious to the public credit and as destroying business en terprises.

Banking and Currency.

The republican party has always stood for a sound currency and for safe banking methods. It is responsible for the resumption of specie payments and for the establishment of the gold standard. It is committed to the progressive development of our bankng and currency system. Our bank ing arrangements today need further revision to meet the requirements of current conditions. We need measures which will prevent the recurrence of money panies and financial disturbances and which will promote the prosperity of business and the welfare of the laboring people by producing constant employment.

We need better currency facilities for the movement of crops in the west and south. We need banking arrange ments under American auspices for the encouragement and better conduct of our foreign trade. In attempting these ends, the independence of individual banks, whether organized under national or state charters, must be carefully protected, and our banking and currency system must be safeguarded from any possibility of exploitation by sectional, financial or

political interests It is of great importance to the social and economic welfare of this country that its farmers have facilities for borrowing easily and cheaply the money they need to increase the productiv-ity of their land. It is as important that financial machinery be provided to supply the demands of farmers for credit as it is that the banking and

currency systems be reformed in the

party earnestly favors all measures for the establishment and protection of the peace of the world and for the cultural credit societies and corporations in other countries, and the pas-sage of state and federal laws for the establishment and capable supervision peaceful settlement of international of organizations having for their purpose loaning of funds to farmers.

Campaign Contributions. We favor such additional legislation as may be necessary more effectually to prohibit corporations from contributing funds, directly or indirectly, to sampaigns for the nomination or election of the president, the vice-president, senators and representatives in

We heartly approve the act of congress requiring the fullest publicity in regard to all campaign contributions, whether made in connection with primaries, conventions or elections.

Conservation Policy. We rejoice in the success of the distinctive republican policy of the conservation of our national resources, for their use by the people without waste and without monopoly. pledge ourselves to a continuance of

such a policy. We favor such fair and reasonable rules and regulations as will not discourage or interfere with actual bona fide homeseekers, prospectors and miners in the acquisition of public lands under existing laws.

Parcels Post. In the interest of the general public and particularly of the agricultural or rural communities, we favor legis-lation looking to the establishment, under proper regulations, of a parcels post, the postal rates to be graduated under a zone similar in proportion to the length of carriage. The Navy.

We believe in the maintenance of an dequate navy for the national defense and we condemn the action of the democratic house of representatives in refusing to authorize the construction of additional ships.

Merchant Marine. We believe that one of the country's most urgent needs is a revived merchant marine. There should be American ships, and plenty of them, to make use of the great American inter-oceanic canal now nearing com-

Reclamation.

We favor the continuance of the policy of the government with regard to the reclamation of arid lands, and for the encouragement of the speedy settlement and improvement of such lands. We favor an amendment to the law that will reasonably extend the time within which the cost of any reclamation project may be repaid by the land owners.

Rivers and Harbors. We favor a liberal and systematic policy for the improvement of our rivers and harbors. Such improvements should be made upon expert information, and after a careful comparison of cost and prospective benefits.

Alaska. We favor a liberal policy toward Alaska to promote the development of the great resources of that district, | with such safeguards as will prevent

waste and monopoly. We favor the opening of the coal lands to development through a law leasing the lands on such terms as will invite development and provide fuel for the navy and the commerce of the Pacific ocean, while retaining title in the United States to prevent mon-

Republican Accomplishment. Panama canal, the establishment of a bureau of mines, the institution of the postal savings bank, the increased provision made in 1912 for the aged and infirm soldiers and sailors of the republic and for their widows, and the vigorous administration of the laws relating to pure food and drugs, all mark the successful progress of the

Economy and Efficiency. We commend the earnest effort of the republican administration to secure greater economy and increased efficiency in the conduct of the government business.


