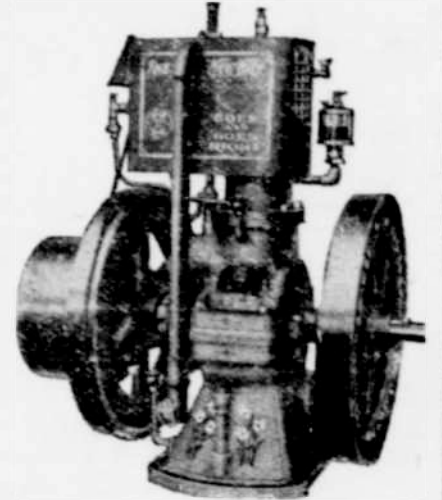

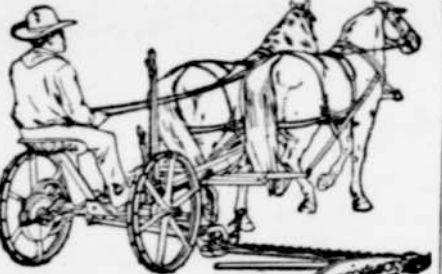

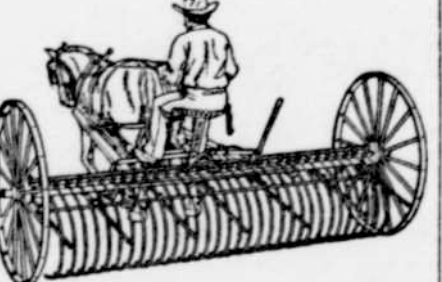

Heavy Fine for Violation of Liquor Laws.

George C. Lambert, keeper of the notorious resort at West Springfield, who was found guilty by a jury on Friday of violating the local option law, was given a heavy sentence, almost the maximum, by Judge R. S. Bryson, of the justice court. He was assessed the sum of \$400 and will have to serve a thirty days' sentence in the county jail. If he fails to pay the fine he will have to serve 200 days. This is \$100 short of the maximum sentence, which is usually imposed by Judge Bryson for such flagrant violation of the law as Lambert appears to be guilty of.

Lambert kept the road house at the West Springfield station on the P. E. & E. and, according to people who observed conditions around there, he made it a practice to serve to the thirsty wayfarers beer on Sunday, while the saloons across the river were closed according to city ordinance.
