AFTER WHEAT PRIZE

Many Communities Will Contest for Prizes at Northwestern Products Exposition.

From the Mississippi River to the Pacific Ocean there are communities which consider themselves the "bread basket of the world," and each believes its farmers around about can produce the world's best wheat. All over this territory men are out selecting five bushel samples to enter in the \$5,000 prize contest to be held in Minneapolis this year in connection with the Northwestern Products Exposition.

Here are some of the communities which are actively collecting samples of wheat to win this prize: Ritzville, Walla Walla, Dayton and Davenport, Wash.; Great Falls, Bozeman, Lewiston, Glendive, Kalispell in Montana; Grand Forks, Bismarck, Fargo and Devils Lake in North Dakota; Ontario, Burns and Prineville in Oregon. South Dakota and Minnesota are also after the prize.

A large Indian stone axe head was found last evening by workmen who were digging a foundation for the Henry Hollenbeck house east of the Baptist church, when about three feet under the surface. The axe head was of soft stone and was almost 12 inches long, nearly seven inches broad and more than two inches thick at the back. It was as sharp as an instrument of that sort of material could be made. The back of the weapon or tool, had evidently been used for hammering. The stone was too soft to be of use in cutting down trees and it was probably utilized in pounding grain and skinning dead animals.—Eugene Guard.
