PROSPERITY FOR VEGETABLE AND BERRY GROWERS

Corvallis Cannery Disposes of Season's Pack With Ease That Augurs Well for the Future.

The management of the Corvallis cannery is just recovering from an unexpected shock of surprise, and in its recovery it sees rosy visions of prosperity for berry and vegetable growers if they will only put out sufficient acreage to make possible a pack that will be large enough to attract large buyers. The cause for the surprise is the unexpected ease with which the season's pack was disposed of. After the output was in the cans, the manager made a trip to the wholesale district of Portland to dispose of it. He found an unexpectedly keen demand, and in less than a day he disposed of practically the entire stock. That which remained was in lots too small to be attractive, or the entire output would have been sold at once.

The Corvallis cannery entered upon the season with more or less misgiving. It was afraid of packing more than could be sold. When its salesman met the buyers a few days ago, he learned a number of things that opened his eyes. At the beginning of the season, the cannery was afraid of packing more beans than the market would take. In Portland the other day its representative received four orders for the whole pack, or more if he could deliver the amount that was wanted. In other words, he could have sold in one day four times the entire output for the season. The same condition was found to be true in regard to pea plant. The market would have absorbed many times the amount that was offered.

This experience proves the truth of a rather startling assertion that was made in Corvallis last spring by Senator Paulhamus, of Puyallup, Washington. Mr. Paulhamus said that if all of Benton county were planted to fruit, and if all the plantings produced a maximum crop, the market would absorb it all and would demand more. If the entire county were planted to gooseberries alone, he said, he could sell them all.

The experience of the Corvallis cannery is the experience of every other cannery in the Willamette valley. The market is clamoring for Oregon berries and Oregon vegetables. The difficulty is not to find a market, but to supply the market that already exists.

The problem of the canneries is not to gauge their output in such a manner as to nicely balance the demand with a supply that will meet it and no more, and thus prevent the carrying over of stock, but to offer to the demand a supply that will be large enough to make the handling of it profitable.

On every can that the market demands and the canneries are unable to deliver, the man who owns land that will grow berries or vegetables is losing just so much good, hard money that might have been his. Every acre that will grow berries and vegetables, and does not grow them now, is failing to do its share of production. The sooner these acres are put to producing what the market is demanding, the sooner will the Willamette valley realize the prosperity that it is fitted for.

Every community has its wisecracks who will tell you—usually without solicitation—that the price of Willamette valley land is so high that it cannot be profitably farmed. It is noticeable that none of these people are engaged in growing berries or fruit or vegetables.—Eugene Register.

Loganberry Crop Pays Growers Big. Since the beginning of the loganberry season six weeks ago, 34,000 crates of berries have been shipped from Brooks. When the season closed it was found that 37 cars, carrying 400 tons, had been turned over to the Portland cannery, \$31,000 being the tidy sum growers received from this source alone. These figures do not include berries dried or sold in the open markets.

The town of Derry, in Polk county, has entered the field as a rival to Brooks for loganberry honors. Britt Aspinwald, a member of the Brooks firm, having organized a company of prominent men from Portland, Salem and Corvallis, who have purchased the H. W. Thielsen farm of 400 acres, and will

set out 200 acres of berries this fall. The company is capitalized at \$110,000, and plans to install a water and electric light system, build cottages and change the name of the town of Derry to "Loganberry."

EXHIBITS ASKED FOR PRODUCTS SHOW

PACIFIC NORTHWEST BIG LAND SHOW NOV. 18th to 23d.

Attractive Cash Prizes Offered to Orchardists, Farmers, Commercial Clubs, Districts and Other Exhibitors.

The Pacific Northwest Land Products Show will be held in Portland, Oregon, under the auspices of the Oregon State Horticultural Society, November 18th to 23d inclusive.

The Pacific Northwest Land Products Show is the expanding of the scope and purposes of the Oregon Apple Show, after careful consideration by the Board of Directors and the officers of the Oregon State Horticultural Society, and a conclusion reached that the interests of those engaged in the many branches of agriculture should be recognized, as well as the interests of the orchardists. Every district in the Pacific Northwest will be invited to arrange for competitive exhibition, collective display of all orchard and soil products grown in and best adapted to their respective localities.

The orchardist, districts, commercial clubs, and other exhibitors, will be offered attractive cash prizes and other premiums of value, as an inducement to exhibit the best of their commercial fruits and products in all competitive classes. No entry fee will be charged. Space will be allotted as near requirements as possible.

The Pacific Northwest Land Products Show will be educational in character and all its purposes, and by collecting in one grand display all that the orchard and soil produces will enable districts and individuals to compare their fruit and other crops with all other sections; to consider the effect of soils and climatic conditions, and thus learn what varieties are best suited to their own locality.

Spraying, pruning, and other educational demonstrations and lectures will be given daily.

ENTRYMEN MUST NOTIFY GOVERNMENT

If They Do Not Wish to Take Advantage of New Three-Year Final Proof Law.

The provision of section 2291 of the Revised Statutes, as amended, in respect to the homestead period, are made applicable to all unperfected entries upon which residence is required, as well as to those made after June 6, 1912, where the entryman fails to elect to make proof under the law under which his entry was made within the prescribed time. This obligates the

previous entryman to compliance with the law of June 6, 1912, respecting all of its provisions the performance of which is exacted during the homestead period. As a consequence, while residence is reduced from five to three years, specific cultivation is exacted beginning with the second year after entry. Final proof of full compliance must be made within five years from date of entry.

From this it will be noted that entrymen who have filed on their claim prior to the enactment of the three years law must file a declaration with the Department of the Interior, providing they prefer to perfect their title to the claim and prove up under the old five year law, otherwise the three year law becomes operative.

The amount of cultivation required under the new three year law is greater than under the old law. Considerable annoyance and possible serious diffi-

culty in making final proof can be avoided by a careful examination of the provisions of the new law and the rulings of the Department of the Interior regarding it, as contained in their Circulars Nos. 125 and 142, which can be obtained from the Secretary of the Interior.

Special Train to National G. A. R. Encampment.

Word has been received here that a special train will leave Portland on Saturday afternoon, September 7, and will pass through Cottage Grove the same evening carrying the departments of Washington and Oregon to the National Grand Encampment at Los Angeles, September 9-14. Any old soldier can go and the fare for the round trip is \$39.70.
