FLAMES THREATEN THE CITY

ONLY SAVED BY HEROIC EFFORT ON PART OF FIRE LADDIES AND CITIZENS

Commercial Stables Filled With Hay Burn With Fury of Demon and It Seemed for Time as if South End of City Was Surely Doomed.

One of the most disastrous fires Cottage Grove has ever known occurred a few moments after 1 o'clock today, when the Commercial Stables and contents, with the exception of horses, Piper's residence and a number of small storehouses were destroyed. A large portion of the city was for a short time threatened with destruction and was saved only by heroic effort. The buildings occupied by Knowles & Graber, into which the large Simeral & VanDenburg stock had just been moved, Des Larzes Bros., Cottage Grove Shoe Store and Thompson Hotel caught fire several times, but were saved by the fire laddies. Burkholder-Woods Co. and Rees-Wallace Co. were thought for a time to be in danger, and water was thrown on the roofs.

The Commercial Stables were well filled with hay and burned with an intensity that it seemed for a short time could not be stopped. A strong breeze made fighting the flames difficult. Having never been called to a conflagration of such magnitude the fire department showed lack of organization, but several streams of water were being thrown in a comparatively few moments after the alarm was sounded. Cottage Grove's large water supply saved the day.

As far as can be learned all horses were gotten out of the stables without injury, except one belonging to Burkholder-Woods which was badly burned about the neck.

The amount of insurance on the different properties has not been learned. Considerable damage was done to goods moved out of stores and warehouses.
