PLANS FOR BRIDGE MADE

Joint Bill to Go Before Legislatures of Two States

Vancouver, Wash.—Definite plan of organization and procedure to secure the appropriations necessary for building the proposed Pacific Highway bridge across the Columbia river were taken up by the joint bridge committees of Portland and Vancouver, which met in Vancouver Saturday. Arrangements were made for drafting the joint bill, to be presented to the legislatures of both Oregon and Washington, and for the appointment of committees throughout both states.

Sneed Makes His Vengeance Double

Amarillo, Tex.—Al G. Boyce, Jr., was shot and killed here by J. D. Sneed, with whose wife Boyce eloped to Canada last fall. Sneed is shortly to stand trial a second time for the murder of Boyce's father, shot at Fort Worth, January 13, as a result of the elopement of the son Sneed shot.

Mexican Celebrators Stab Police

Phoenix, Ariz.—One American was killed, another was fatally wounded, the chief of police of this city dangerously wounded, and another patrolman seriously injured when Mexican factions fought over the management of the celebration here of Mexico's independence day and the police sought to arrest the brawlers. The murderers escaped but poses made up of citizens and guardsmen are in pursuit.

Panama Canal Opens in 1913

Washington.—The Panama canal is to be opened to traffic in the fall of 1913. This statement was made officially at the navy department with an announcement that the Atlantic fleet would be rendezvoused at Colon this winter before the water is turned in. The navy's estimate is based on the latest report from the army engineers.

ROSENTHAL KILLERS FOUND IN BROOKLYN

New York.—"Gyp the Blood" and "Lefty Louie," the missing gunmen indicted as two of the actual slayers of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, were found by the police living with their wives in a flat in Brooklyn. They were arrested by Deputy Police Commissioner Dougherty and a squad of detectives and locked up.

The two men had been occupying the flat since August 15 and were alone until Tuesday, when they were joined by their wives, through whom clues to their whereabouts were obtained by the police. With the arrest of "Gyp" and "Lefty," whose real names are Harry Horowitz and Louis Rosensweig, the seven men accused of killing Rosenthal, of which Police Lieutenant Becker is the alleged instigator, are now in custody. The capture was the fruit of an unbroken surveillance of the wives and relatives of the two men. This surveillance was maintained by 60 detectives working in relays, who kept Deputy Commissioner Dougherty in touch with what they did and where they were sent.

A SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT EVENTS

National, Political and Personal News Items Briefly Sketched.

Hoodlums took possession of Du-luth's streets and with the strike of streetcar employees an excuse, riot for hours in all parts of the city.

The disease that has swept southern Nebraska and portions of Kansas almost clean of horses has been diagnosed as cerebro spinal meningitis.

In Chicago last week a carload of choice steers was sold at \$10.50 per hundred, the highest price on record, and the prediction was made that \$11 would be reached.

The government began the taking of evidence in Chicago Monday against the International Harvester company, charged in a dissolution suit with violating the Sherman anti-trust law.

With a subscription of \$200,000, Indiana automobile manufacturers have started a campaign for a macadam roadway to extend from New York to San Francisco, a distance of 3340 miles.

Final figures show that eight of the 42 amendments to the Ohio state constitution were defeated, among them equal suffrage, abolition of the death penalty and the appointment of women to certain offices.

In an attack by Zapatistas on a passenger train, 50 miles south of Mexico City, nine persons were injured, one fatally, and all the passengers robbed. Two women passengers were carried into the mountains by the bandits.

All the country east of the Rocky mountains suffered the past week from intense heat. Schools were closed in many of the cities. Chicago reported scores of deaths and hundreds of prostrations. More than a dozen persons were bitten by rabid dogs.

As the result of a vice crusade in Denver, 109 persons, including the mayor, ex-mayor and various other officials, have been indicted by the grand jury. The indictments allege bribery, misuse of the city's streets, thefts of franchises, operating disorderly houses, renting property for such purposes and neglect of duty in non-enforcement of the laws.

Political News Bits

Governor Woodrow Wilson will tour the middle west this week.

The democratic state convention of Connecticut renominated Governor Baldwin.

Colonel Roosevelt left San Francisco early Monday morning to begin his return journey to the east.

The progressive party is now a legal organization in Oregon. Over 7000 names were on the petition filed at Salem.

Winston Churchill, the famous novelist and publicist, has accepted the nomination of the progressive party for governor of New Hampshire.

Fearing a clash with United States Senator La Follette, the Wisconsin Roosevelt progressive convention adjourned without naming a state ticket.

Senator Lodge of Massachusetts will be the orator of the day at the formal opening of the republican national campaign, which has been set for Saturday at Columbus, Ohio.

David W. Mullaney of the national republican committee has announced the appointment of Mrs. J. D. Whitmore of Denver as director of the women's bureau of the western section of the Taft campaign.

People in the News

The resignation of Robert G. Valentine as commissioner of the bureau of Indian affairs was accepted by President Taft.

The government of China has authorized Dr. Sun Yat Sen to establish a corporation to carry out a system of railways covering territory 70,000 miles in extent.

J. P. Morgan has submitted to the Italian government a plan for completing the excavations of Pompeii and Herculaneum, and has expressed a willingness to bear the entire cost of uncovering Herculaneum.

Mrs. Jack Johnson, white wife of the world's champion heavy-weight pugilist, committed suicide at Chicago by shooting herself in the head while her two maids were attempting to wrest the revolver from her. Ill health and despondency was the cause.

A banquet was given in St. Paul Monday in compliment to James J. Hill, and brought together a large number of men prominently identified with the early development of the northwest. The banquet was in celebration of Mr. Hill's 74th birthday anniversary.

Bruce Ismay is to be retired as executive head of the International Mercantile company, and will be succeeded by P. A. S. Franklin, now vice-president and head of the business in this country. The company is capitalized at \$120,000,000, and J. P. Morgan has secured control of the stock.

AMERICAN TROOPS HOLD 6 PRISONERS

Advisers and Principal Leaders of General Pascual Orozco Are Taken.

El Paso, Tex.—Six prisoners are held by United States troops at Presidio, Tex., opposite Ojinaga, Mex., where General Tracy Aubert arrived with 1500 federal troops.

Among the prisoners are all the advisers and principal leaders of General Pascual Orozco, Jr., the rebel commander-in-chief. It is suspected that the person giving his name as Colonel Pablo G. Orozco, a distant relative of the rebel leader, is the rebel leader himself.

Among the prisoners positively identified, according to reports to General Steever, are Colonel Pascual Orozco, father of the rebel general; Colonel Jose Cordova, General Orozco's private secretary and chief adviser, and Colonel Cristobal Caballero, an adviser to the rebel chief.

Federals Retake El Tigre

Douglas, Ariz.—El Tigre, one of the richest mining camps in northern Mexico, was retaken by federals after having been in the hands of the rebel band commanded by Inez Salazar for two days.

The rebels are reported to have taken with them \$20,000 worth of gold and silver bullion. Although Salazar made a demand for \$100,000 on threats of destroying the plant of the El Tigre company, valued at \$2,000,000 and of taking Superintendent Budrow with them as a prisoner, they did not molest any of the company officials.

Threats of the rebels to murder Americans were not fulfilled. So far as known it is believed the only Americans remaining in the section of Sonora infested by the rebel bands of Rojas, Salazar and Campa are those in the well protected towns.

In anticipation of an attack on Nacozari, the Phelps Dodge Copper mining town, about 80 miles south of here, all the women and children remaining in the camp were brought to Douglas. A special train brought them about 60 miles, where automobiles from Douglas met them. About 60 refugees arrived.

WILSON CAUTIONS OFFICIALS

Governor Demands Suppression of Vice at Newark

Seagriff, N. J.—Complaints indicating a "scandalous disregard of the law in the city of Newark," have been brought to the notice of the mayor and chief of police of that city and of the prosecutor and sheriff of Essex county by Governor Wilson.

In a letter to these officials the governor calls attention to alleged vice conditions in Newark, complained of recently by the Anti-Saloon league of New York at a formal hearing before him at Trenton. Documents relative to the complaints are inclosed with the governor's letter and prompt and effective action is asked.

Girls' Stepfather Slain by Couple

Colfax, Wash.—Wesley Brownell, aged 25, and his 17-year-old wife, Winnie, residents of Caledonia, Idaho, shot six shots into the body of A. Nevees, stepfather of Winnie Brownell, killing him. Nevees' daughter charged that he wronged her and also aided in an attack on her made by a bachelor in Idaho.

LAST OF ALLENS CAPTURED

Leader of Hillsville Courthouse "Shoot-up" Traced Through Girl

Des Moines, Ia.—Sidna Allen, so-called leader of the Allen clan, which "shot up" the Carroll county courthouse at Hillsville, Va., March 14, killing Judge Massey and others, and his nephew, Wesley Edwards, were captured here.

Edwards, for the love of whom Miss Maude Iroler, of Mount Airy, N. C., had innocently led detectives to Des Moines, was captured as he was returning to his boarding house after having worked all day with a paving gang.

Allen was arrested at the home of John Cameron, where he and his nephew had been rooming. The arrest followed a few minutes after Miss Iroler stepped into the Cameron home to meet Edwards, whom she was to wed.

The fugitives had been in Des Moines since April 28, Allen under the name of Tom Sayre working as a carpenter, and Edwards under the name of Joe Jackson employed with a city paving gang.

Haywood Arrested in Boston
Boston.—William D. Haywood, of Denver, general organizer of the Industrial Workers of the World, was arrested here on a capias warrant issued as the result of the indictment charging him with conspiracy in connection with the strike of textile workers in Lawrence last winter. He was released on \$1000 bond.

GENERAL NOGI SUICIDES

Port Arthur Hero Sacrifices Self to Show His Sorrow

Tokio.—Grief-stricken on account of the death of Emperor Mutsuhito, whose body was consigned to the tomb at Momoyama, near Kioto, Japan's capital city is preparing funeral rites scarcely less impressive than those of royalty, for General Count Mareuski Nogi, the hero of Port Arthur, who, with his wife, committed hari kari just as the body of the mikado was borne from the palace on its journey to Kioto.

Tokio was hardly surprised that Count Nogi, descendant of the first Samurai family of old Japan, should elect to die according to ancient custom to preserve his master in the realm of shades, but it is declared to be without precedent that his wife should have shared his sacrifice. And as a result of the double tragedy it is feared that when the couple are buried an epidemic of hari kari will be started.

Mob Fires Upon American Sailors

Bluefields, Nicaragua.—American sailors from the gunboat Tacoma were fired upon in the streets here during an anti-American demonstration incident to the celebration of the anniversary of Central American independence. A mob of excited Nicaraguans was formed, and for a moment bloodshed was threatened.

Wilson Will Meet Bryan

New York.—The first meeting between Governor Wilson, the democratic candidate for president, and William J. Bryan since the fight for the nomination started will take place at Lincoln, Neb., October 5, according to announcement at democratic national headquarters. The two leaders will address a big gathering at Lincoln.

Washington, D. C., Notes

Secretary Fisher has ordered cancelled all the 33 Cunningham Alaska coal land claims.

The department of justice at Washington has reversed former Judge C. H. Hanford's decision and restored Leonard Olsson of Tacoma to the rights of citizenship.

Permission to cross the border and drive the Mexican rebels from close proximity to American soil was asked by General E. Z. Steever, commanding the United States forces in Texas.

The United States is about to intervene in Santo Domingo. Warships will be dispatched at once to the island. A revolution has broken out which threatens Americans and other foreign interests.

Proposed increases in freight rates on many commodities from southeastern territory to Pacific coast points were suspended by the interstate commerce commission until December 31, to afford opportunities for investigation.

Interest in the forthcoming hearing of the senate campaign expenditures committee when Colonel Roosevelt, J. P. Morgan, George W. Perkins and others are expected to testify, has caused a heavy demand on Senator Clapp's committee for special accommodations for spectators.

Under a ruling by the department of the interior, forms of application to be used hereafter in connection with Carey act projects must recite that the applicant has never used up his right to the purchase of one tract of 160 acres of that class of land. This means that no person can secure more than 160 acres of Carey act land, whether both tracts are in one state or in separate states.

President Taft has given President Madero 30 days in which to protect American property and lives in Mexico. If Madero fails to do this the United States will require that he resign immediately. If Madero should refuse to resign intervention will follow speedily. Recent events in the Mexican situation have forced this action by the administration. The message to Madero was delivered personally by the Mexican ambassador.
