"SAFETY" IS WATCHWORD OF SOUTHERN PACIFIC

TO BE MOVED FORWARD IN CODE OF THE ROAD
Main Safety Committee To Be Formed Composed of Five Division Superintendents.

"Safety," which is the watchword of the Southern Pacific, is to be moved further ahead in its code. It was the slogan "Safety First" that helped to make the record of "No Lives Lost Through Collision or Derailment in Nearly Four Years," on this road.

Now it will, through safety committees comprising officials and employees, try for an even better record for safety than heretofore and endeavor to prevent accidents of all kinds. As much regard shall be taken of the life and limb of the employee as of the passenger.

This move means the organization of a main safety committee to be composed of the division superintendents. Then there is to be a safety committee on every division to comprise the superintendent, members of his staff from various departments, a conductor, engineer, brakeman, fireman, yardman, trackman, signalman, bridge and building man and a shop man. Each of these craftsmen will be the chairman of another distinct safety committee.

Between meetings, which will be held every month, each committee shall entertain suggestions that will tend to prevent accidents in all branches of the railroad service. Then these suggestions are to be brought up at the division committee meeting and then again at the general safety committee meeting. If a shop employee mashes his finger the shop committee will investigate and try and find a method whereby others fingers will be protected from a re-occurrence of the accident. The members of each committee are to be furnished with a button of artistic design.

Many of the suggestions that come from the employees may appear to be of minor importance, but at the same time easy to put in practice. This is to be encouraged by the committees as the men on the line see many things that mean for safety that may be improved and thus minimize danger of life and limb.

HEIROGLYPHIC STONE IS BARED BY BLAST

Men at City Rock Quarry Make Peculiar Find After Recent Disastrous Explosion.

An heiroglyphic tablet bared by the destructive blast at the city quarry Sunday is the cause of much curiosity as to its origin. The rock was loosened from the ledge the next day and was about to be thrown into the pile to be crushed for use on the city streets, when a workman noticed that it had some kind of design or lettering on it. It was laid aside and brought to the city in the evening, where archaeologists were called to examine it.

While the piece of rock must have been in the position where found for hundreds or thousands of years, a peculiar thing about the carving is that it appears to be of Roman origin, which would indicate that this country was visited at some early date by early Roman navigators by way of the Pacific.

It is impossible to show in type the exact characters of the tablet, but they are something like this: Arm strong's pictures stand the test of time.

Lane County People Hopeful for Lumbering.
A dispatch from Eugene to the Daily Journal says: The news of the passage of the innocent purchasers' bill by the United States senate yesterday was especially pleasing to Lane county people, as it means the revival of the lumbering business, which has been practically dormant for some time. R. A. Booth of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company, in an interview, said:

"The passage of this bill is a great thing for western Oregon. About 70,000 acres, approximately one half of the Booth-Kelly holdings, are in the timber lands involved. The company was interested in the relief bill, in common with 44 other innocent holders of the lands."

The people of Springfield are especially jubilant over the news of the passage of the bill, for they feel certain that the mill there will be rebuilt at once.

BERRIES; CHICKENS PROFITABLE

W. L. Veatch Thinks They Beat Regular Farming.

"I believe I have made more off of berries and chickens this year than from all the rest of my farm," said W. L. Veatch while in the city Saturday exhibiting a this year's raspberry shoot loaded with ripe and green fruit. The berries are as large as those grown on the mother plant and attest to the wonderful possibilities of the Cottage Grove country in berry culture. Mr. Veatch says he netted \$200 from an acre of strawberries, and although not of the everbearing variety the plants are still bearing fruit.

CURIOSITY IS FOUND

HERALDRY OF ABORIGINES UNEARTHED AT OREGON CITY

Polished Corn Grinder of Ancient Origin Attracts Much Attention From Archaeologists.

While excavating for the basement of the home of Professor J. W. Gray at Gladstone a few days ago, workmen unearthed a stone which has attracted much attention from those who have seen it. It was beneath several larger ones, some of which weighed several tons and had to be blasted away.

The lower one was not broken and was found to be a relic which may be valuable. Those who have seen it declare it has been carved by hand and has been used by aboriginal people, probably before the Indians arrived, for the purpose of grinding corn. The rock is in the form of an arc of a circle and the radius is about two feet, while the diameter is four feet. It is perfect and has the appearance of being polished after being carved. The edge is perfectly flat.

Mr. Gray has had this relic placed in the basement of his house, but says that if he is offered enough money it can be removed. It has been placed so that anyone can see it.

Blackberries Wanted.

The Eugene cannery wants all the wild evergreen blackberries it can get. They are now getting ripe and some are being received at the cannery, but not as many as desired. Some are being shipped from Yoncalla. The association pays 3 cents a pound for this berry, which grows wild in profusion in many parts of the county.

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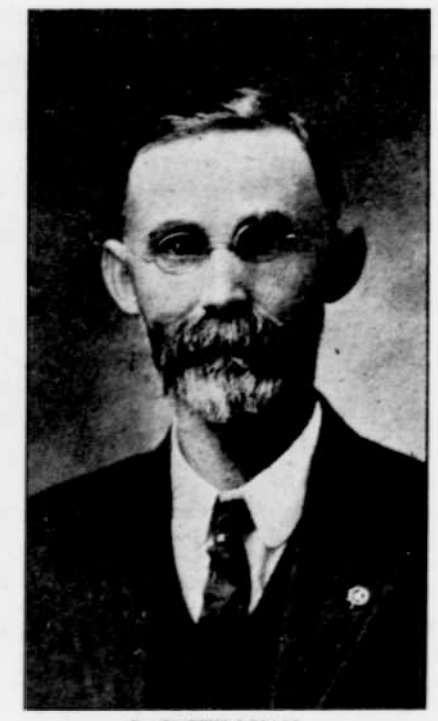
