CAUSE OF ANTHRACNOSE

Apple Orchards in Great Danger on Account of Abundant Rains, Says Professor.

That anthracnose will spread rapidly in the apple orchards this season on account of the abundant rains just past is feared by Prof. H. S. Jackson of the Oregon Agricultural College department of plant pathology. He recommends that orchardists spray at once for the disease.

"Do not wait until the fruit is picked," says Prof. Jackson, "since a large part of the infection will have occurred before that time if the trees are not protected at once. Use the Bordeaux mixture, 4-4-50, formula and spray thoroughly to cover all the twigs and branches. Directions for making the mixture for spraying are in circular bulletin 13 of the O. A. C. Experiment Station which will be sent on request.

"A second application as soon after the fruit is picked as possible should be made with Bordeaux 6-6-50. The first application should not be delayed; the spray will not injure the fruit though it may cause a slight deposit which will necessitate hand wiping the fruit. Experiments of the department of plant pathology in the past two years show conclusively that orchards seriously infected may be cleaned of anthracnose in two years by twice spraying in the foregoing manner. The disease is not as serious in eastern Oregon as in the western part of the state where the early rains have made urgent necessity for immediate spraying. Further information will gladly be given those who write the plant pathology department."

LaFollette on Roosevelt

The severest indictment of Roosevelt, the self-appointed leader of the self-styled Progressive party, comes from the man with whom the Progressive movement had its origin, who began the movement within the Republican party, who refused to take it outside that party, who developed its strength until it is now the most vital element in that party and who now confidently predicts that it "will ere long control the councils of the Republican party in every state in the Union." That man is La Follette, whose legally-elected delegates from Wisconsin were thrown out of the Republican National Convention of 1904 at Roosevelt's behest, who had for years been branded by Roosevelt as a disturber, a demagogue, a dangerous person.

The father of the Progressive movement, to whom was due the triumphs it won while the man who now tries to snatch the banner from his hand was placing every possible obstacle in his way, finds little evidence of progressiveness in the record of the man whose conversion synchronizes with the opportunity for political profit.

Severe critic as he has been of Taft, La Follette declares that the President has been a far more effective foe of the trusts than has the blustering Colonel who sanctioned the Tennessee Coal & Iron deal, refused to prosecute the harvester trust and allowed the statute of limitations to run against the prosecution of the sugar trust so that the proceedings begun by Taft in regard to the Pennsylvania refinery have partially failed.

A most effectual safeguard of popular rule is publicity of contributions.

La Follette has repeatedly called upon Roosevelt, "in the name of the Progressives of principle," for a full and complete statement of the moneys expended in his candidacy. Roosevelt's manager tardily responds with a statement which is obviously and ridiculously incomplete.

Roosevelt's first excuse for becoming an independent candidate was that he had been robbed of the Republican nomination by the fraudulent seating of delegates. La Follette replies, and backs up the statement with proof, that not only is this charge baseless, but that the contest began by Roosevelt himself for 164 seats were fraudulent and were so admitted to be by the vote of Roosevelt's own adherents on the National committee.

La Follette places in startling contrast the conduct of Roosevelt at Chicago and that of Bryan at Baltimore. He says:

Bryan at Baltimore, foregoing all chance of his own nomination, marshaling all his forces, braving Tammany and the trusts to rescue his party from their domination, carrying the convention for the adoption of the most progressive Democratic platform yet offered, and the nomination of the most progressive Democratic candidate available, was a towering devotion to civic righteousness.

Roosevelt, at Chicago, backed by money derived from the stock-watering operations of the Steel Trust and the Harvester Trust, organizing what are now confessed to have been "fake" contests as to nearly 200 delegates in order to control the Republican convention and secure his own nomination, refusing to aid in making a progressive platform, bound to have the nomination or destroy the Republican party, was a most striking example of misdirected power and unworthy ambition.

La Follette points out that, though Roosevelt "did not have enough votes to nominate himself upon any honest basis," he did have enough "ultimately to have nominated a real progressive and have adopted a strong progressive platform. But," says La Follette, "he would have no one but himself. At the first suggestion of Hadley he ordered the third party maneuvers, lest he lose his followers." La Follette further says:

Mr. Roosevelt was not governed by a suggestion of that spirit of high patriotic and unselfish purpose of which Bryan furnished such a magnificent example one week later in the Democratic convention at Baltimore. Instead, he filled the public ear with sound and fury. He ruthlessly sacrificed everything to the one idea of his being the candidate. He gagged his followers in the convention without putting upon record any facts upon which the public could base a definite, intelligent judgment regarding the validity of Taft's nomination. He submitted no suggestion as to platform of progressive principles. He clamored loudly for purging the convention roll of "tainted" delegates, without purging his own candidacy of his tainted contests and his tainted trust support. He offered no reason for a third party excepting his own overmastering craving for a third term.—Oregonian.

OREGON SYSTEM IS HAZARDOUS

So Says New York Times After Reading Allen Eaton's Book.

The man who reads Allen H. Eaton's book entitled "The Oregon System" with open mind will be forced to the conclusion that the new form of government under which the Oregonians are living is a hazardous experiment.

It does not appear from the admirable presentation of the methods and results of the Oregonian scheme which Mr. Eaton gives us that the people of his state are governing themselves very well. Striking a balance between the good things that have been gained through the establishment of their democracy and the harm that has come from it, we may justifiably doubt that the Oregonians acted wisely when they turned away from representative government and instituted so-called direct government by the people. Distrust of the new order increases as we consider the future and attempt to forecast the operation of the Oregon system in the light of what has already taken place. To this view a large percentage of the people of Oregon are committed, and in the number we are inclined to include our thoroughly candid author, who, though he seems to hope the fatal faults in the Oregon system will be remedied, refrains from confidently predicting they will be.

The system was established with the expectation that it would free the state from government by bosses; but it seems the old bosses—or, if not the old bosses, a fresh lot—have learned how to play the new game fairly well and are in the way of becoming quite proficient at it. This, we take it, Mr. Eaton has in mind when he says: "The machinery of direct legislation, has fallen into the hands of dishonest men, who, for money and spite, have abused the privilege of direct legislation, and who, in the name of the people, have misrepresented our citizenship and brought disgrace upon our state."

But the dishonest men are not the only ones who have hurt Oregon; freaks and agitators of one sort and another have been at work all the while, and Mr. Eaton's story seems to show that the ever-reliable errand of the people has made it possible for them to get bad laws enacted, to defeat good measures, to tear the Constitution into tatters, to knock party organization into smithereens, and to establish a tendency to despise conservation and to grab eagerly at novelties. It is pretty clear that the Oregonians will have to overhaul their new scheme of government, and if they are wise they will do the overhauling quickly.—New York Times.

SAVING CLOVER SEED CROP

Crop Pest Expert Tells How to Control Midge Which Destroys Clover Seed.

Dasynura leguminicola lint, a clover seed midge which prevents the formation of the seed in the blossoms, has been reported as abundant in various parts of the state, and A. L. Lovett of the crop pest force of the Oregon Agricultural College has been making investigations.

"England, Ontario and most of our states where red clover is grown are troubled with this pest, as the red clover is its favorite host plant," says Mr. Lovett. "The white clover, alsike, and possibly the mammoth clover are also attacked. The larvae enter the flower buds and feed on the contents of the ovaries, preventing the formation of the seed. The injury is more serious each year that the field is allowed to run.

"The adult female fly is so small and active that it is seldom seen in the field. It has long slender legs, a single pair of wings and a pinkish body. It is about 2 millimeters long, and when the ovipositor is extended nearly 6 millimeters in length. It has many natural enemies in the middle west, and several methods to control it may be used. Pasturing the field in the spring or early summer destroys the midges and varies the time of the main cutting seed. If the hay crop is cut early it will slightly reduce the yield of hay, but it will insure a heavy crop. The seed crop may be mowed back just after it starts, and this will delay the heading enough to miss the second brood of flies.

"Near Portland the maggots were found in large numbers in manglers where clover hay was being fed, but as yet it has not been found that the presence of the maggot is detrimental to stock or that it lessens the volume of hay."
