NUNS' GARB IS UPHELD

President Declines to Bar It From Indian Schools

Washington.—Secretary Fisher's action last January in revoking the order of ex-Indian Commissioner Valentine, barring religious garb or insignia from government Indian schools, was upheld by President Taft in an order made public.

The decision of the president is that teachers now employed in Indian schools may continue to wear the garb of their religious orders, but the privilege is denied to any persons hereafter entering the service.

The president's ruling is the final step in a controversy that has engaged the interior department with religious bodies more than a year. Commissioner Valentine's order would have prohibited any teachers from wearing religious garb in the Indian schools after the end of the last school year. Catholic priests were affected by the order.

Irish Suffragist Wins Her Freedom

Dublin.—Mrs. Mary Leigh, the suffragist, was released from prison on account of ill health, due to her refusal to eat and having to be fed forcibly. Mrs. Leigh was sentenced August 7, to five years' imprisonment on a charge of having wounded John Redmond, leader of the Irish Parliamentary party, with a hatchet, which she threw at Premier Asquith's carriage during the visit of Mr. Asquith to Dublin.

Druids Expel Members in California

Indianapolis, Ind.—California Druids numbering 14,000, more than half the entire membership of the general order, were expelled by the action of the Supreme Grove of America, United Ancient Order of Druids, at its closing session. It was charged that the California Druids twice failed to make annual reports and pay per capita tax.

NATIONS AGREE ON DIVIDING PERSIA

London.—The practical division of Persia between Great Britain and Russia appears assured as a result of the conferences which Serfus Sazanoff, the Russian foreign minister, has had with their statesmen.

All the newspapers which are in closest touch with the foreign office, particularly the Times, looked upon recently as Sir Edward Grey's mouthpiece, are forecasting this arrangement and apparently preparing the public mind for it. The necessity of preserving order in the interests of trade is the principal reason advanced.

Some of the Liberal papers bewail the disappearance of Persia as the buffer state and foresee a great increase in the British military establishment when the British-Russian boundary is drawn across the middle of what is now Persia.

A SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT EVENTS

National, Political and Personal News Items Briefly Sketched.

Revised estimates at Washington set October 15, 1913, as the date on which the first vessel will pass through the Panama canal.

Forty-five hundred men employed in the copper mines at Bingham, Utah, laid down their tools after the operators had refused to meet their demand for an increase in pay of 50 cents a day.

American claims aggregating \$3,000,000, resulting from the depredations of Mexican rebels have been filed by Washington officials with the Madero government. A full settlement is demanded.

The Clapp committee investigating campaign contributions and expenditures has determined to hear J. Pierpont Morgan and George W. Perkins, as well as Colonel Roosevelt, the first week in October. Colonel Roosevelt is to appear October 1.

Federal judges and their clerks in Alaska must pay their own laundry bills. This is the ruling made by the comptroller of the treasury, to whom had been submitted a \$6 laundry bill submitted by one of the Alaskan judges as part of his necessary traveling expenses.

President Taft has made public a letter to Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh, taking open issue with congress on the question of a federal budget, and directing all heads of government departments or independent officers of the government to make their estimates of revenue and expenditure for the fiscal year in conformity with the budget plan.

Political News Bits

Governor Wilson, after casting his vote in the New Jersey primaries Tuesday, toured the New England states.

Governor Wilson has given his approval to the formation in New York of the Wilson National Progressive Republican League.

The political situation in Kansas was cleared by a decision of the Roosevelt electors to ask to be taken off the republican ticket on the ballot. Colonel Roosevelt will carry his speechmaking tour through the south this week, covering the territory from Missouri and Arkansas to the eastern coast.

Speaker Champ Clark has begun a campaign for Woodrow Wilson which will keep him busy until election day. He is to visit New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada, California and other western states.

An invitation to President Taft to enter into joint debate with Eugene V. Debs, the nominee of the socialist party for president, was declined. The president's declination was based on the fact that he has announced his intention of taking no speaking part in the campaign.

Pledges supporting the income tax principle, immediate minimum wage standards for women, pensions for dependent mothers, abolition of prison contract labor, initiative, referendum and recall and the La Follette national platform were adopted at the Wisconsin state republican convention.

One of the bitterest fights in the history of New York democracy seemed imminent when it became known that Charles F. Murphy of Tammany, had succeeded in preventing either Senator O'Gorman or William G. McAdoo, Governor Wilson's closest friends, being elected delegates to the democratic state convention.

People in the News

Chief Justice Ralph Oregon Dunbar, member of the Washington supreme court for 22 years and just renominated without opposition, died at Olympia.

Mrs. Grant, widow of General Frederick Dent Grant, has purchased a residence in Washington and will join the Washington colony of widows of famous men.

Fred W. Carpenter, formerly secretary to President Taft, and at present American minister to Morocco, has been transferred to be minister to Siam in place of Hamilton King, who died at Bangkok September 2.

Colonel Pascual Orozco, Sr., and his five companions, advisers of Orozco Jr., leader of the Mexican rebellion in the north, who were captured by United States troops at Presidio, Texas, were found not guilty of neutrality law violations at their hearing and were released.

A ruling of great interest to country banks was laid down by Lawrence O. Murray, controller of the currency, in an address delivered in New York to a gathering of national bank examiners. On and after October 1, he said, he desired that at the examination of all country banks the board of directors shall be convened and the examination of assets made in their presence.

CUBA APPROACHES FINANCIAL CRISIS

Revenue is at Low Ebb and Government is Puzzled to Meet Current Expenses.

Havana.—It is felt generally here that Cuba is approaching a crisis in its history as a republic. Two serious questions occupy the public mind. Can Cuba survive the present state of her finances? Can she hold an honest and orderly election for the presidency with a loyal submission of the defeated party to the will of the majority?

The treasury is empty. The last dollar of the \$16,500,000 of the Spayer loan has been spent, while the work of sewerage and paying Havana, the principal purpose for which the plan was authorized by the United States, is not finished and is in danger of interruption if not of abandonment. The government is at its wits' end to find money to meet its vast expenditures, while receipts from the customs and the lottery have reached their lowest point. All this is asserted by the enemies of the government and most of it is frankly admitted.

The press continues to be filled with articles bawling the financial and political perils that beset the republic. Careful estimates show that the Gomez administration has spent during its two and a half years at least \$140,000,000. Reports are that the only hope for Cuba lies in cutting down her expenses at least 50 per cent.

Civil Service for Postmasters

Washington.—It virtually has been decided that President Taft will soon issue an executive order placing fourth class postmasters in the classified service. This order will relieve 36,308 postmasters from the uncertainty of political appointment.

Suffragettes Are Roughly Handled

London.—Suffragettes who attempted to break up a meeting addressed by David Lloyd-George, the chancellor of the exchequer, at Llanystumdwy, Wales, were roughly handled and forced to seek protection in neighboring cottages.

MAY RECALL COTTERILL

Signatures to Petition Now Approximate 18,000.

Seattle, Wash.—With approximately 18,000 signatures to the petition, it is announced that Mayor George F. Cotterill, of Seattle, will have to face a recall election this year. The election will come probably in November or December.

The influences behind the movement say 22,000 signatures will be secured by the time the petition is ready for filing. It requires but a few more than 16,000 names to make the petition effective. The recall association now figures on having a 40 per cent surplus to make sure the election.

Irish Factions Fight

Coleraine, Ireland.—Five houses were wrecked in a riot at Londonderry between the factions disputing over home rule, following a meeting of Unionists in Guild Hall, presided over by the Duke of Abercorn. Nationalists stoned the torch bearers and bandmen of the Unionists.

AMBASSADOR ASKS RELEASE OF PRISONER

Mexico City.—Ignoring the usual channels of diplomatic intercourse, the American ambassador, Henry Lane Wilson, made a peremptory demand on the governor of the state of Tamaulipas, for the immediate release from the jail at Tampico, of W. G. Nichols, an American fruitgrower.

Nichols was immediately removed from the Tampico jail and placed in a hospital under guard. Nichols is ill and his life was in jeopardy as a result of his confinement.

This action was taken by order of the supreme court judge, who previously had ordered his reimprisonment, and it has relieved a situation that fast was becoming acute. Nichols was sentenced to eight years' imprisonment on the charge of having killed a Mexican robber. The court in reconsidering his case disregarded the confession of a Mexican who admitted that he was the slayer of the robber.

Trust Buster is Opposed to Recall

Seattle, Wash.—In an address before the Seattle Bar association Frank B. Kellogg, the "trust buster," recently elected president of the American Bar association, plainly came out in opposition to the recall of judges.

More Alaska Coal Claims Cancelled

Juneau, Alaska.—Commissioner of the General Land Office Fred Lennett has ordered cancellation of the 12 Lippy-Davis coal claims in the Bering river district.

IRISH DEFY HOME RULE

Men of Ulster Preparing to Sign Pledge To Resist

London.—On Saturday, September 28, Unionists of the northern counties of Ireland propose to register their formal defiance of home rule.

Assembling in halls, market places and churches, the men of Ulster will sign a covenant pledging themselves never to submit to any government from Dublin which may be imposed upon the country by the Asquith-Redmond home rule bill, passed by the House of Commons.

Home rule in its revived form of local self-government, instead of complete separation for Ireland, has aroused no deeper political feeling in England than other questions—the tariff, the Lords and Lloyd-George's taxation measures. Indeed, most of the Englishmen appear willing that Ireland should have the power involved in Mr. Redmond's program, if only the constant strife and racial bitterness can be ended.

Woman Socialist Quits Campaign

San Francisco.—Lucy Good White, Socialist candidate for supreme judge, one of the eight nominated at the primaries, has announced her withdrawal from the race. She has been denied admission to the bar by the appellate court judges, before whom she appeared for examination recently.

Candidates Disregard Laws

Washington.—Of the 2000 or more candidates for congress less than one-sixth have obeyed the new publicity law concerning campaign contributions and expenses. The law requires a statement before the primary or convention and a second statement after the nomination.

Stolen \$55,000 Package Found.

Pensacola, Fla.—The package containing \$55,000 in currency, which was mysteriously extracted from an express shipment from the First National bank here to the Louisville & Nashville pay car at Flomatch, Alabama, was found at the rear of the bank by the negro janitor of the building.

MARINES RELIEVE STARVING POPULACE

Managua, Nicaragua.—After battling his way through hordes of rebels under General Mena, besieging the city of Granada, who had threatened to sack the town if it should fall, Rear Admiral Southerland, with marines, reached Granada and placed his men in control. The populace was found on the verge of starvation.

Admiral Southerland received positive orders from Washington to relieve the town at any cost, owing to the pressing appeals of relatives of Americans and others besieged there. While en route to Granada, American marines were fired upon at Masaya and three men of Major Butler's command were wounded.

The prompt action of the United States at Granada has prevented for the present, at least, the intervention of Great Britain and France in the Nicaraguan war. The relief of Granada against such odds, it is thought, will be proof to foreign nations that United States forces are sufficient to deal with the rebels. The college at Granada is known as the French college and its membership is composed of many French girls and the daughters of most of the well-to-do residents of Managua and the larger Nicaraguan towns.

Taft Urges Health Bureau

Washington.—A national bureau of health was strongly urged by President Taft in his address of welcome to the 15th annual congress of hygiene and demography, and by Dr. Henry P. Walcott, of Massachusetts, president of the congress.
