Sowing Winter Wheat

The copious rains of late July and early August are specially favorable to the winter wheat crop of 1913, if the farmers will only take advantage of the opportunity that is thus brought to them. These rains will readily sprout the grain sown in August whether sown on summer fallow, or corn land or drilled in amid the stubbles of small grain. The opportunity should, therefore, be embraced to sow freely winter wheat in both the Dakotas and Montana.

In Montana winter wheat sown in August on summer fallow land will be sown under specially favorable conditions. The wheat will not only germinate readily, but it will make a strong growth before going into the winter. In North Dakota experience has shown that to sow winter wheat without protection on summer fallow land or on any other kind of land is hazardous, and therefore, it should not be done. What has been said of summer fallow land will apply equally to corn land. There will be ample moisture in the corn land to sprout the grain. In both Montana and Dakota when winter wheat is sown in corn land with a small one-horse drill, it should be sown in August, regardless of the stage of advancement in the growth of the corn. But in Montana, except near the North Dakota border, it is not necessary to leave the corn stalks standing in order to protect the wheat. In North Dakota this is imperative. The corn stalks should be left standing. These will aid in holding snow and they will break the force of the cold winds.

But the rains referred to make it possible to get fair crops of winter wheat next year by simply drilling the wheat in amid the stubbles without plowing the land. This plan is not to be commended, except under special conditions. Those special conditions are markedly present the present year. They are such as relate to a heavy rain fall in the late summer, and to the ability of the farmer to remove quickly the crop that grew upon the land.

Wheat drilled in on such land, especially if it is new land, under the conditions that are now present, will be almost certain to produce a fair crop next year, regardless of the weather conditions. It is better to drill the wheat into stubble land without any disking, especially is this true in North Dakota, for the disking of the stubbles will destroy the protection of the plants which is necessary to the successful growth of winter wheat, especially under North Dakota conditions.

In the absence of moisture to germinate the grain, I would certainly hesitate about advising to sow winter grain among stubbles. Nor do I advise it on land that is very full with weeds.

The weeds the following year would greatly hinder growth in the grain. But on new land that has only grown away one crop of grain, it is certainly legitimate to advise the drilling of the grain stubbles. I know of a crop of winter wheat thus drilled in stubble land in 1911 that will now give a yield of fully 30 bushels per acre. It was grown by Dr. Sweet at Dutton, and it is but one of many instances in which good crops of winter wheat have been thus grown in Montana the present season. The moisture that fell in the autumn of 1911 was quite favorable to the growth of the crop, hence the good results that have been obtained from such sowing the present year.

Where the normal rainfall is not bountiful, it is greatly important to take advantage of it when it does fall freely. It has certainly fallen freely the past season, hence the advantage that may be taken of this fact to sow winter wheat for the crop of 1913.

In a dry autumn it would be very difficult. It would be hazardous to sow wheat thus.

OREGON NEWS NOTES
OF INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout State During the Past Seven Days
Chronicle for Busy Sentinel Readers.

State Holds Hatchery Site.
Roseburg.—Through a decision of a jury in the justice court here the state of Oregon will retain possession of the site occupied by the North Umpqua Fish Hatchery and situated about 18 miles north of Roseburg. Suit was recently filed against the state by Edward Lestina to oust Oswald Richter, manager of the hatchery, from the land in dispute.

Albany College to Build.
Albany.—Plans have been completed for the new buildings and campus of Albany college, which will be situated on a 48-acre tract recently purchased by the college, lying half a mile southwest of this city. The completion of the work as now definitely planned will give Albany college one of the best arranged and most beautiful grounds in the entire country.

Gophers at 25 Cents Each.
Monmouth.—W. Neal, of this city, recently made a contract with J. B. Stump, a farmer and stockman owning a 1200-acre farm, to rid the land of gophers at a price of 25 cents each. War was at once begun on the destructive animals and already 340 of them have been caught with 12 traps, netting a sum of \$85.

SOIL EXPERT IS URGED
Trained Agriculturist Needed in Each County in State.

Portland.—That a large percentage of the counties of the state will join in the general move to place expert agriculturists in the field to continue the earth education and crop improvement work which has been conducted in the schools and elsewhere during the last two years, is the opinion of those who are working on the proposed county campaign.

The plan is to have an agriculturist in each county to work on a salary furnished by public subscription until an appropriation for the work can be secured from the next legislature. To help out in the work the Council of Grain Exchanges of Chicago has agreed to furnish \$1000 of the agriculturist's expense in every county where a specialist can be secured.

Notice of the offer made by the Chicago organization has been sent to every commercial club in the state by D. O. Lively, vice-president of the Portland Union Stockyards company, who has taken an active part in the campaign of the past and is working on the present county campaign.

Fruit Shipments Are Heavy.
The Dalles.—Fruit packing and shipping are in full blast at the packing plants and canneries here. Up to date about 30 carloads of prunes, pears and peaches have been shipped. This year most of the packing is done at the warehouses here, where the fruit is graded and crated.

125 CASES ARE APPEALED
Multnomah County Leads Others With Total of 73.

Salem.—Out of 125 cases which are on the supreme court docket, which has just been completed by Arthur S. Benson, 73 of the cases are appealed from Multnomah county. Marion county comes next on the docket, with ten appeals, Douglas, Lane, Klamath and Washington have five appeals each; Coos has four, Hood River, Tillamook and Polk, three appeals; Linn, Clackamas, Clatsop and Yamhill, two each, and Josephine, one.

The first case on the docket has been hanging fire before the supreme court for 13 years. This is the case of the Larch Mountain Investment company vs. Bridal Veil Lumber company. The transcript was filed November 1, 1899, the briefs have been in for years, but from time to time the case has been continued.

Auto Men Carry Own Insurance.
Eugene.—A large number of automobile owners of Eugene have organized a mutual insurance company known as the Oregon Automobile Mutual Fire association. The object is for mutual protection and relief of the members against loss by fire.

Dallas Crop Damage is Slight.
Dallas.—An investigation covering practically all sections of the county has shown that the damage done to crops so far has not been as great as was feared. The worst damage in any part of the county seems to have been in the Falls City district.

Rain Hurts Shocked Grain.
Eugene.—The heavy rain has stopped all grain threshing operations in Lane county and farmers believe that grain standing in the shock is damaged so that it will be unfit for flour.

Pioneers of Lane County Gather During Fair Week

According to plans that are now well under way, the Lane county pioneers will hold their second annual reunion in connection with the District Fair, Thursday, September 12, has been set as the date. It is believed that the added attraction of fair week will result in a very large attendance of the early settlers of the county. Ample accommodations will be provided by the fair association. The following call has been issued by the president and secretary of the pioneers' association:

The second annual meeting of the old Oregon pioneers, residing in Lane county, will be held on the fair grounds at Eugene on the second day of the district fair, Thursday, September 12.

The fair association has generously made ample provisions for the meeting in the way of tent, tables and seats, and we expect to have an old fashioned pioneer picnic dinner, except that it will be held under canvas instead of under the leafy shade of the forest trees. Members of the Lane County Pioneers' Association, and all those who wish to become members, are urged to be present with well filled baskets, and with anecdote and story we will spend a pleasant hour greeting old friends and neighbors. All who came to Oregon prior to 1865 are eligible to membership.

An interesting collection might be made of curiosities and mementoes of pioneer days—an old style threshing machine made of two sticks tied together with a buckskin whang; or an old pistol or gun, without lock, stock or barrel. The fair management will give space for such an exhibit and will see that it is properly cared for. So bring in your old Dutch ovens and ox yokes and we will show the young folks of today how, without gas ranges and automobiles, we yet lived happily and laid the foundations for a great state.

A program will be prepared and there will be appropriate badges for all. Meet in the pioneer tent at 10 o'clock. There will be a pioneer picnic dinner promptly at noon, and speeches and stories will follow.

Attempted Robbery.

Eugene Register: The S. P. roadmaster, who lives on Oak Street, near Twelfth, had an experience with a burglar Friday night. His boy heard a man coming on the porch and attempting to get in the screen door and the Winchester pump gun was quickly gotten into action. The roadmaster got into position for a shot and in pumping a shell from the magazine into the barrel made a noise which alarmed the fellow and he took to his heels. Diligent search failed to find him, but there was ample evidence that he had been on the porch and attempted to get into the house.

The Oregon state immigration commission is at work on a state booklet that will be a valuable work for attracting settlers. A thorough and accurate compilation is being made of state statistics, so that the most definite information will be available for the intending immigrant. It is expected an edition of 200,000 copies of this book will be published for general distribution before the end of the year.
